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



Welcome everyone. I want to thank you for joining me today as the U.S. Army celebrates Hispanic Heritage Month.

Before I introduce our guest speaker, Mr. Michael Montelongo, I would like to take a moment to share with you some information about how the U.S. Army has embraced the Hispanic community and how the observance of Hispanic Heritage Month came about.

On September 17, 1968, Public Law 90-498 authorized the President to annually establish a week in September that includes the 15th, (Latin American Independence Day) and the 16th (Mexican Independence Day) to highlight and recognize the many contributions Hispanic Americans have made to our great country. The resolution called upon the people of the United States, especially the educational community to observe such a week with ceremonies and activities. Later, this week was extended to cover the full month of September. The theme of this year's observance is, "Hispanic Americans: Strength in Unity, Faith and Diversity. The overall goal of this month is to increase awareness and knowledge of the Hispanic culture, diversity, and accomplishments.

Now let me tell you about the U.S. Army's advocacy of the Hispanic community. Recently, the Army honored two individuals who, in addition to serving their country, served as leaders in the Hispanic community and demonstrated a strong commitment to promoting awareness and knowledge of the Hispanic culture. Hon. Louis Caldera's portrait was displayed in the Hall of Heroes as the first Hispanic to serve as Secretary of the Army. The Army's first Hispanic four-star general, General Richard Cavazos retired in 1984 with 13 outstanding decorations and service both in the Korean and Vietnam War. Interestingly, my counterpart in the Air Force served in the U.S. Army before he moved to the private sector and then to the Air Force. AIF was established immediately following the January 2001 earthquake in Gujarat, India to mobilize Americans to engage in the rehabilitation efforts. The foundation was founded under the initiative of a number of leading business and community leaders and is co-chaired by myself and Victor Menezes, the Chairman and CEO of Citibank. AIF's Board of Trustees is composed of prominent business and community leaders who are committed to India, including Frank Wisner, Richard Celeste, Swadesh Chatterjee, Desh Desphande, Kanwal Rekhi, Sudhakar Shenoy, Raj Vattikuti, Harry Barnes, and former President Bill Clinton.

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

Dear President Bush,

On behalf of the National Wild Turkey Federation I would like to express our support for the Healthy Forest Initiative. The National Wild Turkey Federation, headquartered in Edgefield, SC, is a national 501(c)(3) nonprofit conservation and education organization dedicated to conserving the wild turkey and preserving the hunting tradition. Growth and progress define the National Wild Turkey Federation as it has expanded from 1,300 members in 1973 to over 450,000 today.

We support legislation that will expedite procedures for forest thinning, restoration projects that will help to restore forest health, and fuel reduction projects that will reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfires. Implementing these actions will help to conserve valuable habitat for many species of wildlife. Fulfilling the promise of the 1994 Northwest Forest Plan to ensure sustainable forest management and appropriate timber production is long overdue.

The National Wild Turkey Federation has long been concerned that unnecessary regulatory obstacles have been hindering active forest management. In 1991 at our Annual Convention in Columbus, Ohio, we, along with the Congressional Sportsmen Foundation and Rep. Collin Petersen (D-MN) held a town meeting that focused on these very issues. Recently we personally communicated our concerns to Dale Bosworth, Chief of the Forest Service. The Chief assured us that he is committed to fixing the crisis of "analysis paralysis" within the Forest Service and we know that progress is being made. The action you are proposing will compliment the efforts by the Chief and enable the agency to more efficiently address the conditions that threaten the health of our forests and the strength of our communities.

All too often we hear about good, sound forest management projects, designed to maintain healthy forests that are either delayed or canceled due to procedural regulations. Federal agencies, especially the Forest Service, are bogged down in paperwork, and are forced to produce burdensome paralegal documents that will withstand the onslaught of endless appeals and lawsuits. Tax dollars are needlessly spent as the agency channels their resources and energy to produce documents that will stand up to the legal challenges that are afforded to the obstructionists by unnecessary procedural obstacles.

We commend you on the actions that you have proposed to reduce the risks associated with a lack of active forest and rangeland management. The Healthy Forest Initiative will serve as a cornerstone of this effort, and make it possible to restore the health of our forests and keep our communities prosperous and safe for future generations.

IPO Largess Flowed to Capitol Hill

Lawmakers, Not Just Executives, Benefited From Lucrative Deals Under Investigation

WASHINGTON

EVERAL MEMBERS OF congressional committees now investigating how Wall Street doles out lucrative initial public offering stocks to favored bigwigs have themselves gotten access to coveted IPOs.

The most prominent is New York Rep. John LaFalce, the House Financial Services Committee's top Democrat. In calling for hearings last week, he contended that IPO allocations based on inappropriate considerations was one of many investment-banking practices "that are atrocious but not illegal." Long an active investor, Rep. LaFalce in 1995 secured \$15,000 of IPO stock in Healthcare Services Corp., some of which he sold three months later for a \$5,000-plus profit.

Mr. LaFalce denied getting favorable treatment from his broker and said he lost money overall on the investment, which he called a "once-in-a-life" event. "There's no awkwardness at all," said Mr. LaFalce of his participation in the IPO inquiry. "I'm not speaking against IPOs. Companies need to come to the marketplace and we want to encourage that. [But] we want to make it as open as possible."

Mr. LaFalce is one of numerous members who dabbled in such shares during the IPO salad days, when it was almost certain that prices immediately would spike. Others include Gary Ackerman, another New York Democrat on the Financial Services Committee, and California Demo-

cratic Sen. Barbara Boxer, who sits on the Senate Commerce subcommittee on consumer affairs, which is likely to hold PPO hearings this month.

Wall Street's habit of favoring big institutional and individual investors, celebrities, corporate chieftains and other VIPs with IPOs leaves average investors with almost no chance of securing them. Neither Congress nor past administrations have ever tried to force Wall Street to allocate in a more egalitarian fashion. But the atmosphere seems to have shifted in the aftermath of revelations that Citigroup Inc.'s Salomon Smith Barney unit allocated nearly one million hot IPO shares to WorldCom Inc. executives who were giving the firm tens of millions of dollars in investment-banking business.

The House Financial Services Committee has subpoenaed documents on those allocations and asked Credit Suisse First Boston, part of Credit Suisse Group, and Goldman Sachs Group Inc. to disclose documents on their IPO allocations. Salomon has said its allocations conformed to industry norms. Goldman and Credit Suisse First Boston pledged to cooperate with the inquiries.

Meanwhile, Securities and Exchange Commission Chairman Harvey Pitt late last month called for the National Association of Securities Dealers and the New York Stock Exchange to review the IPO process and consider additional antifavoratism rules beyond the ones the NASD recently proposed sending to the SEC for approval.

Re: Request for Meeting with Telecommunications CEOs

Dear Karl:

The leaders of the nation's telecommunications industry request an opportunity to visit with you regarding the current financial crisis in our sector of the economy. The group would consist of the CEOs of our largest member companies - Verizon, SBC, BellSouth, Alltel, and CenturyTel - and myself. We want to discuss with you our commitment to the President's goal of economic growth, and our recommendations for action.

The telecommunications industry, which is an enormous contributor to the overall health of the economy, is in distress. Even the strongest companies are suffering. The most recent quarterly results of carriers such as BellSouth, SBC and Verizon reflect continuing declines in revenue, and stock prices are down by 44% or more over the past year. Local telephone companies of all sizes have been discouraged from making needed investments in new advanced technologies, consumers have been denied new services, and employment has plummeted. Companies that supply our industry, such as I ucent, Coming and Nortel, have faced even greater losses. According to the government's own statistics, the telecommunications sector has lost nearly \$2 willion in market value and nearly 500,000 jobs in the last two years.

This week has been one of more bad news. The debt ratings of BellSouth, SBC and Verizon - the nation's largest local carriers - were downgraded. USA Today, in a lengthy analysis, reported that the telecommunications sector of the economy is in "critical" condition. The Wall Street Journal ran an extensive front page feature on the "heavy human toll" that the telecommunications decline is taking, calling it "worke" than the dramatic declines in the nation's steel, oil and automobile industries in decades past

in many respects the abysmal state of the telecommunications sector of the economy stands as an indictment of the flawed telecommunications policies of the previous Administration. However, the continuation of these unsound policies into the second year of this Administration is thwarting recovery. A return to robust economic growth of the telecommunications sector of our economy can begin with the Administration adopting a new telecommunications policy - a policy that will promote real competition, high tech investment, creation of new jobs, and consumer welfare.

We have visited with Commerce Secretary Donald Evans, and with Presidential Assistant Lawrence Lindsey. We have a conference call scheduled with Treasury Secretary Paul O'Neill. We believe, however, that it is important that we have an opportunity to talk with you, as well. These telecommunications CEOs will be in Washington on Friday, September 6th, and on Thursday, September 12th. We would value having the opportunity to meet.

Recognizing that there can be no strong recovery in the nation's economy without recovery in the telecommunications sector, we are asking for Administration leadership. In return, we pledge to work with the President, and with you, to achieve the economic growth that all Americans desire.

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

The Facts about the Senate Homeland Security Legislation

Charge

"Until we build an accountable new Department of Homeland Security with a unified chain of command and the people, power and resources to get things done, we'll remain vulnerable in many fundamental ways." (Senator Joseph Lieberman, Washington Post, September 3, 2002)

Reality:

- √ The Administration's bill to create a Department of Homeland Security is meant to establish clear lines of authority over and accountability for homeland security. This new department will be subject traditionally intensive congressional oversight.
- √ Senator Lieberman's bill, however, creates a bewildering chain of command that does not take into the account the current roles and responsibilities of entities within the Executive Office of the President that are currently engaged in homeland security or combating terrorism.
- √ The establishment of a statutorily-created White House office with a Senateconfirmed head would only cause confusion, muddle lines of authority, and blur Executive Branch accountability.

Charge

"A free nation such as ours cannot and should not become an armed fortress. Nor can we become suspicious of immigrants, who have been our lifeblood. Our goal must be to increase our security without diminishing our liberties. The legislation before the Senate would do that." (Senator Joseph Lieberman, Washington Post, September 3, 2002)

Reality:

- √ The Administration firmly believes the Department of Homeland Security should provide a genuinely seamless border security system to protect the American people from terrorist infiltration.
- √ Unfortunately, Senator Lieberman's bill would establish a chain of command for INS enforcement personnel (including the Border Patrol) that is outside of the chain of command for Border and Transportation Security. His bill would reestablish one of the most glaring seams in America's border security that the establishment of the Department of Homeland Security was intended to correct.
- √ Further, Senator Lieberman would abolish the Executive Office for Immigration Review and create within the Department of Justice what amounts to an independent agency for immigration judges. This provision would result in duplicative and potentially conflicting interpretations of the immigration laws.

Charge

"In the department we seek to create, all information related to terrorist threats against America that is collected by intelligence and law enforcement (including foreign intelligence analysis from the director of Central Intelligence's Counterterrorism Center) would be fused and analyzed in a single place, so that our government could see emerging plots and stop them before they are carried out." (Senator Joseph Lieberman, Washington Post, September 3, 2002)

Reality:

- √ The Administration's review of the Federal government's homeland security efforts revealed a key need the ability to map the nation's critical infrastructure vulnerabilities against analysis of terrorist threats.
- √ Senator Lieberman's legislation does not create a single intelligence place for intelligence analysis; in fact, it does the exact opposite. His legislation **creates** *new* "stovepipes" that will hinder the new Department's role in mapping threats against vulnerabilities.
- √ The Senate legislation artificially separates analysts working on terrorism threats from those working on infrastructure vulnerabilities, as these functions are divided into three distinct directorates, responding to three separate Under Secretaries.
- √ This bureaucratic structure would make it difficult to achieve the unified analysis of terrorist threats and American vulnerabilities, which is one of the fundamental reasons for the new Department.

Charge

"The president claims that we do not give him and the new secretary enough "flexibility" to manage the department. That is not accurate. Under our legislation, the president and the secretary of homeland security would, in fact, have more flexibility to run an efficient, effective and performance-driven department than the law now provides." (Senator Joseph Lieberman, Washington Post, September 3, 2002)

Reality:

- The President believes that the United States needs an agile and responsive organization to meet the 21st century threat of terrorism. In short, the bill establishing the Department of Homeland Security should create a flexible organization, not a rigid bureaucracy.
- √ Through a variety of separate provisions, Senator Lieberman's legislation would prohibit any meaningful reorganization or consolidation of the entities or functions it transfers to the new Department. The Senate bill clearly prohibits the new Secretary

from reorganizing, reallocating or delegating most of the agency functions in the new Department. It would preclude, for example, even the most basic consolidation of Federal inspectors at our border ports of entry.

Further, the Senate bill would provide the Secretary of Homeland Security with far less statutory reorganization authority than Congress has previously provided to other departments, such as in legislation creating the Department of Energy and the Department of Education.

Charge

"With the powers in existing law and new ones added in our bill, the administration would be able to promptly hire new talent, swiftly move employees around, discipline and fire poor performers." (Senator Joseph Lieberman, Washington Post, September 3, 2002)

- √ President Bush views government employees as some of the best America has to offer:
 - "...it does point up the fact that public service in America today is not just another job. It is an important act of citizenship. It is a way to fulfill our obligation to those who have gone before us, to those who will follow us, and to those who have sacrificed and died for us. That's how I view your job, and my job." (July 10, 2002, Remarks of the President)
- While Senator Lieberman's bill Committee introduces very narrow changes to the personnel system such as slight hiring process reforms and corrections to pay administration anomalies it is a far cry from the President's basic goal of creating a workforce at the Department of Homeland Security with the flexibility, mobility, and agility needed to protect our nation from multiple and constantly changing threats.
- √ In fact, the Senate bill leaves in place a 50-year-old, rigid, statutorily mandated, and unalterable personnel system where, as the Office of Personnel Management has found that:
 - it can sometimes take 5 months or more to hire a new Federal employee and 18 months to terminate Federal employees who are not getting the job done.
 - civil service rules do not allow managers to reward effective employees and penalize poor performers. This means that all employees are given the same annual pay increase based on how long they have worked for the government, not how effective they have been at their job.
 - border control agents at the INS cannot be shifted from one region to another at a moment's notice. So, if intelligence indicates that terrorists may attempt to enter America through a particular border location, managers are currently prevented from quickly moving agents to the vulnerable area even for a temporary 30-day assignment.

• if an employee is found intoxicated at his security post that employee must be given a 30-day written notice before he or she can be terminated. And the employee is paid for this 30-day period.

Charge

"...and even remove employees from collective bargaining units when national security is at stake. In that last case, we have simply required the administration to state clear reasons for taking such extraordinary action, and made sure there is due process to have the loss of those rights reviewed by the Federal Labor Relations Authority."

Reality:

- √ The Committee proposal includes language on Federal Labor Relations which would significantly restrict the President's **existing**, **government-wide authority** to prohibit collective bargaining for reasons of national security.
- √ The bill would in effect deny the President this authority over the Department of Homeland Security an illogical result given that the President will continue to have this authority for every other department and agency of the Federal government.
- √ As every President since Jimmy Carter has shown, there are times where the needs of national security must take precedence over collective bargaining. Each President both Democrats and Republicans have used this authority precisely and with restraint. A time of war is the wrong time to weaken the President's authority to protect national security.

Charge

"If granted, the president's pleas for additional "flexibility" would give his administration unprecedented power to undercut the civil service system, rewrite laws by fiat and spend taxpayers' money without congressional checks and balances." (Senator Joseph Lieberman, Washington Post, September 3, 2002)

Reality:

- √ The President believes that the United States needs an agile and responsive organization to meet the 21st century threat of terrorism. The charge that the President's plan is unprecedented and would "undercut the civil service system, rewrite laws by fiat and spend taxpayers' money without congressional checks and balances" is simply untrue.
- √ For example, management flexibility is currently enjoyed by Departments throughout the government:

- budget transfer authority is granted in various forms to several departments, including the Department of Health and Human Services (up to 1%), the Department of Agriculture(up to 7%), and the Department of Energy (up to 5%);
- reorganization authority was granted with the establishment of the Departments of Energy and Education and government-wide reorganization authority was previously enjoyed by every President until 1984; and,
- personnel flexibility is currently enjoyed by the Federal Aviation Administration, the Internal Revenue Service, and the Transportation Security Administration.
- √ The new Department of Homeland Security as well as its new Secretary will be fully accountable fiscally and organizationally to Congress and subject to traditionally intensive Congressional oversight. This new Department will establish clear lines of authority and accountability for homeland security, which do not exist today.

The Art of the Leak

For a man who may have expressed his most salient feelings about the weasely nature of the press in 2000, when he

Looking for more? instructed NBC News associate producer Alexandra Pelosi, in her upcoming HBO |documentary Journeys with George-"When you see me talking to you, they are

going to act like your friends again, but these people aren't your friends. They can say what they want about me, but at least I know who I am and I know who my friends are" you might say that George W. Bush was doing well with the media.

Well, he's doing better than Richard Nixon. In 1962.

Mr. Bush is facing a rather hardened group, one that's tired of being ignored and slapped around, then forced to sing the song the administration wants it to belt out.

"This is not an administration that's interested in a happy establishment. press," said Bob Schieffer, host of CBS's Face the Nation. "What they're interested in is getting their message across."

Of course every administration wants that. But in this case, the erosion of good feeling, Mr. Schieffer said, extends even to the administration's dealings with the Sunday morning shows—including Face the Nation and NBC's Meet the Press, moderated by Tim Russert—which, as arbiters of the Capitol League, are supposed to set the town's agenda for the week.

In the past, Mr. Schieffer said, it was possible to book people from the Pentagon or State Department without prior approval of the White House press office. No longer. Mr. Schieffer said, the Bush administration has broken the gentleman's agreement that allowed for a system of rotating guests among the shows. Mr. Schieffer also said, that the Bush administration is engaging in double-booking: offering the same person on the same topic to each of the programs—Colin Powell on ABC, CBS and NBC all on one morning. (Off the Record, upon examination, saw that since last year Mr. Powell, Condoleezza Rice and Donald Rumsfeld have split their time fairly equally between the big Sunday shows.)

"It doesn't help any of us," Mr. Schieffer said. "It basically hurts all of us to have the Secretary of State on three different shows. If it's a big enough story, we might be tempted to go along with it. But that's not very often. What makes things worse is that if you turn down the Secretary of State, they won't let you have anybody else on the same topic.

"They see it as a place to get their message out," the CBS veteran continued. "We see it as a place to get the truth out. Sometimes these things don't match."

White House press secretary Ari Fleischer was on vacation, but White House spokesman Ken Lisaius told Off the Record: "Our philosophy is to provide the press all the information we have at our disposal, [and] to do it in a timely and accurate manner."

And NBC's Mr. Russert expressed no irritation with the Bush administration. "I have no problems with accessibility," he said. "I can get my questions answered. Everyone has the same opportunity to talk to people the same amount of times. When it's your time to talk to someone, you have to be prepared for a tough, comprehensive interview. It's not the job of a journalist to turn over the interview for somebody's political infomercial."

But the relationship between the Bush White House and the national press is one of the strangest in a long time. The press is thirsty, but obedient, covering the vacations and looking for cracks and openings, but without very much to work with. While the Pentagon has lately appeared to leak like a doused Sponge Bob—Defense Secretary Rumsfeld has spent his days railing at members of the military for the hazy invasion plans of Iraq that keep showing up on the front page of *The New York Times*—the White House has continued to remain as inaccessible as the big ranch house in Crawford.

So in the interest of improving things, Off the Record thought it might be a good moment to give the Bush administration a second shot at warming up the press, and to remind them that a happy press—like your basic Doberman pack—is a well-fed press. And the fastest way of doing that is to bring back a lost art in this freeze-dried White House, one that makes good buddies of the press faster than family-quarters tours or Christmas cookies: bring back the Big Leak.

"The Clintons were masters of it," said Michael Isikoff—Newsweek investigative correspondent and Bill's bane during the Paula Jones and Monica Lewinsky

days—of the leak, "with bad news and good news. They would leak something to get ahead of the news cycle, and when it did come out, they'd be able to say, 'That's already been reported.' That was their stock-in-trade."

Mike McCurry, Mr. Clinton's press secretary from 1995 to 1998, said he was one of the more conservative in terms of leaking, but did add that during the 1996 Presidential campaign, "we made a pretty good effort" to get to the people on the Sunday interview shows, as well as the interviewers. "We would sometimes leak information to a Senator to bring up during the show," he said.

"Or we'd go to a host and say, 'Look, *Tim*, can we share some information, *Tim*? Can we pass on some stuff that's useful to ask?' That's not so much of a leak as something that's a line across the transom." (Mr. Russert snorted a little at this. "We're fed information about how great they are," he said. "We get thousands of emails from people. We get no shortage of advice. The key is your own preparation and research.")

Another Clinton administration official recalled using leaks to get the press to play up Mr. Clinton's transformation from a tax-and-spend man to a lean and mean warrior who fought in the name of deficit reduction and fiscal responsibility. "What we did," the official said, "was to release different sets of numbers to *The New Yorl Times*, *The Washington Post*, *USA Today* and *The Wall Street Journal* over a period of four days—so, by the fourth day, it's all over. You had four straight days of 'Clinton's cutting this, Clinton's cutting that.' It achieved our objective: It showed Clinton cutting the deficit. We got coverage from four different outlets. There was something for everybody."

Mark Fabiani, formerly the special counsel to President Clinton as well as the Gore deputy campaign manager, recalled his happiest leak from the 2000 Presidential campaign. When his team learned the word "RATS" had been placed nearly (you may remember) "subliminabally" in a television advertisement attacking Vice President Gore, Mr. Fabiani gave the information to Rick Berke—now *The Times*' Washington editor—alone.

"When we came into contact with that piece of information," Mr. Fabiani said, "we knew what we wanted to do with it: We wanted to give it to Rick Berke and The New York Times.

"With a story like that," Mr. Fabiani continued, "you need people to take it seriously. With Rick Berke, you had a serious reporter whom everyone takes seriously. If you put it out into mass circulation, some people might not know what to do with it, what to think about it. This way, you had Rick Berke and *The New York Times* telling people what they needed to think."

Mr. Berke didn't quite see it like that. "That was one of the few instances," he said,

"where someone just hands you a piece of information like that. When I got it, I consulted experts—Republican strategists, media people. I asked them if they thought it was important. And they said yes. I didn't write it like an exposé; I wrote it like a feature story. It was unusual, but I would do it exactly the same way the next time."

Dee Dee Myers, the White House press secretary from 1992 to 1994, saw the lack of leaks in the Bush administration as rooted in party ideology.

"There are definite differences in how the two parties view the press," Ms. Myers said. "Republicans are all about respecting their elders. With the Democrats, you had a bunch of people who spent their lives throwing rocks at the establishment. When they became the establishment, they didn't know how to react."

And while Ms. Myers couldn't recall a favorite leak, she did lay out some important rules of the craft to Off the Record.

First, she said, like an opera singer in Vegas, you've got to know your audience.

"You need to know what you want to achieve and who you want to reach when you're leaking," Ms. Myers said. "If you leak it to *The Times*, you're hoping to hit a broad constituency, because everyone reads it first."

Second, don't treat the reporters like puppies—mindless, lapping creatures ready to run at your command. Don't try and sell information that might cause an editor to roll his or her eyes. And don't leak half of the story when you know the other half will contradict anything else you've leaked.

"You can't give a reporter baseless information with no news value," Ms. Myers said. "You can get away with it once, but not twice. They'll stop listening to you if you try and feed them stuff that's not of any use to them. Always be complete. You never want the reporter to look like an idiot. Nobody wins when you make a reporter look bad."

As for covering your tracks, Ms. Myers recommended varying your cover, depending on where you want people to think the information is coming from. If you want the leak to appear as if it's coming from someone high up, use "a senior administration official" or "someone close to the President." If you want to distance yourself from the piece of information, give it to, say, the Treasury Department and have them call *The Washington Post*.

And, she said, when you absolutely, positively want a piece of information known, give it to a member of Congress.

"In that case," Ms. Myers said, "you don't even have to tell them to leak it. You

know, within three minutes of giving the information, you're going to get a call from the *Chicago Tribune* or whatever paper's in the representative's constituency. When you have those things, it's great, because they get credit for it and you might need a vote from them."

Granted, even after the spate of corporate scandals and a disastrous economic collapse, George Bush's popularity after 11 months of war still ranks up there with his dad's in the American mind. But should bad news ever come to him, Ms. Myers recommends telling the whole story all at once to one news outlet, so that "the rest of the papers will play it down."

Indeed, Ms. Myers said, Bill and Hillary Clinton might have avoided years of Whitewater hearings and the Starr Report if they had followed a plan conceived in the early days of their administration: leak all the documents they had on the Arkansas land deal to *The Washington Post*.

"Then the story would have gotten out," she said, "but it would have been totally proprietary. It would have looked like it was *The Washington Post*'s own private obsession.

"The story was going to leak out anyway," she said. "What you want to do is avoid a scenario where everyone's looking to get a piece, thinking, 'If you're trying to keep if from me, it must be really bad.' Certainly that happened with Whitewater."

But that's not the Bush administration's game. The Bush bunch plays it more like 18 holes at Burning Tree: small gallery, short game, private scorecard.

But Mr. Isikoff, for one, isn't happy about it. His stomach is growling. "I'm proleak!" he said, "The more, the merrier! The truth is that they do, at the end of the day, contribute to an open government. From the point of view of the incumbents, they ought to welcome the leaks. When they don't—when they put too much fear of God into people, when they get too uptight—that's when mistakes tend to be made.

"The mistakes compound one another," he said. "And that's what produces scandals."

From his mouth to George Bush's ears.


