If we need a vote, vote them down or vote them up, because the nominees probably have plans to make and there are families involved.' I think Senator Dole said it straight ahead. "So I hope we can work together for the good of, frankly, these people and their families and the criminal justice system. I don't think it does any good to have these judgeships vacant. ### Senator Richard Durbin (D-IL)

#### QUOTES:

"I stand here today and appeal to my colleagues, Democrats and Republicans, to consider seriously these two nominees and bring them up for consideration this week. Under the rules of the Senate, I can put a hold, incidentally, on people and a hold on bills. I can even do that in secret. That is what the Senate lets me do. In other words, they cannot move the person, they cannot move the bill, if this one Senator decides he does not want them to move it. I have not done that. I have never done that to an individual, and I don't want to start. I don't think it's fair. I hope I never reach the point where I have to use that strategy. I would much rather see us vote on these men and women on their merits. If they are worthy of appointment to the Federal bench, let us take the action and make sure it happens." (144 Cong. Rec. S 1815, 3/12/1998)

"I think, frankly, if we are going to assume some responsibility here, as we should, and impose responsibility on the executive branch, we should meet our responsibility. I think that responsibility requires us to act in a timely fashion on nominees sent before us. The reason I oppose cloture is I would like to see that the Senate shall also be held to the responsibility of acting in a timely fashion. If, after 150 days languishing in a committee there is no report on an individual, the name should come to the floor. If, after 150 days languishing on the Executive Calendar that name has not been called for a vote, it should be. Vote the person up or down. They are qualified or they are not.

But to impose all of the burden on the executive branch and to step away from our responsibility I don't think is fair. It doesn't engage the symmetry, which I think is important." (144 Cong. Rec. S 11021, 9/28/1998)

"Let me also add here that I could go into detail, but I will not because I know it is the intent of the Chair to move this matter to a vote very quickly. I also want to comment for a moment on the period of time that this very able nominee has waited for confirmation. It is unfortunate. In fact, it is sad, and it borders on tragic, that men and women who are prepared to give their lives to public service, who have gone through a withering process of investigation, by the FBI, by the Judiciary Committee, by the White House, by the American Bar Association, and so many others, still must wait over a year, in many cases, for their nominations to be considered by the Judiciary Committee and by this Chamber." "The people of Illinois and the parties to federal criminal and civil court cases deserve a fully-functioning legal system that does not delay justice," Senator Moseley-Braun said. "I continue to be disturbed by the slow pace of the Republican leadership in the Senate to fulfill its Constitutional responsibility to act on the President's nominations," Senator Durbin said. (Congressional Press Release, 5/7/1998)

Senators Carol Moseley-Braun and Dick Durbin, both Democrats, called on the Judiciary Committee and the Senate to move more quickly to fill judicial vacancies, according to a press release announcing the merit selection process for Mills' post. "The administration of justice has been hobbled by the Senate Judiciary Committee," Moseley-Braun said in the release. Its intentional foot-dragging on the confirmation process is an odious strategy to keep President Clinton's qualified nominees off the bench."

"The breakdown of the judicial appointment process does a disservice to the American people and nominees alike," Durbin said in the release. (Chicago Daily Law Bulletin, 10/23/1997)

"I submit that this debate is not just about numbers. It is about the administration of justice; the fair, prompt, equitable, and thorough administration of justice is at stake. In all fairness, I must confess that I would rather err on the side of too many judges than too few. I would rather have too many judges doing too thorough and too thoughtful a job than too few judges rushed and careless in frantic efforts to handle their caseload. No one but the most shortsighted argues that the D.C. circuit does not need this 11th judge. Indeed, last year when the debate turned on whether a 12th judge was needed,

~~the Reagan-appointed Judge Silberman was often cited in support of the effort to cut that 12th seat. However, he recently wrote to the Judiciary Committee and said, 'I still believe we should have 11 active judges.' So why are we arguing about this 11th seat today?" (143 Cong. Rec. "When the Senate fails to do its work and confirm judges, the hardship is imposed on ordinary people in America and they are puzzled: "Well, why is this the case? Why does it take so long for me to get my day in court?" Is justice delayed truly justice denied? In many cases, it is. In this situation, unfortunately, the burden is on us, those men and women who sit in this Chamber and have the singular responsibility to confirm Federal judges." (144 Cong. Rec. S 1919, 3/13/1998)

"Some in Congress say some of the nominees aren't of sufficient caliber for the federal judiciary. If they aren't qualified, put it before the Senate and let's debate it. The longer we wait in filling these positions, the longer the backup is." (The State Journal-Register (Springfield, IL), 10/14/1997)

"Promptly filling the judicial vacancies you refer to is not just a matter of giving Clinton his due. It is an urgent question of giving the American public its due—a justice system that they can respect and count on. The longer we delay filling judgeships, the larger the civil case backlog grows.

It is no exaggeration to say that judges are the keystone of our justice system. When there are too few judges, our justice system slows down, makes mistakes and reaches a crisis. And there is evidence that our system is indeed approaching a crisis. Many senators are dragging their feet, claiming that they are not opposed to judges just 'bad judges.' If that is so, then let us have hearings on these so-called 'bad judges' that President Clinton is trying to appoint. Let us debate their merits on the floor of the Senate.

The time has come to give the American people their due—a criminal and civil justice system that works. That means confirming judges, the people who make the system work, sooner rather than later, and keeping politics out of the judiciary." (Chicago Tribune, 3/14/1997)

"But now, after almost four years of unprecedented attacks on the federal judiciary, the story has changed. When another judge was needed in central Illinois in the fall of 1997, only eight people applied for the job. I can only guess why people declined to apply. But a dispassionate look at the situation would give anyone pause. We are facing a nationwide crisis. Our judicial system is being slowly but surely

strangled. Vacancies in the judiciary are not being filled promptly, as judges are being confirmed at the slowest rate in recent memory. People who are being nominated to fill these positions are being put through a brutal hazing ritual known as Senate confirmation. And those who do get confirmed are seeing their records distorted, are being threatened with impeachment and are seeing their salaries eroded. Every American pays a price for this.

But the American people need to see the forest for the trees. Decisions that citizens occasionally disagree with are a small price to pay for a strong, healthy and independent judiciary. We must not let our disagreements with individual decisions drive us to scuttle the very justice system that we claim to respect so much." (*Insight on the News*, 3/2/1998)

"These two gentlemen, Mr. Murphy and Judge McCuskey, were nominated by President Clinton on July 31, 1997. They were unanimously recommended by the Judiciary Committee on November 6 of the same year. They have been sitting on this calendar for 127 days with absolutely no one raising questions as to their qualifications for the job.

What happens to a person who finds himself in this predicament? I have talked to many of them. Their lives are changed. The prospect of being appointed to the Federal bench makes life difficult on a professional and personal basis.

Judge McCuskey has a family. He is trying to find a place for his family to live. Think about buying a home and not knowing when you can move into it, and then the fear that if you move too soon, you will disqualify yourself from your previous judgeship. That is what he is facing. His family is going through a lot of turmoil this week because they had thought surely within 100 days the U.S. Senate would act on this nomination, but it has not happened.

Mr. Murphy is in the private practice of law. We have spoken from time to time. He has important cases representing people from his part of Illinois, and people are wondering: "Pat Murphy, are you going to be around? Can we count on you? Will you take this case to trial? Should we bring business to your office?"

All of these things weigh heavy on a person who has decided to make this commitment to move forward and ask to be appointed to the Federal bench. I hope that Members of the Senate, those who will read my remarks and those who hear them, will understand that this type of thing is more than an inconvenience. It is a hardship that we should not impose on two people for whom there is no controversy." (144 Cong. Rec. S 1919, 3/13/1998)

## CASE SCREENING

### **HOW DO CASES GET TO THE COURT?**

A discussion of the court's screening practices and procedures is found in the Internal Operating Procedures (IOP) following 5TH CIR. R. 34.

Cases with obvious jurisdictional deficiencies are not briefed, and we do not request the full record on appeal from the district court. Instead, after review by an attorney in the clerk's office, the cases are prepared for decision by our monthly jurisdictional review panel, discussed infra.

Cases which are briefed are either "screened" through the staff attorney's office or sent directly to an "initiating" screening judge. When we receive the briefs and the original record on appeal, we send the case on for screening. All direct criminal cases and prisoner cases - the majority of our docket - are sent to the staff attorney for review, preparation of a legal analysis of the appeal, and a recommendation whether the case merits oral argument, or should be decided on the "summary" calendar. We send direct criminal appeals as soon as we have the record on appeal and the appellant's and appellee's briefs, without waiting for a reply brief. If a reply brief is filed later, we send it to the staff attorney immediately. In civil cases, we wait until a reply brief is filed, or the time to file has expired and then send the case to the staff attorney.

A small number of cases are screened directly to an initiating judge, e.g., NLRB, private civil diversity, tax, bankruptcy, etc.

**Staff Attorney Screening** The staff attorney reviews the cases we send and generally designates them as "Class I" through "Class IV":

Class I cases are so lacking in merit they are deemed frivolous and subject to affirmance or dismissal under FED. R. APP. P. 34(a)(1) and 5TH CIR. R. 42.2 and 47.6;

Class II cases constitute the court's summary calendar. This class of cases includes cases where counsel has waived argument. In general, Class II cases have a limited number of issues and the dispositive issue(s) recently have been decided, or the facts and legal arguments are presented adequately in the briefs and the record on appeal. Many Class II cases are decided at the Conference Calendar, see pp. 75-76.

Classes III and IV cases represent the court's oral argument calendars and present difficult or new issues for the court to decide. Class III cases are given

20 minutes per side for argument; Class IV cases receive 30 minutes per side and represent the most complex cases involving major legal questions.

Once the staff attorney completes review on the case, he sends to the clerk the briefs, record on appeal, and recommendations on the merits of the case, and any pending motions. The staff attorney may also select cases with two or three issues, easy facts and a limited record, for decision on the "conference calendar," discussed in the Decision and Opinions Section, infra, without further screening. When we receive cases requiring submission to the court from the staff attorney, we send them in rotation to the next "screening panel" selected from our log. Screening panel assignments are made effective July 1st of each year and the three judges assigned to that panel sit together for one year. Within each panel, we rotate "initiating" judge assignments, so each judge has an equal opportunity to act as the first, second and third reviewer on the case.

When the initiating judge receives the appeal, his or her first task is to determine whether the case is properly classified. If the initiating judge agrees with a Class I or Class II recommendation, the case will be decided on the "summary calendar" without argument. The judge then normally has 45 days in civil cases and 31 days in criminal cases to draft an opinion and to send it on to the second judge on the panel. That judge can agree both with the proposed disposition and with the opinion, or can send the case to the oral argument calendar. If the second judge agrees that a Class I or II disposition is proper, he or she then sends the case on to the third panel member. That judge can agree with the disposition, or can send the case to the oral argument calendar. The important thing to remember is that it takes all three judges' agreement to decide the case on the summary calendar.

Cases which the staff attorney classifies as Class III or Class IV and recommends for oral argument are sent to an initiating judge on a screening panel for approval of the recommendation, except for direct criminal cases which are sent to the oral argument calendar on the staff attorney's recommendation alone. If the judge concurs argument is needed, the case is returned to the clerk's office for assignment of the case to the next available oral argument calendar. If the initiating judge disagrees with the recommendation for oral argument, the judge's screening panel will decide the case without oral argument if all three panel members agree.

**Judge Screening.** Cases sent directly to the judges' chambers for screening are classified and handled in a similar manner to cases sent via the staff attorney.

## **ORAL ARGUMENT**

### **WHAT ARE THE CHANCES I WILL GET ORAL ARGUMENT?**

# *From 1997 Annual Report*

The Court of Appeals, the legal community, and the nation suffered a grievous loss when retired Judge Spottswood W. Robinson III passed away on October 11, 1998. Judge Robinson was appointed to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia in 1964 and to the Court of Appeals in 1966, where he served with distinction until 1991, serving as Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals from 1981 to 1986. A memorial ceremony was held at the court on May 12, 1999, to celebrate Judge Robinson's life and work. Emceed by Karen Hastie Williams, a former Robinson law clerk, the speakers included Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Professors Stephen L. Carter and Susan Low Bloch (both former law clerks as well), and the Chief Judges of the Court of Appeals and District Court. The many and varied guests were a testament to the depth and breadth of Judge Robinson's legacy.

At the start of the 2000-2001 term, the Court of Appeals will include ten active judges (Chief Judge Edwards, Judge Silberman, Judge Williams, Judge Ginsburg, Judge Sentelle, Judge Henderson, Judge Randolph, Judge Rogers, Judge Tatel, and Judge Garland) and no senior judges. Judge Silberman will be eligible for senior status in October 2000. Should Judge Silberman elect to leave active status and if no new appointments are confirmed by the Senate, the court will be at its lowest number of full-time judges, nine, since 1989, when there were nine active judges on the court for a brief period of two months.

In recent years, the judicial branch has faced heightened scrutiny in Congress. One recurring issue has focused on judicial appointments, with some members of the Senate questioning whether and to what extent new judges should be appointed to the various circuit courts. Traditionally, in order to support requests for new judgeship positions, the United States Judicial Conference has employed a simple formula that measures judgeship needs by reference to the numbers of cases filed in a circuit. The formula has never made much sense when applied to the D.C. Circuit, because the court's caseload, which is heavily laden with large administrative appeals, is so unlike other circuits. In an effort to address this problem, the Judicial Conference directed the Federal Judicial Center to conduct a study of the D.C. Circuit's caseload to determine factors in the court's work that could be used to establish guidelines for the assessment of judgeship needs.

The results of the FJC study were interesting, but not surprising. It is well known that the D.C. Circuit hears an unusually large number of administrative cases – in 1997, for example, administrative appeals accounted for 46.3% of the D.C. Circuit's caseload, while the proportion in other circuits ranged from 14.5% in the Ninth Circuit to 3.7% in the Eighth Circuit. The study was illuminating, however, in showing that more than 70% of the D.C. Circuit's agency cases came from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), and Federal Communications Commission (FCC). The cases from these three agencies (as compared with other agency cases) tend to involve the weightiest records and the most complex and technically difficult issues. The proportion of agency cases from the EPA, FERC, and FCC in the circuits with the next heaviest agency caseloads was 1% in the Ninth Circuit, 7% in the Second Circuit, and 2% in the Fourth Circuit. By contrast, in the Ninth Circuit, which had the second highest agency caseload, 92% of the agency cases came from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), Internal Revenue Service (IRS), and Benefits Review Board (BRB) – typically straightforward cases that involve well-developed bodies of law, few parties, and largely factual disputes.

The FJC study thus concluded that, not only do other circuits hear fewer agency cases than are heard in the D.C. Circuit, but that the agency cases heard in other circuits generally are not the difficult agency cases that are a staple in the D.C. Circuit. In addition, it was determined that the D.C. Circuit hears far fewer criminal and diversity cases than are heard in other circuits. This is significant because these cases generally tend to require fewer judicial resources than most other cases. Finally, the FJC report confirmed that the

D.C. Circuit hears an unusually large number of high-profile cases presenting difficult issues of national import. Based on these findings, the FJC's report to the Judicial Conference suggested that any filing-based formula for judgeship needs should include an adjustment for the D.C. Circuit to take account of the court's unique case mix.

Another major project that was recently concluded was the publication of a *Chief Judge's Manual*. The *Manual*, which is an internal working document, comprehensively details the policies and practices governing court operations and the Chief Judge's duties. For the first time, we have created a single document that captures both formal and informal management policies and practices at the court. The *Manual* should serve as a useful resource for Chief Judges and court managers in the years ahead.

The largest project for the court in the immediate future will be the construction of the "annex" to the E. Barrett Prettyman United States Courthouse, including renovation of the existing building. Architect Michael Graves has produced an extraordinary design that will meet the functional needs of the courts while complementing the existing architecture on Pennsylvania and Constitution Avenues. If Congress approves the necessary appropriations, construction will commence in January 2001. Funds for construction remain an issue, however. In any event, it is anticipated that construction of the annex will take approximately three years and that renovation of the existing building will take an additional three years.

The annex will be a stunning marker of justice in our Nation's Capital. It will be a constant reminder to the judges and staff, and to the lawyers and litigants who we serve, of the important role of our courts over the past 200 years of American history. The timely commencement of the annex construction would lend great tribute and dignity to the courts' bicentennial celebration in 2001.

One example of the D.C. Circuit's unique jurisdiction is given above, and others appear below. This list is not exhaustive, but some of the more important examples are shown:

1. The United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit is where a party must go to claim that agency regulations did not conform with certain "sunshine" requirements of the Administrative Procedures Act. 5 U.S.C.A. §552b(g).

2. An organization designated as a "foreign terrorist organization" may seek judicial review of such designation only in the D.C. Circuit. 8 U.S.C.A. §1189(b)(1).

3. Most rules "of general and national applicability" promulgated by the Federal Energy Administration can be reviewed only in the D.C. Circuit. 15 U.S.C.A. §766.

4. A constitutional challenge to the North American Free Trade Implementation Act or the United States-Canada Free Trade Agreement Implementation Act can be brought only in the D.C. Circuit. 19 U.S.C.A. §1516a(g)(4)(A).

5. Determinations of the Federal Election Commission as to which presidential candidates are eligible for Federal dollars to run their campaigns are reviewable only at the D.C. Circuit. 26 U.S.C.A. §9011(a) and §9041(a).

6. Only the D.C. Circuit is authorized to review certain decisions made by the Administrator of EPA under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA).  
42 U.S.C.A. §6976(a)(1).

7. Judicial review of air quality standards, emission standards, and related matters that are promulgated by the Administrator of EPA under the Clean Air Act must be obtained in the D.C. Circuit. 42 U.S.C.A. §7607(b)(1).

8. Only the D.C. Circuit is authorized to review regulations promulgated under CERCLA (the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980).  
42 U.S.C.A. §9613(a).

9. When the Secretary of the Interior makes determinations regarding offshore plans for exploration, development, or production of oil or gas sites, those determinations are reviewable only at the D.C. Circuit. 43 U.S.C.A. §1349(c).

10. Certain decisions of the Federal Communications Commission are appealable only to the D.C. Circuit. 47 U.S.C.A. §402(b).

Miguel Estrada and John Roberts will be outstanding additions to the D.C. Circuit, the "second most important court in the land" – and it is time to confirm them.

## **Why Brown's Nomination Especially Matters to the D.C. Circuit.**

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit is widely regarded as the second most important court in America, behind only the U.S. Supreme Court. This is due to its location in the nation's capital, where all three branches of government and most federal agencies are located, and because of the national jurisdiction bestowed upon the court by Congress.

The D.C. Circuit is the administrative law court. It is the court that most closely oversees the actions of federal agencies — national safeguards adopted under the Clean Air Act by the Environmental Protection Agency; orders of the Federal Communications Commission; unfair labor practice decisions by the National Labor Relations Board; worker safety protections issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, and much more. And because the U.S. Supreme Court grants review in so few cases, the D.C. Circuit is typically the last word on these important cases.

A review of one month's decisions by the D.C. Circuit reveals the breadth, importance, and impact of the court's work to the lives of millions of Americans.

### ***CSX Transportation, Inc. vs. Anthony A. Williams, Mayor of the District of Columbia*, No. 05-5131 (5/03/2005)**

Case involved a District of Columbia law that forbid trains carrying toxic substances from traveling within 2.2 miles of the District.

### ***American Library Association vs. FCC*, No. 04-1037 (5/06/2005)**

The American Library Association challenged FCC's authority to issue a rule that required all receivers of digital television signals to be equipped with anti-redistribution equipment.

### ***Covad Communications Company vs. Bell Atlantic Corporation*, No. 02-7057 (5/6/05)**

Antitrust lawsuit claiming that Atlantic Bell violated the Sherman Act by refusing to deal with its rivals.

### ***John F. Kreis vs. Secretary of the Air Force*, No. 04-5197 (5/06/2005)**

Case involved the Air Force's refusal to give a Naval officer a retroactive promotion.

### ***In Re: Madison Guaranty Savings & Loan*, No. 94-0001 (5/06/2005)**

Request for attorneys' fees under the Independent Counsel laws. The person making the request was a junior White House staffer who helped write a memo terminating several staff in the Travel Office.

*Lucy Murray vs. David Gilmore*, No. 04-7027 (5/06/2005)  
Title VII claim alleging race and sex discrimination.

*Wal-Mart Stores Inc. vs. Secretary of the Department of Labor*, No. 04-1127  
(5/10/2005)

Case involved enforcement of an OSHA safety citation against Wal-Mart over a conveyor belt blocking an emergency exit in an Alabama retail store.

*American Chemistry Council vs. Michael Leavitt, Administrator of the EPA*,  
No. 04-5189 (5/10/2005)

Industry challenge to EPA's classification of an ozone-causing chemical as a "toxic chemical."

*In Re Cheney*, No. 02-5354 (5/10/2005)

Action by the Sierra Club and Judicial Watch seeking disclosure of documents regarding an energy advisory committee chaired by Vice President Cheney. The groups sought to uncover the identity and influence of energy interest groups during the formulation of President Bush's energy policy.

*SBC Communication Inc. vs. FCC*, No. 03-1147 (5/13/2005)

Lawsuit by SBC challenging a ruling that it violated a term its merger with Ameritech.

*Electricity Consumers Resource Council vs. FERC*, No. 03-1449 (5/13/2005)

Case concerned the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's approval of New York's new rate design that was designed to prevent shortages at peak times. The Electricity Consumers Resource Council argued that the plan would adversely affect energy costs for large industrial consumers.

*Marian Wagener vs. SBC Pension Benefit Plan*, No. 04-7060 (5/17/2005)

Two SBC retirees brought suit under ERISA against the SBC Pension plan to recover retirement benefits that they claimed they were owed.

*Diane George vs. Michael Leavitt, Administrator of the EPA*, No. 03-5356  
(5/17/2005)

Appeal of the dismissal of a Title 7 discrimination claim.

*Xcel Energy Services Inc. vs. FERC*, No. 04-1182 (5/17/2005)

A Minnesota power utility challenged federal energy regulations regarding renewable energy credits intended to spur clean energy.

*Rosita S. Javier vs. Commissioner of Social Security*, No. 03-5153 (5/20/2005)

Case involving the Social Security Administration's termination of survivor benefits to a widow and children after a paternity test revealed that the children

were not biologically related to the deceased (although the deceased had formally adopted the children).

***Luck Music Library vs. Alberto Gonzales, Attorney General of the U.S.***, No. 04-5240 (5/24/2005)

Case involved copyright protections for foreign musicians who failed to comply with U.S. copyright formalities.

***International Union, United Mine Workers vs. MSHA***, No. 04-1164 (5/24/2005)

Challenge by the United Mine Workers Union to mine ventilation regulations issued by the Secretary of Labor that the Union said illegally weakened existing safety protections in mines.

***Linda Roebuck vs. Odie Washington***, No. 04-7063 (5/24/2005)

Title VII complaint alleging sex discrimination by the DC Department of Corrections.

***Government of Rwanda vs. Robert W. Johnson***, No. 04-7044 (5/27/2005)

During the Rwandan genocide of 1994, Washington lobbyists agreed that, in exchange for \$80,000 from the Rwandan Hutu government, they would portray the Tutsi minority as rebel terrorists in order to gain favorable relations with the U.S. government. Two days after the lobbyists accepted payment, the U.S. government ordered the Rwandan embassy closed down and all diplomatic relations with the Hutu government ceased. After a new Rwandan government gained control, it sued the lobbyists to recover sums that it claimed were not ever put to use.

***Lawrence Maxwell vs. John Snow, Secretary of the Department of the Treasury***, No. 04-5082 (5/27/2005)

A group of over 500 taxpayers sued the IRS to force production of documents relating to their individual income tax returns.

***Venetian Casino vs. EEOC***, No. 04-5098 (5/27/2005)

Case involved subpoenas issued by the EEOC to Venetian Casino for the production of documents relating to a discrimination claim. Venetian brought an action challenging EEOC's subpoenas and an alleged EEOC disclosure policy that Venetian feared would expose its trade secrets.

***Palace Sports Entertainment vs. NLRB***, No. 04-1261 (5/31/2005)

Case involved the enforcement of an NLRB order to reinstate and award back pay to an employee disciplined and fired for supporting a union at his workplace.

***AFL-CIO vs. Elaine L. Chao, Secretary of the Department of Labor***, No. 04-5057 (5/31/2005)

Union challenge to rules issued by the Secretary of Labor requiring unions to file itemized reports of ordinary receipts and expenditures. The AFL-CIO challenged

the Secretary's authority to issue these new reporting requirements.

***In Re: Madison Guaranty Savings & Loan*, No. 94-0001 (5/31/2005)**

Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr subpoenaed a Navy chief petty officer assigned to the White House during Clinton's presidency. The Independent Counsel then informed the Naval officer that he was under investigation for perjury. The officer hired a lawyer to defend his interests and brought this claim for recovering attorney fees under the Independent Counsel laws.

***Program Suppliers vs. Librarian of Congress*, No. 04-1070 (5/31/2005)**

PBS and others brought a claim alleging bias in the Librarian of Congress' distribution of royalty payments and claiming that the distribution methodology adversely affected public television providers.

***Brooklyn Union Gas Company vs. FERC*, No. 04-1079 (5/31/2005)**

A natural gas company challenged FERC's ruling over a newly merged gas pipeline company's proposed rate structure.

***Spirit of the Sage Council vs. Gale Norton, Secretary of the Department of the Interior*, No. 03-5345 (5/31/2005)**

Procedural challenge by wildlife protection groups to two rules issued under the Endangered Species Act.


## The DC Circuit's Eleventh Seat

The US Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit technically has 12 seats allotted to it. For years, however, the 11th and 12th seats have remained empty. During the Clinton administration, Senate Republicans adamantly opposed filling them, blocking the nominations of distinguished lawyers Allen Snyder and Elena Kagan (now dean of Harvard Law School) on the grounds that the DC Circuit's relatively light caseload did not warrant it. Although the court's caseload has not increased, President Bush last week nominated Peter Keisler to fill the 11th seat. (Brett Kavanaugh, recently confirmed, took the 10th.) Mr. Keisler's name was floated during President Bush's first term for a Maryland-designated seat on the Fourth Circuit, but Maryland Senators Paul Sarbanes and Barbara Mikulski objected -- successfully -- because Mr. Keisler, currently head of the Justice Department's Civil Division, had never practiced law in Maryland.

It will be interesting to see whether Senate Republicans hum a different tune on the DC Circuit when considering the nomination of Mr. Keisler, one of the founding members of the Federalist Society. When the year was 1997 and the nominating President was Clinton, here's what they had to say about -- and against -- filling the 11th seat on the second most important court in the country:

- Senator Grassley (R-IA): "confidently conclude[d] that the D.C. Circuit does not need 12 or even 11 judges . . . At most, the D.C. Circuit is entitled to a maximum of 10 judges."
- Senator Kyl (R-AZ): "I plan to vote against filling [the 11th seat] and, of course, the 12th seat unless there is a significant increase in caseload or some other extraordinary circumstance."
- Senator Sessions (R-AL): "an idle mind is the devil's workshop . . . I think it would be very unwise for us to fill a vacancy if there is any possibility that the caseload will continue to decline."
- Senator Lott (R-MS): the D.C. Circuit "is more than adequately staffed . . . They have more judges than they need."

any different views reached after subsequent study of the case. The opinion will set forth the reasons supporting the court's decision.

**5.5.2 Circulation Within Panel.** After the draft opinion has been prepared, the authoring judge circulates it to the other two members of the panel with a request for approval or suggestions they may desire to make with respect to the draft opinion. Answering this request is given the highest priority by the other two judges, who shall communicate in writing their approval or disapproval within eight (8) days of receipt of the opinion. Absent a request for additional time, failure to respond within that time period shall be deemed an approval of the opinion as drafted. Because it is the opinion of the court, other members of the panel are free to make any suggestions relating to the modification of, addition to, or subtraction from the proposed text. Where a textual revision or addition is suggested, the suggesting judge submits his or her modification in specific language capable of being inserted into the opinion. When one of the other two judges approves, it becomes the proposed opinion of the court. Should the other panel members disagree with the author's draft, the opinion is reassigned by either the presiding judge or the ranking judge in active service who is a member of the panel's majority.

**5.5.3 Time Schedule for Panel Drafting and Circulating Opinions; Reassignments.**

- (a) 60-day period for draft opinion writing. It is the aspirational goal of the court that, except in complex cases, the authoring judge transmits to the panel a draft opinion within sixty (60) days after assignment or after close of any supplemental briefing or other factors suspending the drafting process.
- (b) 45-day period to file concurring or dissenting opinion. If, after a second panel member approves the draft opinion, the third panel member desires to separately concur or dissent, the judge not joining in the opinion notifies the author promptly and transmits his or her separate opinion to the panel within forty-five (45) days after the second judge's approval is received. Panel opinions are not considered to be completed until each member has an opportunity to revise his or her opinion in response to those of other panel members.

**5.5.4 To Non-panel Active Judges.**

Drafts of unanimous non precedential opinions do not circulate to non-panel judges. Drafts of precedential opinions and non precedential opinions that are not unanimous are circulated to all active judges of the court after the draft

#### IV APPOINTMENT OF COUNSEL

1. Counsel furnishing representation under the Plan shall be selected from a panel of attorneys designated or approved by the Court, or from a bar association, legal aid agency, or defender organization furnishing representation pursuant to the Plan. When the Court determines that the appointment of an attorney who is not a member of the panel is in the interest of justice, judicial economy, or continuity of representation, or there is some other exceptional circumstance warranting his or her appointment, the attorney may be admitted to the panel and appointed to represent the individual. Agreeable with the directives of the Judicial Conference of the United States, at least 25% of all such appointments shall be assigned to members of the private bar. Such order of appointment of counsel may be entered by the current motion judge or by any active member of the Court.
2. In all cases on appeal where the defendant was represented in the district court by court-appointed counsel, such counsel shall continue to represent the defendant on appeal, unless and until relieved by order of this Court. The Court may, in appropriate cases, designate such counsel to continue on appeal.
3. At the time such appeals are docketed in this Court, the Clerk shall notify defendant's court appointed trial counsel that he shall continue such representation of defendant in this Court unless and until relieved by order of this Court, and shall request such trial counsel to advise the Court whether he desires to continue such representation throughout the appeal.
4. In appeals under the Act involving more than one defendant, if the Court finds the need, because of conflicting interests of certain defendants or where circumstances otherwise warrant, separate counsel may be appointed for any one or more of the defendants as may be required for their adequate representation.
5. The Court may, in its discretion, at any stage of the proceedings on appeal, substitute one appointed attorney for another.
6. If, at any stage of the proceedings on appeal, the Court finds the defendant is financially unable to pay counsel whom he has retained, the Court may appoint counsel as provided in subsection (b) of the Act and authorize payment as provided in subsection (d) of the Act and the *CJA Guidelines*, pursuant to subsection (c) of the Act.
7. ~~More than one attorney may be appointed in any case determined by the Court to be extremely difficult. In a capital case, at least two attorneys should be appointed. Except as provided by section 848(q)(7) of title 21, U.S.C., at least one attorney appointed in a capital case shall meet the experience qualifications required by section 848(q)(6) of title 21, U.S.C. Pursuant to section 848(q)(7), the presiding judicial officer, for good cause, may appoint an attorney who may not qualify under section 848(q)(6), but who has the background, knowledge, and experience necessary to represent the defendant properly in a capital case, giving due consideration to the seriousness of the possible penalty and to the unique and complex nature of the litigation.~~

8. The selection of counsel to represent any person under the Act shall remain the sole and exclusive responsibility of the Court.

- B. Hotels: Many hotels will offer CJA-appointed attorneys government rates for their travel in connection with their representation under the Act. The clerk's office will supply a list of hotels offering government rates to CJA-appointed attorneys. Attorneys are encouraged to avail themselves of reduced-government rates whenever possible.
- C. Submission of Vouchers - CJA Form 20: Vouchers must be submitted to the clerk's office within 45 days after the mandate has been issued at the close of the case. Interim vouchers are rarely allowed. Vouchers submitted after the 45 days should be accompanied with a letter explaining the delay. Time should be reported only in tenths of an hour. Receipts are required for reimbursable expenses and all services provided out of the attorney's office. For example, a receipt is required for copies made at a commercial vendor, whereas a receipt is not required for copies made in-house. See the CJA Form 20 instructions for details. The hourly compensation rate for in-court services is \$70 per hour and for out-of-court services is \$50 per hour. The statutory maximum compensation for appeals of criminal convictions is \$2,500 per representation. The statutory maximum for other criminal matters, including appeals of denials of habeas petitions, and federal motions to vacate (28 U.S.C. § 2255) is \$750. These amounts do not include reimbursable expenses and travel expenses. Claims for compensation in excess of the statutory maximum must be accompanied by a statement why the case involved extended or complex representation. The court will use the following criteria for determining whether a case is extended or complex: the responsibilities involved as measured by the magnitude and importance of the case; the manner in which the duties were performed; the knowledge, skill, efficiency, professionalism and judgment used by counsel; the nature of

If a case is selected for a settlement conference, counsel shall be notified, by order entered within 35 days of the docketing of the appeal or petition, of the date and time of the conference and whether the conference will be in-person or by telephone. The initial conference normally shall be held within 56 days of the docketing of the appeal. A case is presumed released from the Conference Program if an order scheduling a settlement conference has not been entered within 56 days of the docketing of the appeal or petition.

Requests by counsel for a settlement conference will be accommodated whenever possible. Parties may request conferences confidentially, either by telephone or by letter directed to the chief circuit court mediator.

The briefing schedule established by the Clerk's office at the time the appeal is docketed remains in effect unless adjusted by a court mediator to facilitate settlement, or by the Clerk's office pursuant to Circuit Rule 31-2.2.

Counsel should discuss settlement with their principals prior to a conference scheduled under this rule and attend the conference with authority to settle.

(b) **Appeal Case Management Conference.** In any case the court may direct either sua sponte or upon request of a party that a telephone or in-person case management conference be held before an appellate commissioner, a senior staff member in the Clerk's office, or a staff attorney. The purpose of a case management conference is to manage the appeal effectively and develop a briefing plan for complex appeals. If a case is selected for a case management conference, counsel shall be notified by order of the date and time of the conference. Case-management conferences are held only in exceptional circumstances, such as complex cases involving numerous separately represented litigants or extensive district court/agency proceedings? (Rev. 1/97)

(c) **Binding Determinations by Appellate Commissioner.** In the context of a settlement or mediation in a civil appeal, the parties may stipulate to having one or more issues in their appeal referred for a binding determination by an Appellate Commissioner. Where the parties enter into such a stipulation, the matter may be handled with abbreviated and accelerated briefing and a guaranteed opportunity for in-person or telephonic oral argument before the Appellate Commissioner. The Appellate Commissioner will issue a determination and, if requested, a written statement of reasons. The determination will have no precedential effect and will be final and nonreviewable. Cases will ordinarily be referred to the Appellate Commissioner through the court's mediation program. In some instances, the court's pro se unit may also alert parties to the availability of this program. For further information, please contact the Circuit Mediation Office at (415) 556-9900. ## FRAP 34

### ORAL ARGUMENT

#### (a) In General.

(1) **Party's Statement.** Any party may file, or a court may require by local rule, a statement explaining why oral argument should, or need not, be permitted.

(2) **Standards.** Oral argument must be allowed in every case unless a panel of three judges who have examined the briefs and record unanimously agrees that oral argument is unnecessary for any of the following reasons:

- (A) the appeal is frivolous;
- (B) the dispositive issue or issues have been authoritatively decided; or
- (C) the facts and legal arguments are adequately presented in the briefs and record, and the decisional

- (a) identify the litigation by caption, number, and court;
  - (b) describe the action taken in the other litigation on a request for continuance or deferment;
  - (c) state reasons why the other litigation should receive priority over the case in which the motion is filed;
  - (d) state reasons why other associated counsel cannot prepare the brief for timely filing or relieve movant's counsel of the other litigation; and
  - (e) recite any other relevant circumstances;
- (2) the case is so complex that an adequate brief cannot reasonably be prepared by the due date, in which case the motion must state facts demonstrating the complexity; and
- (3) counsel will suffer extreme hardship, in which case the motion must state the nature of the hardship.
- (E) **Criminal cases.** A motion to extend time to file a brief in a criminal case must also state the custody status of the defendant.
- (F) **Time to file.** A motion to extend time to file a brief must be filed at least 5 days before the brief's due date, unless the reasons for the request did not exist or were unknown earlier.

## 27.5 Orders.

- (A) **Panel judge.** When a case has been assigned, a designated panel judge may issue any interlocutory order and act on any motion filed under Fed. R. App. P. 8, 9(b), 22(a), or 22(b).
- (B) **Procedural orders.** Orders are entered when the clerk docketes them. The docket entry will:
- (1) describe briefly and succinctly the nature of the order; and
  - (2) either be entered by the clerk or state the name of the judge or judges directing its entry.
