President and First Lady went to Inova Fairfax Hospital to visit "the first baby born to a member of my staff," as Mrs. Bush put it.

Mom is Desiree Sayle, head of correspondence for the first lady and former head of correspondence for Colin Powell at America's Promise. Dad is Stephen

Sayle, lawyer with the Dutko Group. Baby is Vivienne Anna, born July 2 at 3:20 p.m., 7 lbs. 4 oz., 20.5 inches. Sister Isabella (known as Bella), 2,

also was on hand in a bright yellow dress.

The Sayle family and the Bushes made a brief appearance in a baby room at the hospital (which a staffer said delivers 10,000 babies a year). Little Bella seemed taken with all the attention and Mrs. Sayle seemed amazingly resilient and smiling for someone who just had a baby less than a day before.

"We're thrilled to be here today to congratulate Desiree and Stephen," said the First Lady who was wearing a gray pants suit.

The president spoke briefly (see transcript) about how the baby's birth "reminds us of the responsibilities we have in life" and said Vivienne is lucky to have parents who will care for her. This provided a brief segue into how Congress needs to send him a bill that will help patients and a "bill that doesn't help lawyers."

There was a shouted question about when he'll decide on stem cell research and the president brushed it off with something that sounded like: "In a while."

This afternoon, word is, we'll be off on the first Bush (43) White House golfing expedition.
