64 When Conway "Doc" Downing Jr. '64 attended the University of Virginia Law School, he thought he was headed for a career on Wall Street. But his entrepreneurial flair took over, and he has built a career providing services for the gaming industry—servicing lottery machines, lobbying for a gaming trade association and currently exploring Internet gaming.

"As an African-American businessman trying to get ahead in the gaming industry, I enjoy the challenge and new opportunities on the horizon," he says. "Not long ago gaming was considered 'mobbed up,' and those involved in this industry could not access the capital markets and the Wall Street investment banking community."

Even by deciding to come to Andover, Downing showed his willingness to take on challenges. Growing up in Newport News, Va., he attended segregated black schools. In a South that was still grappling with integration, Downing's father, a dentist and entrepreneur himself, feared Newport News would follow the lead of Norfolk, where the white high schools, rather than integrate, were closed.

So Downing considered boarding school in New England. When he showed up at the SSAT test site—a white elementary school in Virginia—he was told it would be a violation of state law for him to sit with white students, and he was asked to move to the basement. His father angrily protested, and young Conway took the SSAT with the others.

Dear Mr. President:

As you know, in response to a request by George Tenet, the Director of Central Intelligence, the Justice Department announced on September 29th that it was opening a preliminary criminal investigation to determine whether Administration officials disclosed the identity of a covert CIA officer to the media.

While this announcement is an acknowledgment of the importance of this matter, we continue to be deeply concerned about the failure of the Administration to treat this matter with the seriousness it demands.

Despite the grave security implications of this disclosure, your spokesperson indicated that you had no plans to conduct an internal investigation of this matter. In addition, it was indicated that you oppose the appointment of a special counsel, even though keeping the investigation in the hands of the Justice Department raises conflict of interest issues.

We regret these decisions, and we ask you, through the White House Counsel, to urge the Attorney General to reconsider his refusal to appoint a special counsel. In the meantime, in order to expedite an investigation of this case, we ask that you immediately direct your staff to take the following steps:

- 1. Produce a list of all senior White House officials who could have had access to relevant information regarding the identity of CIA operatives;
- 2. Insist that every senior staff member sign a statement that they are not responsible for disclosing the identity of the CIA employee who was exposed, and affirming that they will immediately produce any information that would help identify the person or persons responsible for the leak;

- 3. Assign a senior attorney within the White House Counsel's Office to organize and compile relevant documents in order to ensure swift compliance with the investigation;
- 4. Instruct the White House Counsel to determine whether any document, electronic communication, phone log, or any other record related to this matter was destroyed or deleted between the official notification to the White House of the criminal investigation by the Department of Justice on the evening of September 29th, and the issuance approximately 12 hours later of White House Counsel Alberto Gonzalez's memorandum instructing White House staff to preserve all evidence, or at any other time prior to that notification.

In October of 2001, you stated that "...it is unacceptable behavior to leak classified information when we have troops at risk." We strongly agree. We believe it is imperative that this matter be investigated as quickly and as thoroughly as possible. Any Administration official found to be responsible in this matter should be dismissed immediately and prosecuted for their violation of Federal criminal law.

I have been following very closely the events in Iraq and want to add my weight to that of the millions of Americans who choose to fight terrorism by building up a free, creative, and thriving alternative in Iraq.

I have taken much heart from the fact that some ninery percent of all Iraqi municipalities are now self-governing. The national government is still weak, but self-government begins from the ground up, in the villages, towns, and local regions, just as it did long ago in the United States. I have also been heartened by the fact that Iraqi courts staffed by Iraqis and following Iraqi law are now operating in every municipality and every region, and on matters of human rights, even on the national level. A new Iraqi currency is now coming into circulation, many months more quickly than we were able to accomplish this in Germany in 1946-47. There have been few, if any, security problems in more than ninety percent of the territory in Iraq, and nearly all the 86 American deaths we have suffered in the 152 days since May 1 have occurred in a small quadrant of Iraq northwest of Baghdad that is still tormented by Saddam's relatives and ruling elite.

Nonotheless, the people of Iraq have suffered so acutely during the last thirty years—more than a million of them taken from their terrified families, tortured and killed—that I hope the American people and their representatives will see it in their heart to extend to Iraq sufficient financial aid to set them on the road to recovery. During these thirty years, while he was glorifying himself with reckless self-indulgence, Saddam Hussein neglected the most basic necessities of the civilian infrastructure.

I look on any help we can extend to this intelligent, broadly educated and talented people partly as an act of generosity, in the well-established American tradition, but even more as an investment in creating an alternative to terror in the Middle East. Terrorism is not the answer. Liberty and solid progress for all will do far more to raise existing standards of living and future aspirations among the creative peoples of the Middle East.

The aid we give to Iraq now is an investment in what Franklin Delano Roosevelt called the Four Freedoms: freedom of speech and expression, freedom of worship, freedom from fear, and freedom from want. I strongly support such an investment.



The New York Times
Sunday, August 12, 2001
Stem Cell Science and the Preservation of Life
by George W. Bush

Yet the ethics of medicine are not infinitely adaptable. There is at least one bright line: We do not end some lives for the medical benefit of others. For me, this is a matter of conviction: a belief that life, including early life, is biologically human, genetically distinct and valuable. But one need not be pro-life to be disturbed by the prospect of fetal farming or cloning to provide spare human parts. Most Americans share a belief that human life should not be reduced to a tool or a means.

Stem cell research takes place on a slippery slope of moral concern where much biomedical research is and will be conducted. We must keep our ethical footing. Government has a clear duty to promote scientific discovery — and a duty to define certain boundaries.

My administration supports legislative efforts to prohibit the cloning of human beings for any purpose, and also to prohibit the production of human embryos solely to be destroyed in medical research.

As we enter the new territory of modern science, the choices will only grow more difficult. The new technologies we create -- with their potential to cure disease and relieve suffering -- may well define our age. But we will also be defined by the care and sense of self-restraint and responsibility with which we took up these new powers.

Power — even technological power — is always judged by its ends and its means. Seeking noble ends by any means is unacceptable when life itself is in the balance.

Remarks by the President at the Dedication of the Pope John Paul II Cultural Center March 22, 2001

We're responsible to stand for human dignity and religious freedom wherever they are denied, from Cuba to China to Southern Sudan. And we, in our country, must not ignore the words the Pope addresses to us. On his four pilgrimages to America, he has spoken with wisdom and feeling about our strengths and our flaws, our successes and our needs.

The Pope reminds us that while freedom defines our nation, responsibility must define our lives. He challenges us to live up to our aspirations, to be a fair and just society where all are welcomed, all are valued, and all are protected. And he is never more eloquent than when he speaks for a culture of life. The culture of life is a welcoming culture, never excluding, never dividing, never despairing and always affirming the goodness of life in all its seasons.

In the culture of life we must make room for the stranger. We must comfort the sick. We must care for the aged. We must welcome the immigrant. We must teach our children to be gentle with one another. We must defend in love the innocent child waiting to be born.

The center we dedicate today celebrates the Pope's message, its comfort and its challenge. This place stands for the dignity of the human person, the value of every life and the splendor of truth. And, above all, it stands, in the Pope's words, for the "joy of faith in a troubled world."

Remarks to the Nation on Stem Cell Research August 9, 2001

I also believe human life is a sacred gift from our Creator. I worry about a culture that devalues life, and believe as your President I have an important obligation to foster and encourage respect

for life in America and throughout the world. And while we're all hopeful about the potential of this research, no one can be certain that the science will live up to the hope it has generated.

Eight years ago, scientists believed fetal tissue research offered great hope for cures and treatments -- yet, the progress to date has not lived up to its initial expectations. Embryonic stem cell research offers both great promise and great peril. So I have decided we must proceed with great care.

As a result of private research, more than 60 genetically diverse stem cell lines already exist. They were created from embryos that have already been destroyed, and they have the ability to regenerate themselves indefinitely, creating ongoing opportunities for research. I have concluded that we should allow federal funds to be used for research on these existing stem cell lines, where the life and death decision has already been made.

Leading scientists tell me research on these 60 lines has great promise that could lead to breakthrough therapies and cures. This allows us to explore the promise and potential of stem cell research without crossing a fundamental moral line...

National Sanctity of Human Life Day, 2002 January 18, 2002

This Nation was founded upon the belief that every human being is endowed by our Creator with certain "unalienable rights." Chief among them is the right to life itself. The Signers of the Declaration of Independence pledged their own lives, fortunes, and honor to guarantee inalienable rights for all of the new country's citizens. These visionaries recognized that an essential human dignity attached to all persons by virtue of their very existence and not just to the strong, the independent, or the healthy. That value should apply to every American, including the elderly and the unprotected, the weak and the infirm, and even to the unwanted.

Thomas Jefferson wrote that, "[t]he care of human life and happiness and not their destruction is the first and only legitimate object of good government." President Jefferson was right. Life is an inalienable right, understood as given to each of us by our Creator.

President Jefferson's timeless principle obligates us to pursue a civil society that will democratically embrace its essential moral duties, including defending the elderly, strengthening the weak, protecting the defenseless, feeding the hungry, and caring for children -- born and unborn. Mindful of these and other obligations, we should join together in pursuit of a more compassionate society, rejecting the notion that some lives are less worthy of protection than others, whether because of age or illness, social circumstance or economic condition. Consistent with the core principles about which Thomas Jefferson wrote, and to which the Founders subscribed, we should peacefully commit ourselves to seeking a society that values life -- from its very beginnings to its natural end. Unborn children should be welcomed in life and protected in law.

President's Remarks to March for Life Participants January 22, 2002

Everyone there believes, as I do, that every life is valuable; that our society has a responsibility to defend the vulnerable and weak, the imperfect and even the unwanted; and that our nation should set a great goal that unborn children should be welcomed in life and protected in law.

Abortion is an issue that deeply divides our country. And we need to treat those with whom we disagree with respect and civility. We must overcome bitterness and rancor where we find it and seek common ground where we can. But we will continue to speak out on behalf of the most vulnerable members of our society.

We do so because we believe the promises of the Declaration of Independence are the common code of American life. They should apply to everyone, not just the healthy or the strong or the powerful. A generous society values all human life. A merciful society seeks to expand legal protection to every life, including early life. And a compassionate society will defend a simple, moral proposition, life should never be used as a tool, or a means to an end. These are bedrock principles...

Remarks by the President on Human Cloning Legislation April 10, 2002

Advances in biomedical technology must never come at the expense of human conscience. As we seek what is possible, we must always ask what is right, and we must not forget that even the most noble ends do not justify any means.

Science has set before us decisions of immense consequence. We can pursue medical research with a clear sense of moral purpose or we can travel without an ethical compass into a world we could live to regret. Science now presses forward the issue of human cloning. How we answer the question of human cloning will place us on one path or the other.

Our children are gifts to be loved and protected, not products to be designed and manufactured. Allowing cloning would be taking a significant step toward a society in which human beings are grown for spare body parts, and children are engineered to custom specifications; and that's not acceptable.

I believe all human cloning is wrong, and both forms of cloning ought to be banned, for the following reasons. First, anything other than a total ban on human cloning would be unethical. Research cloning would contradict the most fundamental principle of medical ethics, that no human life should be exploited or extinguished for the benefit of another.

Yet a law permitting research cloning, while forbidding the birth of a cloned child, would require the destruction of nascent human life.

This is a diverse coalition, united by a commitment to prevent the cloning and exploitation of human beings.

I know we can achieve great things. We can make the world more peaceful, we can become a more compassionate nation. We can push the limits of medical science. I truly believe that we're going to bring hope and healing to countless lives across the country. And as we do, I will insist that we always maintain the highest of ethical standards.

President Speaks at 30th Annual March for Life on the Mall January 22, 2003

And the March for Life upholds the self-evident truth of that Declaration -- that all are created equal, given the unalienable rights of life, and liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. And that principle of America needs defenders in every place and every generation.

In our time, respect for the right to life calls us to defend the sick and the dying, persons with disabilities and birth defects, and all who are weak and vulnerable. And this self-evident truth calls us to value and to protect the lives of innocent children waiting to be born.


