Thank you for the hard work that led to important accomplishments before Memorial Day. We've had an extremely productive year so far. It was crucial that we provided tax relief to help the economy grow and create jobs, and I appreciate the fact that you moved it to my desk in one week. I also thank you for passing the Global AIDS bill, because it shows the compassion of our Nation. Let's continue to be aggressive, because we have a lot of work left to do this year.

Medicare

• Strengthening Medicare and providing prescription drug coverage is a top domestic policy priority for me. IRS Commissioner Mark W. Everson

Mark W. Everson was confirmed by the U. S. Senate on May 1, 2003, to be Commissioner of Internal Revenue. Mr. Everson is the 46th commissioner since the agency was created in 1862. Mr. Everson was appointed by President Bush to a five-year term.

As IRS commissioner, Mr. Everson presides over the continued reorganization and modernization of the nation's tax administration agency. His priorities include strengthening enforcement of the tax laws and improving services for taxpayers. The agency has approximately 100,000 employees and a budget of \$10 billion. In 2002, the agency collected \$2 trillion in tax revenue, processed 226 million tax returns and issued \$283 billion in refunds.



Commissioner Mark W. Everson

From Aug. 1, 2002, until his confirmation, Mr. Everson served as deputy director for management for the Office of Management and Budget. In this capacity, he provided government-wide leadership to executive branch agencies to strengthen federal management and improve program performance. Mr. Everson chaired the President's Management Council, which is composed of cabinet department and major agency chief operating officers. The council is charged with improving overall executive branch management, including implementation of the President's Management Agenda. Before becoming deputy director for management, Mr. Everson served as controller of the office of Federal Financial Management, also a part of OMB.

Prior to joining the Bush administration in August 2001, Mr. Everson was group vice president — finance, of SC International Services, Inc., at the time a \$2 billion privately owned, Dallas-based, food services company with leading market positions in both airline catering and home meal solutions. For 10 years, from 1988 until 1998, Mr. Everson was an executive with the Pechiney Group, one of France's largest industrial groups. While with Pechiney, he held various financial and operating positions in the United States, France and Turkey.

Mr. Everson also served in the Reagan administration from 1982 until 1988 holding several positions at the U.S. Information Agency and the Department of Justice, where he was deputy commissioner of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. While at INS, he oversaw implementation of the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, landmark legislation providing for sanctions against employers hiring undocumented aliens and granting amnesty to millions of qualifying illegal aliens.

Biography

Governor Dirk Kempthorne was reelected as Idaho's Governor in November of 2002. first elected as Idaho's 30th Chief Executive in 1998, following a successful six-year United States Senate.

To ensure that Idaho's diversifying economy continues to expand, Governor Kempth forward initiatives to foster rural economic development, more overseas marketing of products, and greater integration of the state's scientific, educational, and business co

Dirk Kempthorne began his commitment to public service as the highly successful M Boise. During his seven years in office, he helped direct a renaissance in the state's cathat resulted in record growth, economic development and numerous national honors recognitions for quality of life, business climate and family issues.



As a Senator, he wrote, negotiated, and won passage of two major pieces of legislatic end unfunded federal mandates on state and local governments, and a substantial revi federal Safe Drinking Water Act. I'll admit though, I did not expect many enemies when I was on the planning board in the town of Holbrook.
- The President of the United States takes the oath as set forth in Article II of the Constitution. Presidents take that oath with the understanding that the obligation doesn't mean to protect and defend the constitution if the wind is blowing in the right direction, if it is popular or convenient, or if it's only without sacrifice. It is an oath to protect and defend the Constitution no matter what the circumstances.
- September 11, 2001 was a day unlike any other day that the United States had ever experienced, a day when our Constitution came under attack. There was an invitation of anarchy, an invitation to avoid the rule of law, but the president –because he had taken that oath on January 20th 2001 – knew his obligation and met it.
- Take your oaths, live by them, recognize that your experiences teach the moral clarity needed to understand an oath and the resolve to keep it.

Dear Mr. Smythe:

On June 9, 2003, I wrote to you regarding my concerns about the Office of Management and Budget's decision to under-finance the Lewis and Clark Rural Water Project as authorized by P.L. 106-246. This critical project, which will provide safe, reliable drinking water to over 200,000 citizens in Iowa, South Dakota, and Minnesota was appropriated \$7 million by Congress, but cut by more than \$5 million by your office and the Department of the Interior. While I am still awaiting your response to my inquiry, additional information has come to my attention that has left me deeply disturbed and compelled me to write again.

Specifically, I have been made aware that the Office of Management and Budget has chosen to review the Final Engineering Report for the Lewis and Clark project, that such review could last as long as a year, and that this review could lead to significant project modifications necessitating further congressional action. Further, this review is being used in part as the reasoning behind the FY 2003 under-financing.

As you may know, under the authorizing legislation for this project, a Final Engineering Report must be submitted to Congress for a period of 90 days before funds may be released for construction. That action was taken by the project last summer with full knowledge of the Bureau of Reclamation. For whatever reasons, I am now informed that OMB must review these reports and resubmit them to Congress. Such a review adds time and uncertainty to a critical project that is by all accounts ready for construction. I urge you to use whatever discretion you may have to expedite and/or waive the review of this engineering report so that the project can begin construction immediately.

Let me be clear, my colleagues and I have spent many years working with the authorizing and appropriations committees on Lewis and Clark. During that time, we have held countless hearings and have had extensive consultations with the appropriate agencies. These consultations have led to a project that best suits the needs of the area.

Lewis and Clark is a unique tri-state, regional project that enjoys broad support in the states and in Congress. Further, I might remind you that in a visit to our neighbors in South Dakota in March 2001, President Bush lent his strong support for the Lewis and Clark Rural Water Project, stating that his "priority is to work with states on important development projects. And the Lewis and Clark Rural Water Project is a project that will be in my budget, and something that we can work together on."

All of these actions - the FY 2003 under financing, the decision by OMB to eliminate funding for Lewis and Clark in its FY 2004 budget request, and this latest wrinkle to rereview the Final Engineering Report - lead me to the troubling conclusion that OMB and the Department of Interior are distancing themselves from the President's commitment and attempting to undermine the project. If this is the case, then I also question the \$1.987 million that your Office approved for FY2003. This small appropriation only undermines the progress we have made, and makes it more expensive in the long run.

As a consumer of rural water, I urge your direct intervention on this issue and will await your explanation of how this Administration will begin to work cooperatively to focus on the critical needs that Lewis and Clark is designed to address.

Dear Andy:

We are preparing for our annual Washington visit, with approximately 25 CEOs and senior executives from Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut banks in Washington, DC on June 18-19, 2003.

Last year, you were most gracious in meeting with us at the White House, where we were briefed on the President's formation of the Department of Homeland Security. It was incredibly significant to be privy to such a historical announcement.

The bankers have requested that they meet with you again this year if at all possible. On June 18, 2003, we have a meeting at the Treasury. If Secretary John Snow is not available at that time, perhaps you could arrange a meeting with him at the White House for an economic briefing. Additional policy makers of interest would be someone from the President's Council of Economic Advisors, as well as HUD Secretary, Mel Martinez. Although our schedule is somewhat flexible throughout the day on Thursday, June 19, perhaps the best time would be an hour between 11:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Since we know you are incredibly busy, we would certainly appreciate any assistance you could offer.

FDIC Board Nomination

On a separate issue, I am extremely pleased to report that Massachusetts Commissioner of Banks Thomas J. Curry has been nominated by Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle (D-SD) for the open Democratic seat on the FDIC's Board of Directors. Commissioner Curry would fill the vacancy created when Joe Neely (former Commissioner of Banks in Mississippi) left the post in 1998. The talent and integrity that Tom applies as Commissioner of Banks here in Massachusetts will surely be missed, but the banking industry as a whole gains significantly in his new role on the FDIC Board.

With more than 85% of Massachusetts banks consisting of community banks (commercial, savings, and cooperative banks, as well as savings and loans), we believe that Tom is uniquely qualified for the FDIC position. The Massachusetts Bankers Association has worked closely with the Commissioner's Office to expand and protect state bank powers, reduce regulatory burden, endorse self-testing protections for banks and defend mutual bank governance options to name a few. I hope the Administration will join us in supporting Tom's nomination to the FDIC Board.

BIOGRAPHY OF GOVERNOR FRANK KEATING

Frank Keating, President & CEO, American Council of Life Insurers

Governor Frank Keating assumed the role of President and CEO of the American Council of Life Insurers in January of this year, following his second term as governor of Oklahoma. Governor Keating was elected as Oklahoma's 25th governor in November 1994. He was re-elected in November 1998 with an overwhelming 58 percent of the vote. Prior to his terms as governor, he served as an FBI agent, an assistant district attorney, and a member of both houses of the Oklahoma legislature, where he was Senate minority leader. After service as U.S. attorney for the Northern District of Oklahoma, he became the highest-ranking Oklahoman in the Reagan and Bush administrations, with service as assistant secretary of the Treasury and acting deputy HUD secretary. During his Washington service, Governor Keating supervised the operations of federal law enforcement agencies. He has also served as the chairman of the Interstate Oil and Gas Compact Commission.

Governor Frank Keating is a graduate of Georgetown University and the University of Oklahoma Law School. He and his wife, Cathy, live in Northern Virginia. They have three children—daughters Carrie and Kelly and son, Chip. The Keatings' first grandchild, Catherine was born on July 4, 2002.
