MICHIGAN BRIEFING

STATE ISSUES

SELFRIDGE AIR NATIONAL GUARD BASE

Nearly TBD military personnel from Selfridge Air National Guard base will observe your departure. The 127th Wing is the host organization at the base with numerous tenant units including the 927th Air Refueling Wing, Coast Guard Air Station Detroit, Naval Air Reserve Center Selfridge, Naval Reserve Center Detroit, Marine Wing Support Group 47, the Army's 3rd Brigade, 85th Division, and the 75th Ordnance Company. The 127th has flown more than 800 sorties in the past 39 months in support of Operation Noble Eagle and is in the middle of a two-year commitment to Operation Iraqi Freedom having deployed its C-130s to Al Udeid Air Base, Qatar, and to Kuwait in 60-day rotations. The 127th has also deployed to Uzbekistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. At this time, approximately 100 Selfridge personnel are serving in theater in support of the Iraq effort.

ECONOMIC NUMBERS

Michigan's unemployment rate in November 2004 was 7.0 percent, 0.6 percentage point below its peak of 7.6 percent in December 2003. As of November 2004, the national unemployment rate was 5.4 percent.

MARRIAGE BILLS VETO

On December 23, Governor Jennifer Granholm (D) vetoed a package of bills to encourage premarital counseling for couples and to require counseling for married couples that are about to divorce who have children. She considered the bills too intrusive.

The bills were supported by a wide range of officials, from conservative state legislators to Detroit Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick (D). It is unlikely that the bills will be taken up again in the near term because the legislative session has ended and the major sponsor of the bill, State Representative Joanne Voorhees (R), did not seek another term due to term limits.

GARBAGE IMPORTATION

Michigan ranks third nationwide among states importing trash from neighbors; it imports 5.2 million tons per year. Despite a law that took effect October 1, 2004, forcing out-of-state trash to comply with Michigan standards, only six communities that ship trash to the state have filed paperwork certifying the loads do not contain returnable bottles, yard waste, car batteries, or other junk banned from landfills in the state.

At least 25 Michigan landfills accept trash from Ontario, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, and other states. The state has yet to issue a single fine under the new law.

BORDER TRANSPORTATION SECURITY

U.S. Department of Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge and Canadian Deputy Prime Minister Anne McLellan pledged to increase lane capacity at the Detroit Windsor Tunnel and other border tunnels and bridges by 25 percent in 12 months. The measures in this proposal include: constructing and staffing a second commercial lane and secondary commercial inspection area to increase capacity by three percent, increasing staff to primary lanes at high traffic periods, and implementing a bi-national Intelligent Transportation System (ITS).

INDIAN GAMBLING EXPANSION

In October 2004, the group "Taxpayers of Michigan Against Casinos" filed suit against Governor Granholm on separation-of-powers grounds following a 2003 decision that expanded Indian Gambling in the state. The state's compact with the Odawa Indians, initiated in 1998, was amended to allow the tribe to open a second casino and operate 10 years longer in exchange for more tax revenue. The compact included a provision allowing the Governor to negotiate amendments on behalf of the state. On December 13, the Michigan Court of Appeals considered whether Governor Granholm exceeded her powers in amending the casino-operating compact without getting approval from state lawmakers. The Court has not announced a ruling in the case. The state has 17 Indian casinos.

GENERAL MOTORS LANSING PLANT

On December 30, General Motors Corporation announced that it will close its Lansing, Michigan, production facility due to overproduction and low sales of the Chevrolet SSR Roadster. The plant in Ingham County, near Lansing, will cut production from January 3 through March 5. Salaried workers will report to work, while hourly workers will get unemployment and supplemental unemployment benefits totaling 95 percent of their net pay under the terms of their United Auto Workers contract. After March 5, workers will return to a normal work schedule.

POLITICAL CLIMATE

PETITION DRIVES

Partial-birth Abortion

MICHIGAN BRIEFING

A ban on partial-birth abortion was passed by the Michigan State Legislature last year but vetoed by Governor Granholm. Supporters of the ban obtained 254,206 valid signatures on a petition to send the bill back to the State Legislature. A state panel approved the petitions, and the Legislature enacted the measure into law. It will take effect in March 2005; however, the American Civil Liberties Union plans to challenge the ban.

Same-Sex Marriage

In the General Election, a constitutional amendment defining marriage as a union between a man and woman overwhelmingly passed 59 percent to 41 percent.

Casino Expansion

A new constitutional amendment to require voters to approve any expansion of gambling in the state was approved with 58 percent of the vote. The exceptions to the approval process are Native American casinos and existing operations in Detroit. Governor Granholm and former State House Speaker Rick Johnson (R) were against the amendment.

ANTI-AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PETITION DRIVE

The Michigan Civil Rights Initiative, a group seeking to end affirmative action in Michigan, says it is in the final stages of a petition drive aimed at putting a proposed constitutional amendment on the 2006 ballot. The group, backed by California businessman Ward Connerly, must turn in at least 317,757 valid signatures to qualify for the ballot. The signatures must be submitted to the Michigan Secretary of State within 180 days of initiation of the project. Organizational spokesmen have declined to comment on the number of signatures collected but have stated that signature gatherers are being paid. The group has stated that it will submit the signatures on January 6.
