

Thirty years after *Roe v. Wade*, the White House is pressing its case against **ABORTION** delicately. An inside look at the strategy

EORGE W. BUSH'S FIRST WORKDAY was also the day that tens of thousands of antiabortion activists gathered in Washington for their annual protest against the landmark Supreme Court decision guaranteeing a woman's right to abortion. So new was the Bush team on Jan. 22, 2001, that most officials hadn't yet been issued their White House telephone extensions. Kansas Sepator Sam Brownback frantically dialed cell-phone numbers from the rally's stage beneath the Washington Monument. When he finally reached Tim Goeglein of the Office of Public Liaison, Brownback put his request for a show of support blundly: "If you're going to take this position, now's the time to announce." Less than an hour later, it was Brownback's cell phone that rang. In his first reversal of Clinton Administration policy, the new President-who had downplayed abortion during his campaign—said he would block federal money from international family-planning organizations that offer or counsel abortion. The crowd roared when Brownback delivered the news.

Two years later, as the 30th anniversary of Roe v. Wade is marked this week, the antiabortion movement finds itself at a moment of both possibility and tension. Some think Bush has lived up to the promise of that early victory. "He's been a star," says Republican Congressman Chris Smith of New Jersey, one of the House's leading abortion foes. But others say the President is in danger of squandering what they see as the biggest opportunity abortion opponents have had since Roe to severely restrict-maybe even ban—abortion. "He has tremendous political capital, and I wish he had said more to America and not just to us," says Gary Bauer. a conservative activist who ran against Bush for the G.O.P. nomination. "They've made a calculation: take action, but with the least discomfort to other portions of the coalitionsome of the more moderate suburban women who don't react to this with the same enthusiasm I might."

Abortion is on the decline in this country, no matter how you measure it: in total numbers, the rate at which women choose abortion or the percentage of pregnancies that end in abortion. Between 1990 and 2000, the number of abortions dropped 18%, from an estimated 1.6 million a year to 1.3 million, according to the Alan Guttmacher Institute, a nonprofit research organization that both sides of the debate rely on for data. Twelve years ago, about 27 women out of every 1,000 of childbearing age had had an abortion; by 2000, the number fell to just over 21. And whereas 28% of those who found themselves pregnant in 1990 had an abortion, the number dropped below 25% two years ago.

Meanwhile, there are fewer and fewer doctors willing to perform the procedure. The number of physicians providing abortion is down

to 1,800 nationally, from nearly 2,400 in 1992, and 87% of U.S. counties have none at all, according to the Guttmacher Institute. Another indicator: this month the National Abortion and Reproductive Rights Action League, the abortion-rights movement's



"If all they can muster is the elimination of one abortion method, that's a loss," says former antiabortion lobbyist Teresa Wagner, editor of a new book of essays about the movement. "It's a catastrophic loss."


For its broader goals, the antiabortion movement still can't make the political math work. The Senate has a Republican majority, but at least 53 Senators are on record as favoring Roe. And the public is not prepared to see it overturned. In the latest TIME/CNN poll, 55% of respondents said they support a woman's right to have an abortion in the first three months of pregnancy.

At the same time, 60% of those polled said it has become too easy to obtain an abortion, which helps explain why opponents have been so effective in nibbling at the edges of the abortion question. Ever since a 1992 Supreme Court decision, Planned Parenthood v. Casey, opened the door for states to impose greater limits on the right to an abortion, activists have taken up the fight state by state, measure by measure. In the past seven years, 335 new restrictions have been put on the books around the country, according to NARAL. Most common are parent-notification laws, required waiting periods, and statemandated lectures and literature about fetal development and alternatives to abortion such as adoption. In Alabama, women have to get sonograms before they can end their pregnancies. While a few states such

as California have liberalized their laws, the trend is very much in the other direction.

As Bauer noted, the White House strategy seems to be to push many of its abortion actions under the radar, where they will not be noticed by moderate women voters. True. Bush made headlines with his nomination of the staunchly evangelical, antiabortion John Ashcroft for Attorney General and the decision not to provide taxpayer funds to develop additional fetalstem-cell lines for medical research. But other moves barely made a ripple by comparison. A year ago, the Administration filed a brief supporting Ohio's partial-birthabortion ban in an appellate court (not waiting, as it normally would, for the case to hit the Supreme Court). A few months later, it quietly removed from a government website information saying that abortions do not increase the risk of breast cancer. (A replacement fact sheet suggests a possible

link, though major studies turn up no evidence for one.) Last March the Administration made fetuses eligible for the Children's Health Insurance Program, keying off the antiabortion groups' strategy of establishing "fetal rights" as a way of eventually undermining Roe. And just three weeks ago. the State Department sent a cable to its Agency for International Development (AID) offices worldwide urging them to ensure that U.S. funds weren't going to groups that provide abortion services-and suggesting that the AID offices surf the websites of funded groups as a way of checking.

Bush has also issued avowals that he will veto appropriations bills when the Senate has threatened to repeal existing restrictions on abortions. As recently as last Friday, he warned Congress that if a catchall spending bill under consideration omits even one existing curtailment of federal funds for abortion, his advisers would recommend a veto. "It's a mistake to underrate his focus," says Democratic Congresswoman Zoe Lofgren, an abortionrights advocate who has found herself on the losing side of the abortion wars. "They are persistent, and they are insistent."

The partial-birth ban, if enacted, would be the biggest federal antiabortion initiative since the mid-1970s, when the government banned use of federal funds to provide abortions for poor women. But it is certain to face a legal challenge, and has lost in the courts before. In 2000 the Supreme Court knocked down all state partial-birth bans because they defined the procedure in ways that also included the most common type of second-trimester abortion and offered no exception to preserve a woman's health or life.

Court rulings like that have raised the stakes in what promises to be the real test of Bush's antiabortion agenda: his Supreme

Court nominations. What keeps Roe standing is the razor-thin five-vote majority that has stood by the decision. If Bush replaces anti-Roe Chief Justice William Rehnquist (rumored to be retiring this year) with another like him, it won't change the calculus, though abortion will still loom huge in confirmation hearings. But when it's Sandra Day O'Connor's turn to go or that of any of the others who have upheld Roe, the stakes will be enormous. If Roe is overturned.


NARAL predicts that 12 states are likely to ban abortion in all or most circumstances, and five others might.

With so much at stake, NARAL is spending \$2.5 million this year on print and television ads, unprecedented for the group in a year with no presidential elections. On Tuesday night, every contender for the 2004 Democratic nomination is expected to appear at a NARAL dinner in Washington. And to make sure that abortion foes are not

the only ones making a show of force in Washington, a big march is planned for before the presidential election.

So for now, 30 years after Roe, abortion has become a war of small skirmishes—but with both sides on high alert. "I think that this Administration and Congress are weaving a pernicious web of anti-choice initiatives that taken together strangle reproductive rights," says Gloria Feldt, president of the Planned Parent-

hood Federation of America. And that's one point on which the two sides can agree. "God willing, the human-life amendment [which would ban abortion in all cases except to save the mother's life] will someday become the law of the land," says Congressman Smith. "But meanwhile we are using every modest and incremental approach possible."

seemed almost laughably out of touch: "I've been in meetings where feminist activists make no attempt to really listen to young women," says Jennifer Baumgardner, an active Planned Parenthood member and the co-author of Manifesta: Young Women,

That is beginning to change. At one Planned Parenthood branch outside San Francisco, a Post-Roe Committee of twenty- and thirtysomethings was host to a happy hour called Planet Love: Sex, Choices and Microbrews. Among other activities, organizers gave away safe-sex kits, which included flavored condoms. To mark this week's anniversary, the Feminist Majority Foundation is playing host to a Never Go Back student-leadership conference in Washington. The movement's Old Guard will be on hand to offer advice—but only at the invitation of the younger recruits.

Some of the younger prochoice prospects don't need an invitation to take up the cause. "I feel like choice is an issue where there is a challenge right now, and that's got me going," says Hannah Stein, a law student at the University of Minnesota. She started a pro-choice campus group after the G.O.P. swept last November's elections. "People don't realize it's endangered." -By Jodie Morse. Dear Senator Frist:

You and I had the chance to have an enlightening discussion about abstinence, teen sexuality, HIV/AIDS, STDs, and cloning when we met in your office last year. I am writing today about "The United States Leadership Against HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria Act of 2003."

I know you and I both support the President's proposal on global AIDS. While the Act being considered in the Senate includes positive elements, it fails to reflect the President's plans or priorities. Most notably, the Act virtually ignores the important role that abstinence and monogamy must play in any global AIDS initiative.

As you know, there is one country in sub-Saharan Africa that has dramatically reduced the prevalence of HIV/AIDS and that is Uganda. What Happened in Uganda?—published by USAID last fall—states, "Now considered to be one of the world's earliest and best success stories in overcoming HIV, Uganda has experienced substantial declines in prevalence and, evidently, incidence." The U.S. Census Bureau and the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS estimate that HIV prevalence in Uganda peaked at around 15 percent in 1991 and fell to 5 percent as of 2001.

The report concludes that behavioral change – "remaining abstinent, remaining faithful to one uninfected person if 'you've already started,' 'zero-grazing,' and using condoms if 'you're going to move around' " – was primarily responsible for the drop in HIV/AIDS rates. Condom distribution played little, if any, role, the report concludes.

Unfortunately, "The United States Leadership Against HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria Act of 2003" rarely mentions abstinence and is silent on the ABC model that succeeded in Uganda. On the other hand, condoms and condom distribution play a prominent role in the global strategy envisioned by the Act.

Certainly, as the ABC model envisions, condoms do play some role, though not a primary role. Indeed, not one country where condom promotion has been the dominant intervention has experienced a decrease in HIV/AIDS prevalence, including here in the United States. Still, condom distribution remains practically the sole strategy for global HIV prevention by USAID, the world's largest distributor of condoms. If primary emphasis is not placed on behavioral interventions – the A and the B in ABC – as was done in Uganda, passage of this Act is unlikely to have any significant impact.



I have learned that you took the opportunity during your Thursday remarks at the 30th annual Conservative Political Action Conference to impugn the loyalty of Ali Tulbah, an associate director of cabinet affairs in the Bush White House.

Dear Grover:

In your letter of 5 February, you publicly accused me of racism and bigotry. This is a patently false charge. It appears, moreover, to be motivated by a determination to suppress information about possibly dangerous activities with which you are personally associated -- not, as your letter suggests, by genuine concern for protecting President Bush or the conservative movement. If anything, it is your conduct and that of some of your associates at the Islamic Institute that threaten to do grave harm to the Bush presidency, to conservatives and, most importantly, to our country's national security.

Such information was what I shared with the audience at last week's Conservative Political Action Conference during a panel discussion about the balance to be struck in time of war between preserving our civil liberties and safeguarding our country and lives. I mentioned several factors that are compelling the Bush Administration, properly in my view, to infringe in relatively minor ways on traditional American freedoms to save the country from terrorist destruction. Preeminent among these is the threat posed by Islamists -- adherents to radical, violent Muslim sects like the Wahhabis of Saudi Arabia -- not only in remote places like Indonesia, Pakistan and Bosnia but in the United States, itself.

On that occasion, I made an express distinction between such Islamists and what is, I believe, the majority of Muslims in this country whom the former are determined to recruit, intimidate and dominate through a variety of techniques. As it happens, one of these was given front-page treatment in the Wall Street Journal on the very day you saw fit to try to banish me from the conservative movement: aggressive Wahhabi efforts to convert felons in U.S. prisons to Islam.

I went on to warn the CPAC audience that the Wahhabi agenda in America involves a concerted attempt to penetrate and otherwise influence political circles in Washington. Unfortunately, it is being pursued aggressively by Muslim and Arab-American individuals and organizations with whom you associate. Many of these are funded by or otherwise tied to the Saudi government, royal family and/or institutions. And some are open supporters and funders of groups that the U.S. government has designated as international terrorist organizations.

This political access and influence is being sought not only to secure the right to radicalize prison populations -- and, for that matter, U.S. servicemen and women -- with Wahhabist indoctrination. The Wahhabi lobby also hopes to advance such other objectionable

goals as: expanding loopholes in U.S. immigration policy in ways that would benefit terrorists; impeding criminal prosecutions of suspected terrorists; and constraining or subverting law enforcement. The fear is that enemies of this nation could exploit these sorts of changes to inflict possibly unimaginable harm on our countrymen.

Even where the success of such influence operations is difficult to assess, it appears that the leaders of Wahhabi-associated or -supported organizations have parlayed the access they enjoy with senior Administration and congressional figures towards another undesirable end: to validate and publicize their false claim to be the sole legitimate representatives of the American Muslim community. This purpose has been served both by ensuring, until very recently, that essentially no one but Wahhabi-approved individuals were included in Muslim "outreach" meetings with the President, his Cabinet officers and other, senior subordinates and that Muslims who shun all forms of terrorism were long excluded from such meetings.

I do not believe that this sort of empowering of radical Islamists -- at the expense of peaceable American Muslims, who abjure terrorism every bit as much as their non-Muslim countrymen -- is in the interest of the United States. It is certainly not in the interest of the President or the conservative movement.

Yet, the Islamic Institute, and you personally, have for several years played an instrumental role in promoting and facilitating the Wahhabis' access to the executive and legislative branches of the U.S. government. In so doing, you have called into question your own judgment and motivations. Far worse, you have put others for whom you profess admiration and affection, including President Bush, in a position that undercuts the war we are waging against Islamist and other terrorist foes and that could prove politically damaging and strategically detrimental to our cause and to the well-being of the country.

In fact, according to credible news reports, during the period when you served as founding Chairman of the Islamic Institute, the group received seed money from Abdurahman Alamoudi, then of the Left-wing American Muslim Council (AMC) and presently with its sister group, the American Muslim Foundation. MSNBC and Fox News have aired videotapes of Alamoudi standing in front of the White House, declaring his support for Hamas and Hezbollah -- the sponsors of suicide bombers and, in the case of Hezbollah, the murderers of more than 240 United States Marines, American diplomats and others in the deadly attacks on the Marine barracks and U.S. Embassy in Beirut. Key members of the Islamic Institute's staff have come from Alamoudi's organization; one has acknowledged personally contributing to a U.S. government-designated terrorist support entity -- the Holy Land Foundation -- even after the President personally declared that "terrorists benefit from the Holy Land Foundation and we're not going to allow it." The President has correctly stated that those who aid terrorists are as guilty as the terrorists themselves.

Hence my criticism. In my opinion, people who afford terrorist-supporters or -apologists and their organizations entree into the White House deserve to be both challenged and criticized. Accordingly, during my CPAC remarks I mentioned by name a current Cabinet Affairs official who was publicly thanked by leaders of the AMC for admitting them and representatives of the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR) into the White House complex on January 16th. Bear in mind that this "dialogue" took place just three weeks after CAIR sued the Attorney General, within months after another suit was filed by the lawyer for the AMC's friends in Hamas against President Bush and Secretary of State Powell, and even as representatives of the two organizations incessantly attacked the President and his policies on Iraq, the monitoring of aliens from terrorist-sponsoring nations and prosecution of suspected terror operatives. Notably, after the White House visit, the leader of the AMC accused President Bush of "calling on God to kill innocent Iraqi children."

National Journal recently reported that you promoted those specific groups at least as early as the 2000 presidential campaign when you personally introduced them to then-candidate Bush.

The judgment of those responsible for extending the privileges of White House and other high-level access to such individuals and organizations is a legitimate matter for scrutiny and debate by security-policy practitioners. Your efforts to stymie such deliberations by shrilly alleging religious and racial bigotry -- while remaining silent about the pro-terrorist groups' attacks on the President and his administration -- sound too much like the last refuge of the proverbial scoundrel.

The question occurs: Why have you gone to such lengths to defend -- to say nothing of legitimize and advance the agendas of -- terrorist sympathizers and others hostile to everything for which American conservatives stand? I urge you to address forthrightly questions that have appeared repeatedly in the press about the Islamic Institute, including allegations that it is itself predominantly funded by foreign governments, shady Saudi sources, and U.S.-based groups raided by the Treasury Department-led Operation Green Quest Task Force for allegedly funding suicide bombers, al Qaeda and other terrorists' activities.

I hope you will also explain your involvement with the radical leftist National Committee to Protect Political Freedom (NCPPF), from which you accepted an award shortly before the September 11, 2001 attacks -- despite the group's thirty-year public track record of promoting domestic and international terrorist causes. The New York Times reports that the NCPPF's president, Sami Al-Arian, has long been the subject of an FBI investigation as an alleged leader of the Palestinian Islamic Jihad, which the State Department lists as a terrorist group. Videotape aired on national television shows Al-Arian raising money for terrorists. Were you or your organization also responsible for introducing Al-Arian to then-candidate Bush during the 2000 campaign?

After September 11, you encouraged and led conservative opposition to the Administration's domestic anti-terrorism laws then under consideration on Capitol Hill, in the process pitting yourself against the efforts Solicitor General Ted Olson whose wife, Barbara, was killed in the plane that struck the Pentagon. You were also featured prominently in a highly misleading 24 July 2002 front-page New York Times article that suggested a wholesale loss of faith on the part of conservatives in Attorney General John Ashcroft.

You will only compound the political liability your conduct has become if you persist in obscuring the purposes and financing of your institute and related activities, and in declining to address forthrightly the many other disturbing questions that demand honest answers.

Finally, I am amazed that you would try to dress up your transparently self-serving bid to prevent fully warranted criticism of the pro-Islamist behavior described above with platitudes about the conservative movement and its beliefs. Your conduct bears more of a resemblance to Stalinist despotism, with its ruthless insistence on adherence to the "party line" and purges, than it does to the principles of individual rights (such as freedom of expression) that I and all true conservatives hold dear.

This tendency has been particularly marked of late in your abuse of your chairmanship of the Wednesday Group. You have come to employ these meetings, which I have attended fairly regularly for seven years, as a means of mainstreaming individuals and organizations that have Islamist ties as well as to suppress dissenting views.

It is you who owe George W. Bush, his Administration and conservatives throughout this country an apology and, better yet, corrective action wherever it may be possible to undo -- or at least to limit -- the damage you have done thus far.



Eleven George J. Mitchell Scholars have been selected in a nationwide competition for a year of post-graduate study at universities in Ireland and Northern Ireland. The Mitchell Scholarship identifies outstanding young Americans who exhibit the qualities of academic excellence, leadership and community service.

Only in its fourth year, the Mitchell Scholarships are already considered one of America's most prestigious fellowship programs. Three recipients in the last three years have withdrawn from the Rhodes competition and others have turned down Fulbright and Marshall Scholarships to accept the Mitchell.

The Mitchell program this year had nearly 300 applicants from across the United States, a record number.

Commenting on the new Scholars, Senator Mitchell said, "Individuals committed to public and community service have been instrumental in creating much of what is positive about our country. I am delighted that this fourth class of Scholars embodies those important values. I am confident they will learn much and contribute much during their time on the island of Ireland."

The Mitchell Scholarship program was inaugurated in 1998 with an endowment from the Government of Ireland. The pro-

gram seeks to link the next generation of American leadership with the island of Ireland. Other significant financial support for the Scholarships is provided by the Northern Ireland Executive, two anonymous donors, Automsoft, Becton Dickinson, Bombardier Aerospace (NI) Foundation, Cross Atlantic Capital Partners, Crucible, and the McDonnell Charitable Foundation.

USIT, Ireland's premier student travel organization, provides a travel stipend to each Scholar. Universities in Ireland and Northern Ireland are important partners in the program and furnish housing and tuition to the Mitchell Scholars.



Mr. Rove would be welcome at any time on the agenda. They will be meeting on the evening of April 9th for dinner (though he could certainly just do a drop-by if he so chooses) and the morning of April 10th between 8:00 and 12:00.

CHA expects to have about 29-30 of their Board attending. Together, they treat approximately 1-6 patients in America, so it certainly is a solid venue for Mr. Rove.

They would expect him to discuss health care issues, and certainly understand that he would give more of an overview, than detailed position.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

ADJUSTMENTS OF CERTAIN RATES OF PAY

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, including the laws cited herein, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. Statutory Pay Systems. The rates of basic pay or salaries of the statutory pay systems (as defined in 5 U.S.C. 5302(1)), as adjusted under 5 U.S.C. 5303(a), are set forth on the schedules attached hereto and made a part hereof:

- (a) The General Schedule (5 U.S.C. 5332(a)) at Schedule 1;
- (b) The Foreign Service Schedule (22 U.S.C. 3963) at Schedule 2; and
- (c) The schedules for the Veterans Health Administration of the Department of Veterans Affairs (38 U.S.C. 7306, 7404; section 301(a) of Public Law 102-40) at Schedule 3.
- Sec. 2. Senior Executive Service. The rates of basic pay for senior executives in the Senior Executive Service, as adjusted under 5 U.S.C. 5382, are set forth on Schedule 4 attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- Sec. 3. Executive Salaries. The rates of basic pay or salaries for the following offices and positions are set forth on the schedules attached hereto and made a part hereof:
 - (a) The Executive Schedule (5 U.S.C. 5311-5318) at Schedule 5;
 - (b) The Vice President (3 U.S.C. 104) and the Congress (2 U.S.C. 31) at Schedule 6; and
- (c) Justices and judges (28 U.S.C. 5, 44(d), 135, 252, and 461(a), and section 140 of Public Law 97-92) at Schedule 7.
- Sec. 4. Uniformed Services. Pursuant to section 601(a)-(b) of Public Law 107-107, the rates of monthly basic pay (37 U.S.C. 203(a)) for members of the uniformed services, as adjusted under 37 U.S.C. 1009, and the rate of monthly cadet or midshipman pay (37 U.S.C. 203(c)) are set forth on

Schedule 8 attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Sec. 5. Locality-Based Comparability Payments. (a) Pursuant to sections 5304 and 5304a of title 5, United States Code, locality-based comparability payments shall be paid in accordance with Schedule 9 attached hereto and made a part hereof.

(b) The Director of the Office of Personnel Management shall take such actions as may be necessary to implement these payments and to publish appropriate notice of such payments in the <u>Federal Register</u>.

Sec. 6. Administrative Law Judges. The rates of basic pay for administrative law judges, as adjusted under 5 U.S.C. 5372(b)(4), are set forth on Schedule 10 attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Sec. 7. Effective Dates. Schedule 8 is effective on January 1, 2003. The other schedules contained herein are effective on the first day of the first applicable pay period beginning on or after January 1, 2003.

Sec. 8. Prior Order Superseded. Executive Order 13249 of December 28, 2001, is superseded.

Dear Tim:

Thanks so much for meeting with me yesterday to discuss CAPE's strong interest in school choice.

So many factors seem to be falling in place to boost the prospects for a school choice initiative in the 108th Congress. Eight of the ten new members of the Senate are school choice supporters, increasing the net pro-school-choice vote by two. The Republican gain in House seats improves the chances for school choice there as well.

The tax code would seem to be the likely place to start. There was substantial support in the House and within the private school community in the 107th Congress for HR 5193, Rep. Schaffer's bill to provide an education tax break to low-income families. Among members of the 108th Congress there seems to be growing bipartisan support for using the tax code to stimulate the economy. An education tax proposal serves that purpose. On the November 10 edition of Fox News Sunday, Evan Bayh put tuition tax credits for college expenses in the category of "fiscally responsible tax cuts, tax cuts that will actually help to get the economy going." Tax credits for elementary and secondary school expenses could surely be described the same way.

I believe a pivotal factor will be the Administration's willingness to expend political capital on behalf of school choice measures such as education tax relief. We would welcome the Administration's support and stand ready to involve the private school community in any discussions designed to craft such a measure.

Congratulations on the election results. You are a brilliant and talented strategist. We in Alabama, knew this early on, but thanks for your work and service. You are making our country a better and stronger nation.

It would help us so very much, if the President would ask, not only, that his tax cut be made permanent, but that the effective date of total repeal of the death tax be January 1, 2003. Many of my clients are older and may not make it to 2010. It seems unfair that families be slammed, because the patriarch or matriarch happens to die one or two years too early. It would also seem to help the economy, to let business owners put dollars they commit to estate planning legal and accounting fees or life insurance premiums, into growing their business and providing more jobs. I and my other 12 estate planning partners will find other productive work to do.

As I have mentioned so often, repeal of the death tax, coupled with repeal of step-up in basis will not cost the treasury any significant dollars. You will see in the President's new budget, a line item for revenue loss, from the current step-up in basis. I bet it will exceed \$31 Billion a year

as it has in the past. The death tax only collected \$29 Billion last year. It is certainly a better system to let heirs pay taxes when and if they choose to sell and can plan as opposed to nine months after an often unexpected death.

Words of Advice

The speech the president should give on the Michigan cases.

y fellow Americans, today, at my instruction, the Justice Department is filing a brief with the Supreme Court. That brief tells the Supreme Court that, in the opinion of this administration, it is unconstitutional and illegal for the universities and colleges to discriminate on the basis of skin color or where someone's ancestors came from in deciding who is admitted.

I want to say a few words about why I decided to file that brief, and what the brief says and what it doesn't say, because there is likely to be lot of confusion and misinformation about it.

Many colleges today treat applicants differently depending on their race or ethnicity. In other words, they discriminate. That is not right, and that is not what the phrase "affirmative action" originally meant, and it is not the kind of affirmative action that I or the overwhelming majority of all Americans — black and white, Asian and Latino, Arab American and American Indian — want.

The original meaning of the phrase was to require positive steps — affirmative action — to get rid of the unfairness that had come to permeate many businesses, governments, and other institutions, including colleges. It had another early meaning, too: making sure that everyone was reached out to, not just a few.

Those kinds of affirmative action were and are good, and should be continued. They are what I call "affirmative access." I would add to that financial aid and other help to reach out to students who need it, no matter what their skin color or ancestry.

But somehow another kind of affirmative action began, too — one that twisted and distorted the original ideal of the civil-rights movement into its exact opposite. That kind of affirmative action was not *ending* discrimination but *using* it, the only difference being that there became a new set of victims.

There is no place in 21st-century America for discrimination on the basis of skin color. Any political leader must be clear, consistent, and credible in opposing such bias. I took the lead in condemning the recent remarks of a senator of my own political party for that very reason. And, for exactly that reason, my administration is filing a brief today that supports an end to the new system of racial and ethnic preferences that has, unfortunately, come to honeycomb our colleges and universities. It doesn't matter whose ox is being gored: Racial and ethnic discrimination is wrong.

I think that all Americans would agree that our goal should be to have a society where no one should be favored or penalized because of race or ethnicity. The only question is, Do we follow that principle now, or wait until some unknown, uncertain future day?

I say the time is now. A 17-year-old applying to college today is not a former slave, did not live during the Jim Crow era — he or she has born in 1984, twenty years after the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was passed.

I know that discrimination still exists. But, unfortunately, there will always be some discrimination. And I do not think that the best way to fight bias is with more bias. We have laws on the books that prohibit discrimination, and I pledge to you that I will aggressively enforce them and, where necessary, strengthen them.

Nor do I deny that too many Americans have limited opportunities because of the circumstances into which they are born. Some are members of minority groups and some are not, just as some well-to-do people are members of minority groups and some arc not. Some disadvantaged children may be able to trace their circumstances to discrimination, others might not, but, really, what difference does it make whether the unfairness is of one kind or another? No child deserves to be denied an opportunity by any accident of birth, and no child should be left behind.

We will not make race relations better by picking winners and losers based on race. If the government creates double standards, or triple or quadruple standards, by ranking blacks ahead of Hispanics ahead of Asians ahead of whites, it will create only resentment and stigmatization.

And besides, the use of racial and ethnic preferences is just plain unfair. It is unfair to those who are denied a spot in school, and it is insulting to those who are supposedly benefited. African Americans have made enormous contributions to our national life and culture for hundreds of years in the teeth of slavery, Jim Crow the worst discrimination you can imagine. And now we are telling them: You cannot be expected to succeed unless we lower the bar for you.

I don't buy it. I reject the soft bigotry of low expectations. No child should be left behind, but every child and every American will be held to the same standards as every other one of his countrymen.

There is another reason why racial and ethnic preferences are wrong. It requires the government to pigeonhole people as if everyone were either pure black or white, Hispanic or non-Hispanic, just one or the other. The truth is, as we learned in the latest census, not only is the American population increasingly multiracial and multiethnic, but so are Americans as individuals.

This is true of my own family, it is true of Tiger Woods, and it is true for millions of Americans. Few of us are just black, or just Hispanic, or just Native American. And so how can it make sense for us to grant preferences as if we were? And how are we supposed to rank who is the most deserving when there are an infinite number of racial and ethnic combinations, and that variety keeps growing as America does?

Most Americans believe as I do that it was always wrong to penalize people for their skin color or ancestry, and most Americans also believe that it is wrong to do so now. We can end the newer discrimination and still remain vigilant that discrimination of the old kind is punished, too. Racial profiling is wrong whether it is police stopping a black teenager or colleges telling an Asian teenager that they have "too many" of them already.

We should continue to have the kind of affirmative action that means taking special steps to root out prejudice and reaching out to everyone. We should have affirmative access. But we should end the affirmative action that gives preferences to some over others because of race or ethnicity.

When Thurgood Marshall was the lead attorney in *Brown* v. *Board of Education*, he wrote: "Distinctions by race are so evil, so arbitrary and insidious that a state bound to defend the equal protection of the laws must not allow them in any public sphere." In that landmark case he insisted that "classifications and distinctions based upon race or color have no moral or legal validity in our society." He was right.

We are all Americans. God loves us all, and wants us to love one another no matter what our outward appearance. There is no room for bigotry in the heart of a patriotic American, and our institutions of higher education should likewise be colorblind. That is what I am telling the Supreme Court today.

Thank you, and God bless America.

Police sources said Ic ephine Lin was found in the kitchen of her co-op in Williamsburg's Lindsay Park Houses, her ha ds and feet bound with duct tape.

Her husband was on the livir 1 room floor, his arms taped to his sides and duct tape covering his mouth and nose.

There were no signs of force entry, leading authorities to believe the Lins may have known the killer.

Detectives yesterday questioned their son, Samuel Lin, who used a key to get into the co-op after the couple failed to answer the p. one. Samuel Lin told cops he last saw his parents at 3 p.m. Monday after taking his father to the docto

Cops said there were no suspects in the slaying of the Lins, who had four children and many grandchildren.

"We're looking at everyone," a high-ranking police official said.

The couple, immigrants from Taiwan, owned two co-ops in the federally subsidized 2,700-apartment complex, which has three Ol mpic-size pools.

The Lins were killed in their 20th-floor flat, which police sources said Josephine Lin, who retired two years ago as an insurance age it for Metropolitan Life in Queens, used for her private business. They lived in an apartment one flor above. The couple, registered Republicans, donated more than \$25,000 to Pataki, more than \$10,000 to Giuliani and \$500 to failed mayoral or ididate Mark Green, among others. "The governor is shocked and saddened," said Mollie Fullington, a Pataki spokeswoman.

Assemblyman Vito Lopez (D Brooklyn), who knew the Lins for 20 years, said Josephine helped newly arrived Asian immigrants.

"They were pioneers in Linds y Park. They were one of the first Asians to move in, and now there are hundreds," he said. "She was Iways helping Asian-Americans out. She was their leader. They went to her."

"They were the kindest people in the world, always polite, generous, and filled with love," said Ellen Young, a friend of the Lins.

Until a few years ago, Joseph: le Lin sat on the complex's co-op board and headed its vacancy committee, which selected prespective owners from a waiting list.

Ms. Lin, who sold policies for the Metropolitan if Insurance Company, raised tens of thousands of dollars for Republican candidates, including Gov. George E. Pataki.

Memorable lines

Right after President Bush's State of the Union speech Tuesday, three Nevada political analysts were asked to select the most memorable lines.

Billy Vassiliadis of R&R Partners chose this comment by Bush on the war on terrorism: "The war goes on and we are winning."

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Vassiliadis, a Democrat, said Bush "continued to alert us to the threats of bioterrorism, but he told us we are winning and people are going to love that. There's an incredibly powerful undertow in America, this fear of terrorism. When he said there have been 3,000 suspected terrorists arrested, that was incredibly meaningful."

Former Republican Clark County Chairman Steve Wark liked this comment: "We exercise power without conquest, and sacrifice for the liberty of strangers." Wark also found powerful the moment when Bush spoke of his \$600 million drug treatment program and told viewers, "The miracle of recovery is possible and it could be you."

"He was very evangelical in his delivery," Wark said. "He feels very comfortable speaking to the soul of America. George Bush would never be so glib as to say, 'I feel your pain.' But he would look you in the eye and say, 'I'm here to help you act on your hope.' "

Pat Goodall, former president of the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, said the most memorable line was when Bush was discussing potential war with Iraq and said: "The course of this nation does not depend on the decisions of others."

"That's the one that stuck with me, " Goodall said.

Reid retraction

On January 21, the day after the Martin Luther King holiday, Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., took to the Senate floor and blasted President Bush as part of an ongoing Democratic effort to highlight racial issues.

Citing Time magazine as his source, Reid said Bush had reinstated a Memorial Day practice of sending a White House wreath to the Confederate Memorial at Arlington National Cemetery.

Accusing Bush of undermining "the unity and harmony of our society," Reid used the magazine report to underline what he said were big differences between the parties on

civil rights.

Oops.

Turned out the report was wrong. The practice never had been stopped, and President Clinton had sent wreaths to the Confederate memorial as well.

Additionally, wreaths are sent as a matter of routine to other war memorials at the cemetery.

The magazine issued a correction, and so did a somewhat embarrassed Reid in a short follow-up speech last Wednesday.

"I apologize to President Bush, as my remarks ... were inaccurate, " Reid said.

Looking for the last word, however, Reid added the wreath-laying practice still is wrong "and should be discontinued by President Bush."
