Brooklyn Councilman Is Charged in an Extortion Scheme

A Brooklyn councilman who was recently a contender for City Council speaker was charged vesterday with demanding a \$1.5 million break on a real estate deal from a developer in exchange for supporting the multimillion-dollar renovation of a waterfront warehouse in his district.

The councilman, Angel Rodriguez, a Democrat, represents the Red Hook neighborhood where a Civil War-era warehouse is to be converted into a Fairway supermarket. He and a childhood friend who prosecutors said aided Mr. Rodriguez in the scheme were charged in a 15-count federal indictment with extortion conspiracy, attempted extortion, fraud and other crimes.

The indictment, which was unsealed yesterday, charges that Mr. Rodriguez publicly changed his position to support the development plan at a hearing of the Council's Land

Use Committee on Jan. 29. The turnaround, the indictment said, came a day after Mr. Rodriguez and his friend, Jonathan Morales, through a front company, signed a contract with the developer to buy three Cobble Hill properties worth \$2.5 million for \$1 million, which the indictment said was "a secret benefit of \$1.5 million." On Jan. 30, Mr. Rodriguez voted in favor of the plan, which he had earlier opposed, and it was approved by the entire Council.

Prosecutors said Mr. Rodriguez, 45, a second-term councilman, and Mr. Morales, 43, a New Jersey furniture salesman, also demanded \$50,000 in cash from the developer, Gregory O'Connell. Mr. O'Connell, a retired police detective who left the Police Department in 1980 and spent the next two decades buying and reviving properties on the Red Hook waterfront, reported the councilman to the City Department of Investiga-

tion. Later, under the supervision of city police detectives, agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation and federal prosecutors, Mr. O'Connell secretly tape-recorded several conversations with the councilman and made two \$9,000 payments toward the \$50,000.

Mr. Rodriguez and Mr. Morales both pleaded not guilty yesterday in a brief proceeding before Magistrate Judge Steven M. Gold in Federal District Court in Brooklyn. Later, Mr. Rodriguez resigned from all of his City Council committee positions, but he did not resign from the full Council.

The charges against Mr. Rodriguez were unusual because it was the first time that a sitting City Council member had been ensnared in a corruption investigation in nearly a decade, and because individual council members are rarely thought to wield the kind of power that would warrant such a large bribe.

The waterfront development project centered on the \$15 million renovation of a dilapidated red brick coffee warehouse into the city's third and largest Fairway supermarket, a gastronomic mecca that Mr. O'Connell contends would bring to the neighborhood not only hundreds of cheeses and other esoteric foods, but also 375 jobs.

"Some members of the community saw this project as an opportunity for positive urban development in an upand-coming neighborhood," said Alan Vinegrad, the interim United States attorney in Brooklyn. "Councilman Angel Rodriguez saw it instead as an opportunity to get rich quick by shaking down the developer of the project and enriching himself enormously as a result of an extortion scheme."

Mr. Vinegrad announced the charges at a news conference in Brooklyn with Kevin Donovan, the assistant director in charge of the New York F.B.I. office: Police Commissioner Raymond W. Kelly; and Rose Gill Hearn, commissioner of the city's Department of Investigation.

At the news conference. Mr. Donovan said that while the investigation was a success, the charges nevertheless marked a "sad day" because Mr. Rodriguez's actions had damaged the public trust.

"Election to public office isn't supposed to be a way to get rich quick," he said.

At his court appearance, Mr. Rodriguez, a slight man with coal black hair and a bushy mustache, appeared dazed as he stood before the judge in a dark suit, his shoulders stooped and his hands clasped in

front of him. During several breaks. he sat with his hands thrust deep in his pockets as his wife and children sat silently in the courtroom gallery. Both men were released on \$500.000 personal recognizance bonds. Afterward, Mr. Rodriguez's lawyer, William M. Brodsky, said: "My client categorically denies the charges filed by the government. He has pleaded not guilty and expects to be exonerated at trial." Mr. Rodriguez, an accountant who was elected to the Council in 1997, declined to answer questions.

Stephen Turano, a lawyer for Mr. Morales, said his client denied wrongdoing. Both Mr. Morales and Mr. Rodriguez would face a maximum of 20 years in prison if convicted.

A Council spokesman said that Mr. Rodriguez had resigned his leadership position as chairman of a finance subcommittee and his other committee assignments, but would continue to collect his \$90,000 salary

and would still be able to vote on matters before the full Council. In addition to Red Hook, his 38th Council District also represents the neighborhoods of Sunset Park, Boerum Hill, Carroll Gardens, Park Slope, Windsor Terrace, Wyckoff, Gowanus and Bay Ridge.

According to the indictment, Mr. O'Connell began seeking city approval in the spring of 2000 for the waterfront development, which required the approval of the Council's Land Use Committee and the full Council. Mr. Rodriguez and Mr. Morales, according to the indictment, undertook the scheme in April 2001.

On Dec. 12, according to court papers filed in the case, the councilman approached Mr. O'Connell in Brooklyn Borough Hall and gave him 50 cents - a cryptic reminder, according to prosecutors, of the \$50,000 cash bribe. Mr. Vinegrad said that Mr. O'Connell made a number of recordings of the councilman and his friend, who were "basically making these demands, repeating these demands and basically tracking the planning and execution of the scheme every step along the way." Mr. Vinegrad said the investigation is continuing.

The project nonetheless is moving forward, although Mr. O'Connell has not yet taken ownership of the warehouse at Van Brunt Street near Beard Street, and neighborhood resistance remains. Several community groups have argued that the store will choke the narrow streets with traffic, and vesterday, two neighborhood advocates came to federal court in Brooklyn to see Mr. Rodriguez's court appearance and speak out against the development.

One, Lou Sones, said that advocates had not understood - until vesterday — why Mr. Rodriguez had suddenly abandoned his initial opposition to the project in January.

"We were betrayed and we wondered why," he said. "And now we PT.O.

know.'

But since the the federal indictment comes days after the Council angered the Bloomberg administration by voting down a project scheduled for Crown Heights, Brooklyn, it has intensified questions about the Council's process of reviewing and approving developments and zoning changes.

Dear Administrator Perry,

With regard to the disposal of Governors Island as per the Balanced Budget Act of 1997 (the Act), the island is to be sold at "fair market" and according to the subsequent F2001 budget was valued at \$300 million - presumably per some definition.

Does the 1997 Act define the formula that calculates the \$300 million valuation in the F2001 budget definitively? Then, if such a formula, usually comprising many variables, were ill-defined or not defined, could the 2001 "fair market" value be different and not bear any relationship to the now dated \$300 million valuation? Did the United States, for example, make a comparable valuation of the adjoining Liberty Island? Would such possible omission(s) open the door for requiring a redefinition and/or recalculation of "fair market" value?

For instance, what is the "fair market" value of a 125 year old, 560,000 pound, copper-clad steel structure? On the lower end of the scale, an accountant would likely ascribe zero value to Lady Liberty's fully written down book value while allowing value for the underlying land and the capitalization of recent restoration expenses. On the higher end of the scale, <u>Liberty Island is</u> worth billions of dollars to the United States as the omnipresent symbol of America and its omnipotent image of Liberty the world over. Therefore, Liberty Island's "fair market" value comprises (1) very low book value <u>plus</u> (2) extremely high, intangible value - in other words, its fair market value is priceless.

Historic New Amsterdam on Governors Island as the personification of American tolerance is similarly priceless. When connected to the adjoining symbols on Liberty and Ellis islands they would compose our proposed National Heritage Triangle* the sum of which will be immeasurably larger than its component parts.

It is New York's unique contribution to the nation and requires one's considerateness as an implicit gift to another. The F2001 Federal budget likely valued Governors Island as a physical asset only. In view of this asset's currently desolate condition and its wanting economic use, it could be argued that the cost of maintaining the island and its substantial physical stock would warrant a negative valuation or, at most, a symbolic valuation of one dollar.

However, the United States must realize that it is the owner of both (1) a physical asset <u>plus</u> (2) a currently obfuscated, intangible asset that was created by a momentous, historic event that took place in 1624 - the planting of the legal-political condition of tolerance and the birthplace of the states in the region that stretched from Cape Cod to the Delaware Bay. National recognition of this event would enable the United States to infuse the island with tremendous intangible value. Like Liberty Island, whereon Lady Liberty as the symbol of ourselves as part of our national iconography, Governors Island can become an equally valuable symbol to the nation.

As Governors Island's owner, the United States has a right [and perhaps a duty] to recapture its significant history on behalf of its citizens. By dedicating part of Governors Island for Historic New Amsterdam it would confer national significance onto the island. As stated in our August 13, 2001, letter to you; "the long term tangible and intangible value of Governors Island to the United States lies in its end-use or added-value - not in the receipt of current [tangible] dollars".

The Act's "right-of-first-offer" to the City and State and "fair-market-requirement" are inherently contradictory. Delegating the re-utilization decision of Governors Island and negating its responsibility as owner make it impossible for the United States to receive fair value for the island. It expressly devalues the island for all Americans and denies them America's seventeenth century heritage.

The enclosed articles underscore that without the explicit wishes of the United States neither the City nor the State will ever be able to add intangible value to the historic island or create something in the national interest. More importantly, delivering the island to New York (not the Foundation) on the condition of *prior* State legislative approval of Historic New Amsterdam will create the highest possible "fair market" valuation of the island for the United States on behalf of *all* its citizens.

If the Act's "fair market" requirement is thus not an obstacle to accept Historic New Amsterdam, may I count on your proactive support to build this new symbol of tolerance in New York harbor?

Preliminary Blueprint for Renewal

The preliminary components of a blueprint for Lower Manhattan include the following:

Respect the site of the World Trade Center as a place of remembrance and reserve an area of the site for one or more permanent memorials. The attack on the World Trade Center has permanently changed the lives of the family members and friends of those who died, as well as the many people who survived or were touched by this tragedy. The need to heal and remember must not be lost amid the need to rebuild. A sacred, respectful memorial must be erected to honor the thousands who perished and the emergency responders who gave their lives in the line of duty.

Proposals under review that emerged during the listening process:

- Create an important permanent memorial on the World Trade Center site. Create a museum of freedom and remembrance.
 - Establish an international design process to produce the most moving and appropriate memorial possible.

LMDC will work closely with the victims' families in developing a memorial process, as well as the Port Authority, the leaseholders, and all of the groups and agencies involved to come to agreement on a final plan.

Impact: The memorial will stand as an eternal tribute to the victims, the enduring strength of democracy, a celebration of freedom, and a testament to the resurgent power of the city and the nation. Like *The Sphere* that once stood in the plaza, it will reflect the free exchange of ideas, goods, and services among diverse peoples that the World Trade Center embodied.

Facilitate the immediate revitalization of Lower Manhattan to ensure its long-term viability. Immediate interim actions are needed to restore essential services to Lower Manhattan, allowing residents, workers and businesses to continue to return and function with confidence. However, these projects must be carried out with sensitivity and respect for those who were lost and their families.

Ongoing Interim Projects:

- Create and administer a program of financial assistance for residents and businesses, and non-profit organizations.
- b. Restore service on the 1 & 9 lines below Chambers Street.

Restore PATH service from New Jersey at a temporary station.

Replace utility and telecom lines as quickly as possible in order to clear temporary cables from the sidewalks and streets.

Improve streets and sidewalks.

Coordinate infrastructure repair work to minimize disruptions.

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Manhattan as a mixed-use community, with retail and commercial amenities to service a critical mass of businesses, residents, workers and visitors. Premier retail and commercial offerings will enhance Lower Manhattan as a destination for the city and the region. Retail should service both local residents and the needs of the business community.

Proposals under review that emerged during the listening process:

- Develop underground and street level retail spaces to service commuters, residents and visitors.
- Create a galleria of premiere retail offerings that will be a magnet for the city b. and the region.
 - Improve the quality of retail and commercial ancillary services to attract and retain businesses and financial and professional firms.

Impact: A critical mass of quality retail and commercial offerings to service Lower Manhattan day and night.

LMDC will work with the Port Authority, Battery Park City Authority, Office of the Deputy Mayor for Economic Development and Rebuilding and all other involved groups and agencies to identify a program of action.

Provide for new or expanded cultural and civic institutions in Lower Manhattan. Lower Manhattan should be conceived as a Freedom Park, linking the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island, the New York Stock Exchange, and the World Trade Center memorial. A critical mass of dynamic, enticing and diverse cultural venues must be developed and sustained to make Lower Manhattan a vibrant arts center. This must include strengthening existing cultural institutions as well as clearing the obstacles for new ones.

Proposals under review that emerged during the listening process:

- Make the Freedom Park a centerpiece of Lower Manhattan.
 - Create a new museum dedicated to American freedom and the values that the World Trade Center represented.
- Build a home for the City Opera within a new performing arts center to include facilities for other musical and theater groups.
- Build a downtown Guggenheim Museum. d.
- Expand the programs and facilities of the South Street Seaport Museum, the e. Museum of the American Indian, the Museum of Jewish Heritage, the Skyscraper Museum, the Museum of Financial History and other cultural institutions in Lower Manhattan.
 - Build a museum building with a Trade Center museum in connection with the permanent memorial structure and to house other smaller museums lacking adequate facilities.

Impact: An enhanced Lower Manhattan as a tourist and visitor destination.
