#### **I. PURPOSE**

To meet with state legislators and tribal leaders who helped pass supporting resolutions on your priorities.

#### **II. BACKGROUND**

State legislators and tribal leaders from 32 states and two Indian nations, spanning 51 legislative bodies, passed 103 resolutions in support of your agenda.

- Two States passed resolutions in support of Tort Reform (CO and KY);
- Eight States passed resolutions in support of Permanently Repealing the Death Tax (CO, ID, KY, MI, ND, PA, SC, and UT);
- Five States passed resolutions to Abolish the Alternative Minimum Tax (ID, NM, SC, UT, and WA);
- Six States and two tribes passed resolutions to make all your 2001 Savings Provisions permanent (CO, MS, NM, OR, PA, SC, Mashpee Tribe, and Saginaw Tribe);
- Three States passed resolutions in support of your 2003 Jobs and Growth Package (GA, MI, and ND);
- Three States adopted resolutions supporting passing the Defense Appropriations Act first (AR, CO, and SC);
- Seven States passed resolutions supporting a National Missile Defense System (AZ, CO, GA, NV, NM, SC, and UT);
- 28 States and two tribes passed resolutions in support of your actions in Iraq (AL, AK, AR, CO, FL, GA, ID, IN, IA, KS, KY, LA, MA, MI, MN, MS, MO, MT, NH, NM, OK, OR, PA, SC, SD, TX, UT, WI, Mashpee Tribe, and Saginaw Tribe); and
- Nine states passed resolutions in support of your nomination of Miguel Estrada (CO, GA, IA, LA, NV, ND, OR, SD, and WA).

In 2003, Americans for Tax Reform (ATR) assisted in these efforts. ATR was founded in 1985 by Grover Norquist at the behest of President Reagan to support the 1986 Tax Relief Package. Mr. Norquist has served as President of ATR since its inception.
