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## Building Up Community Colleges

Community colleges are a great, underutilized opportunity for us. They're a contrast with the mostly elite system of 4-year colleges. There are over a thousand community colleges in the United States. About 45 percent of all U.S. undergraduates and all freshmen are at community colleges – but you wouldn't know that from reading *The New York Times*. Community college graduates don't publish op eds in *The New York Times*, and they're more likely to read *USA Today*.

Community colleges are aimed at mainstream America. High schools aren't doing well right now, but colleges, including community colleges, are. We need to explore ways of shoring up and supporting community colleges, because this is one of our natural constituencies.

Community colleges are at the forefront – 60 percent of new nurses are educated at community colleges, and almost 80 percent of firefighters, police officers, and emergency medical technicians are credentialed at community colleges. Community colleges are a major source of vocational training.

The President has just awarded \$125 million to 70 community colleges in 40 states. But we could be doing a lot more. Without spending an additional penny, we could reorient some of the \$15 billion that we're spending on Federal job training towards community colleges. In fact, this would save money, because community colleges are more efficient than our job training programs.

This would strengthen community colleges. It would allow them to expand so they could offer more high-return classes such as nursing,

computer classes, other skilled trades. Right now all the nursing courses are full, because of limited capacity.

We could use community colleges for alternative education, to educate young people who have dropped out of high school. We spend \$2 billion for alternative education. We could expand community colleges to 4-year colleges, encompassing 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade as well as two additional years.

We could expand community colleges so they offer more high-return classes such as nursing, computer classes, other skilled trades. Right now all the nursing courses are full, because they're priced too low.

There's a whole jumble of Federal training programs that could evolve into community college training by giving dislocated workers vouchers. We have training for Trade Adjustment Assistance. We have the Workforce Investment Act Adult and Youth and Dislocated Worker Programs. We have the Wagner-Peyser Employment Service, the National Farm-worker Jobs Program, Job Corps, the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP). We have Vocational Rehabilitation and Vocational Education.

This would be a win win situation, and would build on the President's empowerment agenda. Community colleges would get more funding that's now going to mediocre trainers who are the buddies of state and local government. We'd be able to train more workers in the skilled trades and health support professions, closing some of the existing gaps. Most important, dislocated workers would get a wider choice of courses and a sense of empowerment, and we'd be building up a constituency that's in our camp to begin with.



There is growing sentiment among our citizens that the current Administration has forgotten the devastation caused by Hurricane Katrina. As a tax paying, voting American I am writing to express my concerns over the position, either implicit or explicit, that the Administration has taken with respect to this issue.

The correspondence with Allan Hubbard, Chairman, Gulf Coast Recovery and Rebuilding Council has been reported in the local news. The reports on this correspondence indicate that the federal government is providing disaster relief in other areas but will not include federal funding to Entergy New Orleans, the local utility company, because Entergy New Orleans is owned by Entergy Corporation, a large investor owned utility and has separate bond holders and shareholders that should bear the risk and results of Katrina. Without going into details about how each Entergy company effectively stands on its own for financing and rate purposes, it suffices to say that this is a very upsetting position for most of the residents of the city and state to hear. First, it seems totally inconsistent that the Administration would take this position for damage resulting from Katrina while Consolidated Edison and Verizon, both investor owned companies, were appropriated significant funds for assistance after September 11, to, among other things, restore the utility infrastructure damaged by, and for economic revitalization directly related to the 9/11 attack. This position is one that makes me shake my head in disbelief and one that makes me want to ensure that those elected or appointed officials that are in support of this total inconsistency in position will be vehemently opposed in future elections via my personal vote in each and every election in which I have the appropriate standing to vote. Electricity is of the most basic of needs and we need Entergy New Orleans to be able to meet that need for the metropolitan New Orleans area to recover.

The Administration is constantly having to support the amount of funds directed toward the war on terror and probably wonders why people question their strategy. The position taken on Katrina and then differing position after 9/11 is one prime example of what upsets Americans so much. It emphasizes the concern across the country that the Administration cares less about what is happening at home versus overseas. We can all appreciate that the war on terror has the intent of protecting us all from terrorists. But

this initiative and effort has to be balanced with real, current and significant needs of its citizens such as the devastation caused by Katrina. Most of the metropolitan New Orleans population has been displaced by the storm but if, and when they return, they will face extremely high utility bills as a result of the need for Entergy New Orleans to recover its prudently incurred costs. This issue will be a determining factor in how many people do indeed return to the city and whether Entergy New Orleans will be able to recover financially from Katrina. Entergy New Orleans' has experienced real and significant financial issues as evidenced by the recent filing of a Chapter 11 petition for bankruptcy. The citizens of the city and state are not supportive of municipalizing the utility because we believe that Entergy has done and would continue to do an amazing job of restoring power as a result of the storms – restoring approximately 1 million customers to service for those who could receive service in an incredible timeframe of less than 50 days. However it is very surprising to me that if the utility were a municipality it would be eligible for federal funds – although the financing and rate structure would be virtually identical if the utility were owned by the city of New Orleans versus Entergy. My personal opinion is that if the utility were run by the city, although the financial structure of the utility would likely be the same, that service and reliability would suffer greatly and the weary and bruised citizens of New Orleans and the surrounding areas do not need that right now.

New Orleans is a great city. Despite the scars of Katrina and the negative press of its citizens and its politics, it is a beautiful city. It has deep roots and history. The Louisiana Purchase opened exploration to what is now most of the United States. It would be a tragedy for the President to broadcast, from Jackson Square, one of the city's landmarks and the site of the celebration of the Louisiana Purchase, that the Administration would do whatever it takes to restore and rebuild the city, and for that promise to go unfulfilled. We are telling you what we need and asking and pleading for help. Entergy New Orleans met its obligations during Katrina – and Rita. We are proud of them and we need them and we are asking you to help them. And we, as voting Americans, will take note and hold you accountable in future elections for your actions.



## Senators Disagree On Medicare Woes

It is unacceptable that some of the poorest and sickest older people are having the most trouble getting prescription drugs through the new Medicare benefit, a leading GOP senator said.

But Sen. Charles E. Grassley of Iowa, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, does not see the need for legislative fixes yet. "Let's focus on the administrative remedies now because they will deliver help a lot faster than any legislation," he said.

Several Democratic senators said too many people have had trouble getting medicine since the benefit went into effect Jan.

Sen. John D. Rockefeller IV (D-W.Va.) took issue with Grassley's opinion that it was too early for Congress to intervene.

"It's always premature. It was premature that the Titanic went down. But it did indeed disappear," Rockefeller said.

The Democrats are sponsoring legislation that would require all prescription drug plans to provide new enrollees with at least 30 days of prescription drugs, provide federal reimbursement for states, pharmacies and beneficiaries for out-of-pocket costs because the new benefit has failed to cover those costs and reduce wait times on calls to the 800-MEDICARE line.

# Lawmaker Helped Save Fundraiser's Project

A high-ranking California Republican congressman preserved funding for a defense project critical to a New York investment company that had raised more than \$130,000 for him, according to a published report yesterday.

Rep. Jerry Lewis, who chairs the House Appropriations Committee, denied wrongdoing in response to the USA Today story. He said he had no knowledge of the connection between the investment firm Cerberus Capital Management and the \$3.8 billion project to build a secure computer network for the Navy and Marines until he heard about it from USA Today.

"It is absolutely and unequivocally false to suggest that any decision on funding for the Navy-Marine Corps intranet was in any way based on a lobbyist's request or as a favor to someone who was donating campaign funds," Lewis said.

"Neither I nor my staff have recommended aiding money to this program, all of the funding approved has been included in the president's budget at the request of the Navy," he said.

Lewis, 71, from Redlands, Calif., chaired the Appropriations Committee's subcommittee on defense in 2003, when the House Armed Services Committee voted to cut 10 percent from the 2004 budget for the Navy-Marine computer project.

The year before, the House Appropriations Committee had noted cost overruns and delays in the program.

Lewis himself was quoted in The Washington Post as saying that he was not satisfied with the project's progress. He also voiced concern about the involvement of MCI, which was a major subcontractor on the project but was involved in an account-

ing scandal that caused it to enter bankruptcy proceedings in 2002 when it was known as WorldCom.

But when the appropriations subcommittee passed its 2004 defense spending bill on June 16, 2003, money for the Navy-Marine Corps computer network was preserved.

Lewis said he changed his mind and backed the funding because the Navy said the program's management had improved. On June 26, the full Appropriations Committee also approved the funding.

By that time, Cerberus, a hedge fund that invests mainly in companies in or near bankruptcy, owned more than \$140 million in MCI WorldCom stock and bonds.

On July 7, Cerberus executives held a fundraiser for Lewis in New York.

Company officers, spouses and associates gave Lewis's political action committee, the Future Leaders PAC, nearly \$133,000 that night and in the following weeks.

Lewis said the Navy project was never discussed.

The day after the fundraiser, the House passed Lewis's defense spending bill that preserved funding for the Navy project. The money remained intact in the final House-Senate version of the spending bill that Lewis helped negotiate.

Lewis, meanwhile, was preparing his bid to become House Appropriations Committee chairman, a contest in which fundraising is key. Lewis's Future Leaders PAC gave \$407,000 to 69 House candidates in the 2004 election cycle. The Cerberus-related money was a third of that.

Lewis told USA Today that Cerberus's fundraising "played a very significant role" in the fact he won the post a year ago.
