MEETING WITH TAX FAMILIES AND REMARKS ON THE ECONOMY

I. PURPOSE

This event will focus on how families and small businesses have benefited from the tax relief that has been enacted over the past three years and the importance of making that relief permanent.

II. BACKGROUND

Today's meeting and remarks focus on the tax relief provisions that, unless made permanent, will impact families and small businesses in the next several years – the increased child credit; the marriage penalty relief; the ten percent tax bracket for families; the increased small business expensing for small businesses; and the death tax phase-out.

- For families, the increased child credit, marriage penalty relief, and expanded ten percent bracket will sunset after 2004, increasing the tax burden on a family of four earning \$40,000 by \$915 in 2005.
- For small businesses, allowable small business expensing will shrink from \$100,000 to just \$25,000 beginning in 2006, increasing the cost of capital investments for America's small businesses.
- Meanwhile, the death tax will come back in 2011 unless Congress acts. This creates uncertainty because people are making their estate plans now.

Today's meeting participants represent families and small businesses that will be harmed if Congress fails to make your tax relief permanent.
