I. PURPOSE

To congratulate participants of the 2004 Summer Olympics and Paralympics.

II. BACKGROUND

U.S. Summer Olympics

In 2004, the Olympic Games returned to its origin when Athens hosted the Games of the XXVIII Olympiad. For the first time in Olympic history, the Olympic flame traveled to all seven continents this year.

The 2004 Olympic Games hosted 11,099 athletes, the largest number ever. The 2004 Games also hosted the most women athletes ever, from 202 countries. The United States was awarded 35 gold medals, 39 silver medals, and 29 bronze medals, for a total of 103 medals – more than any other country.

U.S. Summer Paralympics

The Paralympic Games, both summer and winter, are held for elite athletes with physical or visual impairments, representing the four international federations of the blind, paraplegics and quadriplegics, people with cerebral palsy, and amputees and others (including dwarfs). The first Paralympic Games were held in Rome, Italy, in 1960, and have been held in the same city or country hosting the Olympic Games and Olympic Winter Games since then. 2004 marked the XII Paralympic Games.

The 2004 Paralympic Games included 3,969 athletes from 136 countries. In the 2004 Athens games, the United States won 27 gold medals, 22 silver medals, and 39 bronze medals, for a total of 88 medals.

You participated in the Olympic Torch Relay in December 2001, and you attended the Opening Ceremony in Salt Lake City, Utah, on February 8, 2002. You also welcomed the members of the 2002 U.S. Winter Olympic and Paralympic teams to the White House on April 23, 2002.

BIOGRAPHIES OF DAWN STALEY AND KEVIN SZOTT

Dawn Staley, Olympian (Basketball)

Dawn Staley was a member of the 1996, 2000, and 2004 gold medal U.S. Olympic Basketball Teams. She gave her 1996 gold medal to her mother, Estelle, whom she cites as the biggest influence in her life. As a member of the USA National Team, she has won ten international medals, including nine gold and one bronze. In addition, Dawn represented the Charlotte Sting in three consecutive WNBA All-Star games from 2001 to 2003. She now serves as the Head Women's Basketball Coach at Temple University. Dawn was the first member of her family to graduate from college.

Dawn was selected by her teammates to carry the United States flag in the Opening Ceremonies.

Kevin Szott, Paralympian (Men's Judo)

b(6) He holds 31 national titles in wrestling, powerlifting, shot put, discus, javelin, and judo for the U.S. Association of Blind Athletes (USABA), and he is only the second athlete to ever medal in four different sports at the Paralympics, including the gold medal in Judo in 2000 and a bronze medal in 2004. He is the first visually impaired athlete to be nationally ranked by U.S. Judo. In addition, Kevin was named USABA's 1997 Male Athlete of the Year. Kevin is a salesman with Hartford Life.

I. PURPOSE

To deliver remarks on Homeland Security and the War on Terror at a Bush-Cheney '04 event.

II. BACKGROUND

Marlton is located 15 miles east of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. It is a part of Evesham Township in Burlington County, New Jersey. According to the 2000 Census, Marlton had a population of 10,260, and Burlington County had a population of 423,394. In 2000, you lost Burlington County by 27,252 votes (40.7 percent to 56.0 percent) and lost New Jersey by 504,677 (40.3 percent to 56.1 percent).

Burlington County is considered a swing county due to its varying demographics; the eastern part of the county is dominated by a large number of military families from the two military facilities in the area (Fort Dix, an Army base, and McGuire Air Force Base). The central portion of the county is a mixture of rural and suburban areas, filled with affluent Philadelphia commuters who lean Republican. The western part of the county tends to be more Democrat because of the blue-collar workforce based in industrial towns along the Delaware River.

Burlington County's largest employment sector is wholesale and resale trade. The fastest-growing employment category is the service-producing sector. The top three employers in Burlington County are Lockheed Martin Corporation; Cendant Mortgage, a company which finances home mortgages; and Virtua Memorial Hospital of Burlington County.

New Jersey's unemployment rate stands at 4.8 percent as of August 2004, 1.3 percentage points below its peak of 6.1 percent in July 2003. As of September 2004, the national unemployment rate was 5.4 percent.
