As I write this, the Iraqi war is going well, boosting the popularity of the President's job performance. The administration is attempting to incorporate its tax cut number into the Congressional budget resolution. Democrats are bitter and divided in response. This seems a promising situation for the administration, but this future problems loom. This memo focuses on how to avoid them.

Given their desperate situation, the Democrats are aggressively seeking issues for 2004. Domestic issues now exist the Democrats can effectively exploit next year. The administration needs some important domestic policy successes between now and mid-2004 to blunt these Democratic opportunities.

Three issues are central for your political strategy in the short term: tax cuts, managing the deficit and health care. I consider each of these in turn.

Your political success greatly depends on the tax cuts your proposed that are most likely to produce short-term economic stimulus. The economy must be in better shape in late 2004 than it is today, and the right tax cuts are a key means to that result. The President in his State of the Union speech correctly emphasized individual income tax cuts because they promise the greatest immediate stimulus. The prospects for your dividend tax cut, as you know, remain uncertain in Congress.

The large deficits likely to result from war costs and tax cuts are politically tolerable only in the very short-term. Even then, large deficits totaling over \$300 billion annually entail several political risks. First, the deficits will eventually splinter your support among Congressional Republicans regarding fiscal issues – already those complaints have begun. Second, deficits hand an economic issue to the Democrats for 2004. The large deficits in 1991-2 handed a helpful issue to Ross Perot and Bill Clinton in their race against the president's father. Third, persistent high deficits endanger your pursuit of other desirable policies, most notably reform of Social Security.

The conclusion is clear - over time, large deficits become a considerable impediment to your strategic success. Tax cuts focused on short-term economic stimulus will satisfy your partisan base help you greatly in the 2004 elections. Large and persistent deficits will prove a primary impediment to your longer-term political success. Spending restraint, then, is an absolute political imperative now.

Democrats plan to make health care one of their signature issues for 2004. The administration needs to demonstrate policy results in this area by mid-2004 in order to take this issue away from them. The top priority is passage of a prescription drug benefit. This is popular in the polls and its passage will greatly impede Democratic success on

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this issue in 2004. Passage of a prescription drug plan will help with the crucial group of older voters and with many of their middle-aged children, who worry about the financial burdens of caring for aging parents.

Two other health care issues remain important, however. First, I can tell you from personal experience that health care costs are mushrooming for working Americans. Private care plans are raising fees and restricting services. Passage of a patient's bill of rights or similar reform can help you address this problem. Increasing numbers of Americans are losing their health care. Measures to broaden access to private health care might help regarding this. In these matters, Majority Leader Frist can be of great assistance to the administration.

The president's success in Iraq will probably matter more to voters in 2004 than did victory in the 1991 Gulf War. The terror threat epitomized by 9/11 will cause that. But it is wrong to think that Democrats are without opportunities in 2004. Karl Rove is right to view the 2004 election as a very competitive one. That is why action now on health care, simulative tax cuts and managing the deficit is of cardinal importance for you.

I note that you are targeting Minnesota as a key state in the 2004 presidential election. The state is a promising target for you, but carrying it for the president remains a large challenge. Minnesota's long liberal heritage is weakening, but it remains considerable. In recent polls, the president's job approval has been a bit lower in the state than nationally, though not by the ten percent margin that characterized his father's popularity gap. Statewide polls also reveal a bit lower support for the Iraq war than evident nationwide. The Minnesota Gore/Nader vote was about 53 percent, equivalent to that of Michael Dukakis in 1988.

Rising Republican prospects in the state result from the large and continuing growth of a suburban ring around Minneapolis/Saint Paul. Your campaign will do well in the state if your model your appeal on that of Senator Norm Coleman and Tim Pawlenty. They are clearly conservative, but present a warm and appealing persona. Despite a record budget deficit, Pawlenty's plan for budget balance without raising taxes has proven popular – a sign of how the state is changing. Ten years ago, Republican Governor Ame Carlson's budget balancing plan was poorly received and gave Democrats a great political opportunity. That has not happened this year.

I recommend you watch the Pawlenty experience closely. If he succeeds in his budget balancing and retains his current popularity, you have in him a formula for how conservative Republicans can succeed in states that are less conservative than many. Pawlenty and Coleman can give much good advice on how to carry the state in 2004.

Do keep up the good work.





COOPERATIVE G8 ACTION ON TRADE

1. We stress our faith in and commitment to the multilateral trading system, which has contributed so much to international growth, stability and sustainable development for over fifty years. We believe that continued trade opening, combined with stronger international trade rules and disciplines, represents the optimum path to global growth, both in the G8 countries and elsewhere, and particularly in developing countries. The multilateral system embodied in the World Trade Organization (WTO), and the current Doha Development Agenda, is thus central to the G8's approach to energising the global economy, increasing employment, spurring sustainable development, improving international governance, and eradicating poverty.

2. We will promote the multilateral system by providing leadership in the ongoing negotiations so that improved access to markets for all WTO members is realised, particularly for the poorest, to ensure their integration into the multilateral system, and their development more broadly. We are therefore committed to delivering on schedule, by the end of 2004, the goals set out in the Doha Development Agenda, and to ensuring that the Cancun Ministerial Conference in September takes all decisions necessary to help reach that goal.

3. To these ends, we direct our ministers and officials to pursue urgently with WTO partners the actions outlined below.

3.1 Work towards an agreed framework for finalising the negotiations to achieve further substantial opening of trade in all areas, including in agricultural and non-agricultural goods, and in services, in order to benefit economic growth, trade and employment. In so doing, we will pay particular attention to those areas of interest to developing countries.

- 3.2 Work towards strengthening the existing WTO rules and disciplines, as well as developing further multilateral rules, so as to provide fairer, less distorted, more transparent and more predictable conditions for world trade, and as a contribution to improved international governance.
- 3.3 [Establish a multilateral solution in the WTO to address the problems faced by developing countries with insufficient or no manufacturing capacities in the pharmaceutical sector, before the Cancun Ministerial, rebuilding the confidence of all parties involved in this issue. Pending a WTO solution, to address the practical problems faced by such countries, many of us have instituted moratoria on challenging the provisions to these countries, under compulsory licence, of the life-saving drugs for aids, tuberculosis, malaria, and other infectious epidemics of comparable gravity and scale.]

3.4 In accordance with the Doha mandate, seek agreement on the negotiating modalities for each of the four Singapore issues of investment, competition, transparency in government procurement and trade facilitation.

- 3.5 Deliver capacity building technical assistance to developing countries in need to help them participate fully in WTO negotiations, implement trade agreements, and respond to the trade opportunities created, in cooperation with other bilateral and multilateral donors.
- -- (FASS to insert aggregate member country efforts with comparison of evolution over time)
- 3.6 Better integrate trade, finance and development policies, and by using relevant institutions, make trade an engine for economic growth and help developing countries make the transition to full participants in the global economy.
- 3.7 In recognition of the fact that preference programmes for poor countries have an important transitional role in bringing them into the global trading system, improve our preferential trade agreements and/or programmes with developing countries, in terms of increased market opportunities, stimulating regional integration and trade between developing country partners, and ensuring that the rules and procedures underpinning programmes and/or trade agreements do not constitute barriers to the enjoyment of the preferential benefits nor impede multilateral trade liberalisation envisioned as part of the Doha agenda. We will each work to ensure that the rules (particularly rules of origin provisions and documentation requirements) do not inadvertently preclude eligible developing countries from taking advantage of preference programmes.

To be inserted in the Africa report :

[In particular, we remain convinced that Africa and more specifically the Sub-Saharan Africa deserves special attention to overcome the risk of further marginalisation of the Continent in the global economy. It is in this spirit that we agree on the following Action Plan for Africa:]

1. We reiterate our commitment to the objective of duty-free quota-free market access for products originating from LDCs, most of which are located on the African Continent.

2. [With the aim of providing an equivalent level of effective market access, we are resolved to put in place arrangements providing for enhanced preferential market access for other Sub-Saharan African countries not yet a party to a free trade agreement with a developed country, based on convergence towards the most favourable market access offered by a G8 country to these countries.

[We instruct our trade officials to explore how to implement this objective in practice.]

4. [We commit ourselves to a moratorium for all forms of agricultural export subsidies applied to exports to Sub-Saharan Africa, including support offered through export credits, food aid or state trading entities. We instruct our trade officials to explore how to implement this objective in practice. The moratorium would be in place for the duration of the negotiations of the Doha Development Agenda]. OR

[We commit ourselves to a moratorium on the use of agricultural export subsidies, as currently defined in the WTO, applied to exports to developing countries, as well as in products of importance to developing countries regardless of destination. We instruct our trade officials to explore how to implement this objective in practice. The moratorium would be in place for the duration of the negotiations of the Doha Development Agenda].

5. [Recognising that commodity shocks are a challenge for developing countries generally, especially for the poorest countries in Africa, we welcome the efforts underway by the IFC to examine the potential for viable, market-based mechanisms in developing countries to help mitigate weather and commodity shocks. We also note the pilot projects aimed at offering market-based price insurance mechanisms that give producers access to tools that limit their exposure to the short-term volatility of commodity prices. We will give further support to the identification and development by the international financial institutions of appropriate opportunities to use such market-based mechanisms.]

ACTION PLAN ON HEALTH

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INTRODUCTION

Global health crises call for close international co-operation on policies and methods. We reaffirm our commitment to achieving the development goals set out in the Millennium Summit and at the World Summit on Sustainable Development. We will work in partnership with developing countries, the private sector, multilateral organisations and NGOs to help achieve these health goals. Multilateral and bilateral ODA as well as private efforts from companies and NGOs should match and complement existing efforts to improve health outcomes.

1. FIGHTING HIV/AIDS, TUBERCULOSIS AND MALARIA

1.1 We express our continued concern at the increase in the global **HIV/AIDS** pandemic. We welcome the increased bilateral commitments for HIV/AIDS, whilst recognising that significant additional funds are required. G8 members commit, with recipient countries, to fulfil our shared obligations as contained in the Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS for the 2001 UNGASS.

1.2 We reiterate our commitment to fight against AIDS as well as Tuberculosis and Malaria as agreed in Okinawa, through further actions in such areas as institutional building, publicprivate partnerships, human resource development, research activities and promotion of public health at the community level. We will strengthen our efforts in this fight, both bilaterally and multilaterally.

1.3 We reaffirm our support for the Global Fund to fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria.

1.4 We welcome and support the proposal to host, in collaboration with the Global Fund, an international donors' and supporters' conference bringing together governments, international organisations, NGOs and members of the private sector active in this field in Paris this July. The purpose will be to develop strategies for mobilising resources in order to secure sustainable long term financing for the Fund and other complementary efforts; and to achieve cost effective results-targeted management of the Global Fund.

1.5 We call upon those that have not yet done so to consider increasing their support to the Global Fund as well as to other multilateral and bilateral efforts to combat these infectious diseases.

2. STRENGTHENING HEALTH SYSTEMS

2.1 We emphasise the importance of strengthening health systems as a framework for increasing access of the neediest populations of developing countries to health care, drugs and treatments. We call upon these countries to develop and prioritise their own health strategies and policies. Multilateral and bilateral development assistance, as well as private sector efforts from companies and NGOs, are essential to improving these health systems. Adequate support and financing of health care are needed to increase the number and retention of health care personnel, advance the rational use of medicine, and strengthen drug distribution systems. These efforts are essential to improving access and quality of health care in poor countries.

2.2 We will encourage and support where appropriate the use of information and communication technologies for medical treatment.

3. ACCESS TO MEDICINES

3.1 Building on strengthened health systems, in partnership with others, including public/private partnerships, we will work to develop an integrated approach that will facilitate the availability and take-up of discounted medicines for the poorest in a manner that is fair, efficient and sustainable. We recognise the complexity of increasing access to medicines in developing countries which, among other factors, depends on affordable prices. We welcome pharmaceutical companies' voluntary long term commitments to providing essential medicines at substantially discounted prices to developing countries and strongly encourage further efforts, including through supply competition. We will also work with developing countries to encourage greater uptake of such offers of free and discounted drugs, as are now being made. We support and encourage developing countries to contribute to the goal of affordable medicines by reducing their tariffs and fees on discounted and donated products.

3.2 We will take the steps necessary to prevent the diversion of those medicines away from the countries or regions for which they were intended. We call on recipient governments to do the same and we undertake to provide technical support to assist them to do so. We will not use the preferential prices offered to the developing world as benchmarks for pharmaceutical products on our own markets.

3.3 [To address the practical problems faced by developing countries with no or insufficient, manufacturing capacities, we note that, pending a WTO solution, many of us have instituted moratoria on challenging the provision to such countries, under compulsory licence, of lifesaving drugs for aids, tuberculosis, malaria and other infectious epidemics of comparable gravity and scale. We direct our ministers and officials, working urgently with WTO partners, to establish a multilateral solution in the WTO to address the problems faced by these countries, rebuilding the confidence of all parties, before the Cancun ministerial.]

4. FIGHTING DISEASES MOSTLY AFFECTING DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

We will encourage research into diseases affecting mostly developing countries

4.1 In order to expand the development of effective, safe and affordable drugs for diseases affecting mostly developing countries ("neglected diseases"), we are committed to seeking ways to support world-wide the development of research on health technologies for prevention (including vaccines), control, treatment and cure for these diseases. In particular we will:

- work with developing countries to increase their own ability to contribute to research and development on these diseases, including to create incentives and the necessary regulatory systems to support ethical and safe clinical trials.
- encourage research into these diseases, in our countries too, including by providing appropriate incentives.
- continue to support work already underway in the non-governmental sector.

We will encourage relevant international organisations to keep the situation under active review.

2

5. ERADICATING POLIO

We will work to fully eradicate this disease

5.1 Efforts to eradicate polio have made good progress. But a limited number of countries still register cases.

5.2 In keeping with our pledge at Kananaskis to provide, on a fair and equitable basis, sufficient resources to eradicate polio by 2005, we have pledged an additional x and remain committed to playing our full part to ensure that the remaining funding gap is closed.

6. CONFRONTING THE THREAT OF SARS

We will work together and with others to contain this disease

6.1 The spread of SARS demonstrates the importance of global collaboration, including global disease surveillance, laboratory, diagnostic and research efforts; and prevention, care, and treatment.

6.2 Strengthening international co-operation is key to containing, treating and eventually eradicating this disease. The measures that we take at national levels to effectively handle SARS will benefit from working together.

6.3 We will continue to work closely with the World Health Organisation, to undertake research and investigation at a high level and to develop appropriate means of international co-operation.

Thank you for meeting with me on May 5, 2003, to discuss the challenges facing the domestic steel industry, particularly at Weirton Steel. I was pleased to receive your assurance that the Administration:

 Will not oppose legislative attempts to extend the Emergency Steel Loan Guarantee Program beyond the scheduled expiration date of December 31, 2003;

 Will urge the Emergency Steel Loan Guarantee Program Board to expedite its decision on Weirton Steel's loan application which will be filed in the near future;

• Will provide prompt support of Weirton Steel's possible attempt to obtain federal financial assistance to assist displaced employees; and

• Will consider including certain developing countries currently exempt from the President's 201 steel tariff relief program and express Weirton Steel's desire for such consideration to the Commerce Department. Statistics reveal that these developing countries have significantly increased their steel exports to the U.S. since President Bush imposed the tariffs in March 2002 and in doing so, have lessened the effectiveness of the tariff remedy.

These issues are vital to the longevity of the domestic steel industry and Weirton Steel. As we discussed, without a strong tariff program, other steelmakers would have filed for bankruptcy protection and more mills would have permanently closing. In addition, for those attempting a bankruptcy reorganization, the availability of the Emergency Steel Loan Guarantee Program beyond 2003 could prove essential in emerging from bankruptcy.

Again, I thank you and the Administration for your continued support of the U.S. steel industry. Please contact me if I can be of assistance to you.

This memo follows up on our conversation yesterday regarding the reasons for a meeting between you and leading French "behind-the-scenes" political operative, senior businessman Jean-Louis Gergorin (pronounced "Goran"). As you requested, his biography is enclosed with this memo.

1. M. Gergorin is widely viewed to be a key "kingmaker" in France.

2. EADS, Europe's largest aerospace and defense company (and #2 aerospace and defense company in the world), was Gergorin's idea and its creation was engineered by him. Today, Mr. Gergorin is Executive Vice President of EADS. He is protogee of and brain trust for Jean-Luc Lagardere, former EADS CEO (who died last month).

3. Politically, Mr. Gergorin's reach in France spans the spectrum from Left to Right. He has been a member of several "shadow cabinets" in France ---- both within the Foreign Ministry and in the Ministry of Defense ---- under the Socialists as well as under the current Chirac regime.

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5. Mr. Gergorin is very "pro-American" personally and he currently is working "behind the scenes" to ensure that the next leader of France (after Chirac) is decidedly pro-American (certainly an interesting topic of conversation).

6. Mr. Gergorin has been described to me by more than one leading French journalist and by several top business leaders of Europe as "the Karl Rove of France."

7. I know Mr. Gergorin. He is what people say he is. He is, by the way, quite fluent in English.

8. Mr. Gergorin wishes to meet with you privately. The venue is up to you. I can offer the Metropolitan Club as one alternative. Or he could meet with you at your office or some other convenient place.

9. Mr. Gergorin wishes to meet with you in order to establish a <u>very</u> <u>private</u> dialogue with you. In that regard, he would be operating as an unofficial "back channel" between the leadership in France and you.

10. Mr. Gergorin is of a level of seniority, influence, and power such as to be an appropriate person for you to meet for a chat.

11. Mr. Gergorin plans to be in Washington on May 29th and May 30th. Could you find time to fit him in for a meeting during that period? If not then, please give me alternative times that will suit your schedule.

12. I have no business interest with Mr. Gergorin. I make this request because I firmly believe that such a <u>very private</u> dialogue is needed. It is in America's national interest.

We have just learned that White House invitations have been sent. Despite being on the very top of Condi Rice's list of recommendations, Hank Greenberg's name was dropped for some reason by the Office of the Social Secretary. (He was not invited to either of the two previous State dinners for Poland or Mexico.)

As you may know, AIG is the largest investor in the Philippines. Hank serves as one of two Americans on President Arroyo's Advisory Committee. He served as the founding Chairman of the US-Philippine Business Committee at then Secretary Mac Baldrige's request. He is the first person President Arroyo and other leaders in her administration think of as their biggest private sector supporter in the US. In fact, he is often referred to as "Mr. Philippines" given his extensive involvement in, and knowledge of, the country. (You may know he worked behind the scenes to encourage Ferdinand Marcos to leave.)

In short, it would be quite an embarrassment to the Filipinos, to Hank for sure, and (if I might be so bold to suggest) the White House as well, if Hank is not invited.

Give Us a Paradigm Shift Not Shifty Policy

Tax policy which shifts percents, trades exemptions or favors one group against another is politics. A paradigm shift redirects policy. The exemption of dividends from traction favors production over consumption. It creates future jobs. The gap is bridged by private borrowing- for production – not services or handouts. Corporations pay taxes. The only change is that a dividend deduction replaces the interest deduction while debt equity ratios improve.

Non taxation of dividends is a paradigm shift in the economic life of individuals, corporations and government. Over the past fifty years corporate America has pyramided debt. Non-tax deductibility of dividends has all but wiped out preferred stocks. Individuals were convinced to eschew taxable dividends in favor of capital appreciation. In a generation stock ownership rose from about 8% of the population to almost 60%. These holdings were mostly pensions, IRA's, 401K's and other savings plans.

The stock market bubble burst. Badly burned investors now look approvingly at dividuads. The Board of Directors of debt-laden corporations may welcome the opportunity to recapitalize debt with equity. Widespread such recapitalization would forther lower interest rates.

Let's turn back the pages of history to Ma Perkins, FDR's Cabinet Secretary who conceived Social Security. Unemployment hovered at 20%, interest rates were low and mortality stood at 67/8. Long forgotten is the fact that Social Security was founded primarily to induce a portion of elderly workers to retire at about 1/3 of their annual solary, to create a job shift to employ a younger out of work force with family responsibilities. To finance this response were 45 givers for each recipient based on a \$10 per year contribution (1/2% of \$2,000 per year average income). Against 67/8 year mortality the fund was each flow positive and hailed as one of the great achievements of the New Deal.

Peering through the looking glass from the other end Ma Perkins might find herself aligned with President Bush over the exclusion of dividends from taxation. Unemployment is low. Mortality now rose to the mid 70's. There is pressure by corporations to retire workers early as technology obsoletes the training and education of its older employees. Medical magic extends mortality to seventy five but 50% of all the money we spend on health during our lifetime will be spent during our last six months. And, the cost will continue to rise. Death is a luxury.

For Government to finance this cost it will have to print money (inflation) or confiscate capital (death taxes approaching 100%). The only alternative is forced savings. Pensions, 401K's, IRA's, etc. are now under funded and individuals pinch paychecks as costs vise mostly local taxes. The appearance of a new tax-free income stream would be welcome even if qualified by restrictions (education, health, emergency, etc.). Gradually the burden of social sceurity must switch from Government to the individual. Antipathy between employers and employee will be muted by focus on the same end game a comfortable passage at age 75.

At this point why not have two work cycles. Allow our 55 and older retirees to become civil servants (teachers, hospital workers, postal, local civic, etc.) for a supplemental tax-free modest income to boost the effectiveness of their savings or penalous while at the same time lowering the operating costs of the agencies in which they force. Accomplish this through attrition. Face down the public servant unions.

Consistent with Ma Perkins plan to ease the plight of the young by creating unemployment income for the elderly would be giving the public sector at all levels the opportunity to hire anyone over fifly five years of age for wages with tax free income over and above social security, retirement and other private funds. Obviously these people can be hired at wages far lower than young family providers. The young are better able to compete for higher paying, faster rising jobs in the dynamic high technology market of the future and will build savings. Education will veer right from left. The emcial gap between 55 years of age and rising mortality will be eased by eash flow and insurance absent today for 40 million uninsured Americans will be available.

Private and faith based institutions will step forward and with Government provide a safety net for a drastically reduced pool of Americans who somehow missed the American dream. Charity for the needy is quite different from the need for charity. Everyone deserves his fair share.

Personalization of Social Security can become reality as the young discover the wonder of compounding – interest, whether dividends or capital appreciation when given thirdy or forty years to develop. IOU's by the Treasury are replaced by real cash.

Secretary Rumsfeld proved that intelligence; communication and speed supercede manpower, equipment, and stationary defenses. So also must programs in place for 50 years be reexamined. Carbon paper has been replaced by E-mail and the Internet for all but Government. Static budgets must be replaced with moving matrices reflecting daily changes in markets. Ten year forecasts are laughed at. Five year plans deserve careful study Rumsfeld, Gingrich, and Cheney are not conservatives – they shake fruit from over tipe limbs – they propel rather than impel and they destroy obstacles to change rather than reinforce them.

Preeing dividends from taxation unleashes funds which can hold up our tectering social security while building a larger privately owned corporate base to support it.

We defeated Baghdad - let's defeat Washington.

Cordell Hull Award Acceptance Speech U.S. Senator Chuck Hagel May 8, 2003

The history of America is the history of great leaders. In that pantheon of visionary, wise, and courageous leaders resides Cordell Hull. The Cordell Hull Institute does America and the world an important service by reminding us of the power of Hull's ideas and the strength of his leadership. This included, but certainly was not limited to, his vision of an international economic order that helped build the base for post World War II peace and prosperity.

I am deeply honored to be the first to receive the Cordell Hull Award.

Hull understood, like few others of his time, the connections between trade, democracy, security, and world stability. This required alliances -- coalitions of common interests in a world that would be forever inter-connected. As a U.S. Congressman and Senator from Tennessee, and later as Secretary of State under President Franklin Roosevelt, Hull helped steer American foreign policy away from the misguided tendencies of American isolationism. Those isolationist policies led to global instability after World War I, undermined the American and global economies during the inter-war period, and, in the process, contributed to the origins of World War II. It was at the end of his tenure as Secretary of State in 1944, at Dumbarton Oaks, here in Washington, that Hull and others developed a plan for a United Nations built on the ashes and carnage of World War II.

Hull's influence and achievements with regard to trade and a liberal international economic order were unparalleled during his time. He believed that benefits from free trade would flow to all peoples, and his commitment to free trade never wavered. Hull also knew that the mechanisms of free trade were imperfect. But he understood that trade

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contributed to prosperity, stability, property rights, human rights, more transparent governments, rule of law, and hope for a better life and a better world for all people.

In his memoirs, Hull describes the philosophy that helped inform his approach to foreign policy, that free trade can play an instrumental role in reducing the chances for war among nations. He wrote that he came to believe that,

> "unhampered trade dovetailed with peace; high tariffs, trade barriers, and unfair competition, with war. Though realizing that many factors were involved, I reasoned that, if we could get a freer flow of trade – freer in the sense of fewer discriminations and obstructions – so that one country would not be deadly jealous of another and the living standards of all countries might rise, thereby eliminating the economic dissatisfaction that breeds war, we might have a reasonable chance for lasting peace."

Despite spectacular successes over the last 55 years, we are again today at another defining time in global trade. Our greatest challenges lie in the developing world. Many developing countries are not convinced of the relevance of the November, 2001 Doha Round of WTO talks to their long-term economic development. We know that tradebased development strategies are critical to setting countries on the path to democracy and economic prosperity. But many developing countries have been disenchanted by the previous WTO trade round negotiations. Our challenge, today, in the Doha Round, is to make trade-based development relevant to all nation's interests.

Many developing countries are not able to get to the starting line of trade-based development. The first priorities of the citizens of poor countries are the basics; food, water, shelter, medicine – then maybe training and education. America and other developed nations must not overlook these fundamental requirements and challenges of economic development. We must acknowledge and address them, with constructive and real policies and programs. The U.S. and other industrialized countries must continue to help developing countries build the capacity and infrastructure for trade-based growth, so they may fully participate in, and benefit from, the world trade system.

Economic reform and change means difficult choices and tough decisions. Even in the United States and other developed countries, it is often easier to avoid or defer the tough choices that come from enacting enlightened, long-term economic and trade policies than it is to make these choices and focus on the future. Free and fair trade is not a guarantee. It is an opportunity. Hull's insights and achievements, that helped form the building blocks of global peace and prosperity, do not end with his commitment to more open markets and a liberal international economic order. Hull was a man of many parts, and he understood in a deep and profound way the connection between American power and purpose in world affairs. For Hull, who guided American statecraft during World War II, knew that American leadership meant more than the application of great military power. The experience of two world wars reinforced his belief that international organizations and structures would be critical to future global prosperity and stability. The national interests of the United States could not be separated from global stability. Looking out on the international landscape in 1948, Hull observed that,

> "We are today more powerful in arms and powerful in the cause of peace and humanity. But with our great strength [sic] have come great responsibilities. The heaviest of these, which we have accepted in the light of our power and duties, is that of providing our full share of leadership toward cooperation among nations for peace, justice, freedom, and progress."

Hull's wise counsel is not limited by time. It applies today, just as it did fifty-five years ago. Our successes in defeating communism during the Cold War, and in prosecuting the war on terrorism today, are the result of unprecedented cooperation among our allies in Europe, Asia, and throughout the world. America's long-term interests are almost always best served by working through institutions, coalitions and alliances, such as NATO and the United Nations. Building coalitions is never easy. But coalitions are a kind of diplomatic stock option that allows other countries to invest in our shared interests and policies, both the risks and the gains... serving the purposes of all investors.

The September 11, 2001 attack on America reinforced the necessity of coalitions. We cannot win the war on terrorism alone, and our many successes against terrorism so far have been the result of cooperation with our allies. That said, we cannot underestimate the effect that 9/11 has had on the American consciousness, and its implications for America's policies at home and abroad. We must be vigilant, but we must be balanced in our responses and policies. Our responsibilities to secure our borders and protect our citizens should not undercut policies that promote and protect free trade, civil rights, immigration policy, and other vital dynamics and rights central to America's past and future.

The build-up to the war in Iraq fractured some of our most valued alliances and institutions, including the Atlantic Alliance and the United Nations. These two relationships have been integral parts to America's security and diplomacy since World War II. These fractures cannot be ignored, and must be rebuilt. America has always had differences with friends and allies and we will continue to have differences in the future. But we strengthen our relationships by building on our common interests - not focusing on what divides us.

I regret that there exists today a negative perception of American power and intentions that has fostered concern and resentment among some of the peoples and governments of long-standing allies. While we have never and will never compromise our national security, we must be careful to avert the perception that we are charting a unilateralist course in our foreign policy. A return to the balance of power politics of the 19th century would be a dangerous setback for America and the world. Shifts in alliances occur during times of great change in world history, but we must be careful not to allow these shifts to work against America's global interests.

My late friend and colleague, Daniel Patrick Moynihan, also made this case at last year's commencement address at Harvard University when he said,

> "Certainly we must not let ourselves be seen as rushing about the world looking for arguments. There are now American armed forces in some 40 countries overseas. Some would say too many. Nor should we let ourselves be seen as ignoring allies, disillusioning friends, thinking only of ourselves in the most narrow terms. That is not how we survived the 20th century. Nor will it serve in the 21st."

Re-building Iraq is an opportunity for re-vitalizing our relationships, alliances, and international institutions. What we do next in Iraq, the Middle East and around the world, and how we do it, will help America, in Henry Kissinger's words, "to translate its dominance into a systematic fostering of international consensus." Dr. Kissinger further stated in a recent *Washington Post* op-ed, with regard to Iraq, that,

> "it is in America's interest not to insist on an exclusive role in a region in the heart of the Muslim world and to invite other nations to share the governance – at first coalition partners, progressively other nations, and with a significant role for the United Nations, especially its technical and humanitarian organs."

At the beginning of the 21st Century we find historic opportunities to help build a better world. President Bush has committed the United States, in consultation with our Quartet allies -- Russia, the United Nations, and the European Union -- to implement the Road Map to get the Middle East peace process back on track. This is a critically important step. As we work these single international tracks in Iraq, Afghanistan, the Middle East, and North Korea, we must also work parallel tracks that develop regional security institutions, especially in the Persian Gulf and the Middle East, in order to help build long-term trust and confidence among the states of these regions. Supporting policies that promote and enhance trade and private sector development in these countries is essential for their future. Such policies and institutions will be key to regions moving away from authoritarianism and stagnation toward a hopeful and dynamic future.

Cordell Hull understood that economic prosperity at home could not be de-coupled from peace and stability abroad. America's competitive position in the world is vital to our power, purpose, and future. Economic growth and prosperity are not zero-sum games, at home or abroad. We therefore cannot disconnect our foreign and trade policies from our domestic policies. Both foreign and domestic policies are woven into the fabric of America's national security and our economic prosperity.

Our long-term economic potential depends on confidence and stability. Confidence is gone when there is instability in the world and uncertainty in America.

American power and purpose must be focused on meeting the challenges of today... but not unmindful of the burdens of tomorrow. At the height of American power following World War II, in 1948, Cordell Hull, in a chapter of his memoirs entitled "What of the Future?" advised that, "We have, in fact, reached the time when we should stop, look, and listen. We should analyze ourselves and our position in the world with sharp introspection."

Some time for reflection on America's role in our world at this present critical juncture in history would bring us back to a basic truth that, in addition to great power, world leadership requires trust. And trust is the indispensable coin of the realm. We cannot lead without the confidence of others. Former President George Bush, writing with Brent Scowcroft in *A World Transformed* in 1998, reflected on the importance of a benign perception of American power in promoting stability in world affairs. He wrote that the United States, because of our resources and power,

"has a disproportionate responsibility to use that power in the pursuit of a common good. We also have an obligation to lead. Yet our leadership does not rest solely on the economic strength and military muscle of a superpower: much of the world trusts and asks for our involvement. The United States is mostly perceived as benign, without territorial ambitions, uncomfortable with exercising our considerable power. Among our most valuable contributions will be to engender predictability

and stability in international relations, and we are the only power with the resources and reputation to act and be broadly accepted in this role."

The power of America's steadfast commitment to free trade, democracy, human rights, religious freedom, and economic prosperity has been an inspiration to much of the world, because these values are not ours alone. Cordell Hull knew that America does not have sole ownership of these values. There must be a sharing of a common destiny for all peoples.

In so many ways, America's purpose at the beginning of this new century remains what it has always been: investing in the next generation and in the citizens of the world for a better future. Ours is indeed a shared destiny, and the American experience offers hope for all mankind; for those who have never known the promise of democracy, open economies, universal tolerance and respect for the dignity of all people. Our optimism and ideals are tempered by the cold reality of a dangerous world. The threats from tyranny, terrorism, weapons of mass destruction, disease and poverty allow us no reprieve. But we must meet these challenges just as Cordell Hull and his generation met the challenges of their time. We are better prepared than any generation in American history to meet these 21st Century challenges. This is so because of what past generations of Americans built for us and bequeathed to us – immense power and nobility of purpose. We are now the guardians of this trust.... and we must protect it, build on it, and prove worthy of inheriting it.



He said that despite opposition to the cut plan from some moderate Senate Republicans, "at the end of the day we'll get it. It's not a process that people with weak stomachs should watch." Recent polls have shown Bush's overall approval ratings high, better on foreign policy than domestic "The difference is, one he's popular on and on the other, he's really popular on," said Rove. "I look at how you match him up (in polls) with named Democrats or generic Democrats or Democrats in Congress, and he has a significant lead. Pcople have a real trust in him because they've seen him for three years and because they know what his values arc." But, told that a poll by Franklin Pierce College released Tuesday showed that in New Hampshire, Bush is in a dead heat with a generic Democratic Presidential candidate, Rove said, "I'm not surprised." He predicted "a very close election" and predicted that in any poll specifically pitting Bush against any Democratic contender "where you had to deal with the reality instead of the abstract, he'd be fine." Rove said he is unfamiliar with the Pentagon contract hiring Vice President Dick Cheney's former company to fight oil fires in Iraq and, it was revealed this week, also to operate Iraqi oil fields and distribute Democratic Presidential candidate Howard Dean said yesterday the contract "doesn't surprise me a bit. It's an emblem of an administration that has sold this country down the river." Cheney's office has said repeatedly the vice president has no role in the operations or government contracts Rove said the Pentagon believed it "was important to make certain we had a company with the ability to do certain things — fight the fires and make sure the oil fields get back in operation as quickly as possible. And smart people at the Defense Department wont through this process and determined Halliburton." California Democratic Rep. Henry Waxman questioned Halliburton's expanded role in a letter to the U.S. Rove said Waxman "has a tendency of sending off letters accusing --- alleging --- certain things in order to get a little more attention. And he denied Republicans were trying to exploit the 9/11 tragedy by holding its convention in New York City in late August and early September. He also said the Iraqi conflict was merely one battle in an overall war on terrorism, and, he said, he had "no doubt at all" that weapons of mass destruction will be found.

GAYS AND SOCIAL CONSERVATIVES

Ramesh Ponnuru's NRO piece yesterday on gays and social conservatives was off the mark in several respects. While I do not presume to speak for all social conservatives, I can speak for Family Research Council, which was one of the first organizations to object to RNC Chairman Marc Racicot's meeting with the Human Rights Campaign.

First, FRC did not suggest that "such meetings never take place." While we might question Mr. Racicot's judgment and the prudence of such a meeting, the RNC chairman is free to meet with whomever he wishes, just as FRC is free to criticize such meetings. FRC did question, however, the clandestine nature of the meeting. Even senior officials at the RNC, who had been kept in the dark, privately

expressed shock that Mr. Racicot had met with the HRC leadership. If this was, as Mr. Racicot suggests, merely a routine meeting of the sort the RNC chairman regularly attends as part of his official duties, then why the secrecy? No press was allowed to attend the meeting, and no record of his comments to the group was made so far as is known. Only the gay press and HRC itself have publicly characterized the substance of the meeting. So far, Mr. Racicot has not disavowed those characterizations or the statements attributed to him.

Moreover, the comments attributed to Mr. Racicot at the meeting are most disturbing, especially those which implied that religious conservatives who oppose the gay political agenda are motivated by fear and ignorance. Again, if these statements are accurate, then Mr. Racicot appears to be utterly tone deaf - or openly hostile - to traditional values voters who comprise the vast bulk of the Republican (and President Bush's) political base. The comments attributed to Mr. Racicot, if accurate, are rooted in religious bigotry. Or was he merely pandering to the prejudices of the HRC activists?

Again, social conservatives found the Racicot-HRC meeting troubling because of the secrecy surrounding it. Only the gay activists who attended the meeting know whether the RNC chairman offered a vigorous defense of marriage and family. Did he disavow the relevant planks in the GOP platform? Did he promise HRC anything? We simply don't know.

Unfortunately, Mr. Racicot has a history of conducting business with the gay lobby under conditions of secrecy. As governor of Montana in November 2000, he signed an executive order establishing "sexual orientation" as a protected civil right without the benefit of public hearings or public notice (possibly violating the state's open meetings law). Only gay activists were invited to the hearing that preceded Gov. Racicot's action and opponents were kept entirely in the dark. The governor's action preempted the Montana Legislature, which had refused to pass an expansion of civil rights to encompass sexual conduct. Gov. Racicot simply added this provision to existing state law by executive fiat.

Finally, Mr. Ponnuru sniffs at the idea that social conservatives might stay home in the 2004 election if the GOP and President Bush are perceived as going wobbly on the defense of marriage and other pro-family issues. Mr. Pronnuru charges social conservative leaders with "threatening more than they can deliver." Let me be clear: FRC never threatened anybody. We did, however, warn the White House that the GOP drift on marriage and such aspects of the gay agenda such as domestic partner benefits, hate crimes, and such, could cause some social conservative voters to stay home.

While Mr. Ponnuru might find this idea fantastic, Karl Rove still laments that four million evangelicals failed to vote in 2000. Since church attendance was the single best indicator of voting behavior, the stay-at-home evangelicals cost Mr. Bush the popular vote and very nearly the election. If these evangelical voters were not highly motivated by eight years of the smarmy Clinton presidency, and were not eager to "run to the polls" and put the whole sorry Clinton era behind them, then it is dangerous to dismiss the possibility they might stay home again on Election Day 2004 if their core issue is treated in a cavalier fashion.

Mr. Ponnuru is doubtless right that on a whole array of issues social conservatives love and support President Bush. But they are no less committed to the sanctity of marriage and family. For millions of voters, the sanctity of marriage and family are issues that transcend politics. The GOP goes wobbly on these issues at its considerable peril. "Road Map" Report

Today brings more disturbing news about the evil Israel is combating. Wednesday morning, Israeli naval commandoes seized an Egyptian fishing boat off the northern coast. On board they found eight people, including two Hezbollah operatives, 25 rocket fuses, 15 electronic delay units, a radio activation system, and CDs containing bomb-making manuals. One video presentation, also found aboard, instructs would-be homicide bombers on the best place to stand in a packed bus in order to maximize casualties.

Earlier this week, I sent a letter to President Bush on the Middle East "road map" outlining five principles that should guide U.S. foreign policy. Yesterday, we distributed the letter to members of Congress on Capitol Hill. So far, the response from the grassroots has been overwhelming and now the media has taken notice as well.

Suzanne Fields, writing in today's Washington Times, notes "The letter is particularly significant because it reflects the convictions of the President's large Christian conservative constituency, who aren't afraid to put their clout behind those convictions."

Our message has been heard loud and clear because we were able to put this coalition together. But I couldn't do it without you! Times such as these remind me of how grateful I am for each and every one of you who generously supports our work. Thank you, my friends. We are making a difference!

Santorum Secure

In the wake of the media-generated controversy over Senator Rick Santorum's comments on homosexuality, the "nervous Nellies" in the Republican Party immediately went into damage control mode. For days, top Republican leaders hid in the tall grass and remained silent while the senator was pilloried and slandered. Many believed the senator would pay a price for his bold defense of traditional marriage and family values. Well, they were wrong. We now have polling data out of Pennsylvania that contradicts the "conventional wisdom."

A recent poll of nearly 1,000 registered Pennsylvania voters shows that Sen. Santorum's approval rating stands at 55% -- precisely where it stood before the "controversy." Furthermore, 75% said he should not resign his leadership position in the Senate Republican Conference and 58% said homosexuality was "morally wrong." Keep in mind that Pennsylvania is a "swing state" President Bush lost in 2000. Last year Pennsylvanians chose Ed Rendell, a former chairman of the Democratic National Party, to be their governor! Republican "leaders" who shun any discussion of moral issues, out of fear that they may be called "intolerant" and "bigot," should step aside. They are not representing the values of most voters --Senator Santorum is!

PURPOSE

I.

To thank the Ohio Republican Party Executive Finance Committee for their support and leadership moving towards 2004.

II. BACKGROUND

Tonight's event is intended to promote the strong partnership between the Ohio Republican Party (ORP) and the Party's Executive Finance Committee, which is comprised of 19 of the State's top CEOs and business leaders. This event will provide the Executive Finance Committee with an overview of the party's financial and political plans and an opportunity to meet with local and statewide GOP elected officials. The business leaders in attendance have all committed to contribute \$25,000 a year over the next two years to the ORP Operating Account, the Party's new fund for unlimited, unreported personal contributions as allowed under state election law.

The event includes a program with speakers Bob Bennett (State GOP Chairman), Jim Dicke (Finance Committee Chairman), <u>Barry Jackson</u> (Deputy Senior Advisor to the President), Senate President Doug White, House Speaker Larry Householder, Chris McNulty (ORP Executive Director), Governor Taft, and you. Your remarks will take place at 6:00pm and will be broadcast via speakerphone to event participants. The meeting will already be in progress, beginning at 4:00 p.m.

The ORP has cultivated a relationship with top state CEOs and donors for nearly two decades, which has helped to garner the resources necessary to achieve an unparalleled record of electoral dominance. In the 2002 election cycle, the Party's successful efforts help to:

- Re-elect Governor Bob Taft with 58 percent of the vote, thereby allowing Republican control of the governor's office for 16 straight years, the longest GOP tenure since 1822.
- Elect Jennette Bradley as the State's first African-American lieutenant governor and the first female African-American lieutenant governor in the Nation.
- Elect Republican candidates to the other four statewide offices (State Attorney General, State Auditor, State Treasurer, and Secretary of State) for the second straight cycle.

Proposals to amend the third paragraph on the Access to Medicines section of the G8 text for the Action Plan on Health.

The European Commission insists that the first sentence of the third paragraph be amended as follows:

"[To address the practical problems faced by developing countries with no or insufficient manufacturing capacities, we note that, pending a WTO solution, many of us have instituted <u>temporary</u> moratoria on challenging any <u>Member of</u> the WTO that -, according to the scope and modalities defined in their respective moratoria, would want to export to a country in need <u>medicines produced under</u> <u>compulsory licence</u>.]the provision to such countries, under compulsory licence_; of life saving drugs for aids, tuberculesis, malaria and other infectious epidemics of comparable gravity and scale. We direct our ministers and officials, working urgently with WTO partners, to establish a multilateral solution in the WTO to address the problems faced by these countries, rebuilding the confidence of all parties, before the Cancun ministerial.]"

Moreover, the Commission proposes to reverse the order of the sentences. The second sentence ("We direct Cancun Ministerial") should come first.

Reasons for the amendments to the first sentence.

1. We should delete the reference to "practical" problems (first line of paragraph) Rationale: The meaning of the qualification "practical" is unclear and is in our view unnecessary. The WTO mandate (para. 6 of the Doha Declaration) refers to "difficulties" faced by countries without manufacturing capacities in the pharmaceutical sector, without qualifying these difficulties.

2. We should add the word "temporary".

Rationale: It should be clarified in the text that the moratoria are only temporary options until a permanent solution is agreed in the WTO.

3. Change the wording "provision to such countries, under compulsory licences of" to "any Member of the WTO who would want to export medicines produced under compulsory licence, to a country in need."

Rationale: The meaning of the text as it stands ("provision to such countries, under compulsory licences of ...") is unclear. The proposed text is clearer and actually comes from a letter Ambassador Zoellick wrote to Trade Ministers on 30 December 2002, explaining the moratorium.

4. We should replace the part of the sentence "... of life saving drugs for aids, tuberculosis, malaria and other infectious epidemics of comparable gravity and scale" with "according to the scope and modalities defined in the respective moratoria"

1) The EC moratorium is very different from the US moratorium, both as regards modalities and scope. In particular, it applies to public health problems as covered by the Doha Declaration. Therefore, the initial wording does not adequately describe the EC moratorium (which is broader in scope), so we should opt for a more general formulation that could apply to both the US and the EC moratorium.

2) Given the differences in point of view between G8 Members on the scope of the solution, it would be more appropriate to use a more open formulation, as suggested by the Commission. This would in no way preclude diverging points of views or different interpretations as regards the exact scope of the solution. The same reasoning applies to the use of the word "medicines" rather than "life saving drugs" does not appear in the Doha Declaration, and certainly not in its paragraph 6^1 .

5. The order of the sentences should be reversed

This would place the emphasis on the multilateral solution (which would come first), and emphasise the temporary and accessory nature of the moratorium.

6. The formulation on the moratoria in the Trade text should be aligned to this formulation

¹ Paragraph 6 : "We recognize that WTO Members with insufficient or no manufacturing capacities in the pharmaceutical sector could face difficulties in making effective use of compulsory licensing under the TRIPS Agreement. <u>We instruct the Council for TRIPS to find an expeditious solution to this problem and to report to the General Council before the end of 2002</u>".



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

However, I believe we need to take additional steps to assure that the tyrant is not a a danger to the United States."

Critican la postura de la Casa Blanca con Cuba RUI FERREIRA El Nuevo Herald

Las imágenes de tres balseros intentado esquivar a los guardacostas ante las costas de Cayo Largo han levantado una polémica dentro de la comunidad exiliada, donde muchos aseguran que la Casa Blanca no escucha sus clamores y parece prestar poca atención a la situación cubana.

Los mismos congresistas cubanoamericanos y personal de su entorno, hasta ahora feroces defensores de la administración republicana de George W. Bush, se quejan hasta de que nos los atienden.

"Hace unos tres meses le escribí una carta. Todavía estoy esperando una respuesta y a decir la verdad, no creo que la vaya a recibir nunca", dijo la congresista republicana Ileana Ros-Lehtinen, desde su oficina en el Capitolio.

La congresista cree que la política hacia Cuba creada por la pasada administración Clinton fue diseñada para favorecer al gobernante cubano. De hecho, en sus argumentos ella la llama "política Clinton-Castro". Pero, pese el cambio de administración, Ros-Lehtinen no mostró un mayor optimismo.

"Me siento muy frustrada, pero no me voy a rendir y seguiré batallando, aunque sea contra una administración republicana, en contra de la tiranía", agregó la congresista.

El presidente Bush vino a Miami el año pasado y prometió que endurecería la política hacia la isla. Tanto los congresistas por el sur de la Florida, como importantes comentaristas, se embarcaron en una ofensiva de apoyo al presidente.

Pero ahora, escasos 11 meses después, los aplausos se han convertido en quejas que están tocando a la puerta de la Casa Blanca.

Miembros del entorno de los legisladores, admiten en privado que la Casa Blanca no les está prestando mucha atención, si es que prestan alguna.

"Los contactos a veces son de mera cortesía. Otto Reich [enviado especial para Latinoamérica] es el único que contesta el teléfono", dijo uno de ellos.

Añadió otro: ``Nosotros estamos literalmente cubriéndole las espaldas al presidente, pero me pregunto durante cuánto tiempo. ¿Hasta cuándo lo vamos a proteger cuando la realidad es que, en privado, está pasando otra cosa?".

"Esto se está calentando, no son sólo los congresistas, es también la comunidad que está molesta. La tensión está subiendo y son como dos trenes a punto de chocar", agregó la fuente en el Congreso, que solicitó no ser identificada.

El novato congresista Mario Díaz-Balart, aunque crítico, fue más cuidadoso.

``El presidente es muy firme en relación a las sanciones y el embargo económico, y por eso le estamos agradecidos. Pero creo que por la situación que tenemos ahora en Cuba, se debería tomar pasos adicionales para ayudar a que el tirano deje de ser un peligro para Estados Unidos".

En la carta enviada por Ros-Lehtinen hace tres meses a la Casa Blanca, la congresista se quejaba abiertamente de que todavía los exiliados no habían visto expresiones concretas de un cambio en la política hacia la isla.

De hecho, los cambios introducidos por la administración republicana no alteraron significativamente la política trazada por Clinton, como la de "pies secos, pies mojados". Las nuevas medidas que se anunciaron, están paralizadas, argumentan.

Así, la administración Bush incrementó 10 veces el monto que cada exiliado puede enviar de remesa y, pese a que prohibió los viajes de estudio, los estadounidenses siguen viajando clandestinamente como los hacían antes.

Por otro lado, las fuentes congresionales aseguraron que la Casa Blanca rebajó a la Agencia Internacional para el Desarrollo (USAID) el presupuesto de ayuda a la disidencia interna cubana de \$15 millones a \$6 millones.

"¿Se acuerdan del programa de becas para los disidentes que anunciaron el año pasado? No se puede decir que ese programa esté funcionando, no se puede decir que sea siquiera un programa", añadió la fuente en el Congreso.

Por otro lado, los cuatro balseros que arribaron la víspera seguían ayer en poder de las autoridades. Tres de ellos estaban en el Centro de Detención de Krome, mientras que un cuarto, que nunca llegó a tocar tierra, seguía en custodia del Servicio de Guardacostas.

Se creía que este cuarto inmigrante era Jorge Parrado, pero luego sus familiares fueron informados de que se trataba de otro hombre.

"Estamos perplejos", dijo Sandy Cobas, de Judicial Watch, que había comenzado a representar legalmente a los familiares de Parrado en sus esfuerzos por evitar de que éste fuera repatriado a Cuba. ``Ahora no sabemos dónde está Jorge".

Una mujer de Miami reveló que su hermano, Ramón Aguilar, es el balsero que se encuentra en el barco de los guardacostas, explicó Cobas.

A su vez, otros 12 cubanos se entregaron ayer a las autoridades en Los Cayos después que desembarcaron en dos grupos separados, confirmó el portavoz de la Patrulla Fronteriza, Keith Roberts. Un grupo llegó a Cayo Largo y otro a Cayo Hueso. Al cierre estaban siendo procesados en Krome.



Executive Summary

In April of 1997, with the full support of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ), Prison Fellowship Ministries (PF) launched an unusual correctional experiment - a Faith-Based Pre-Release Program. The program was distinctive in that it was expressly Christian in orientation. The InnerChange Freedom Initiative (IFI), as it would later be named, was officially launched under the recommendation of thengovernor George W. Bush. This unique public-private partnership between TDCJ and PF represented a first for Texas, if not the country. Technically speaking, IFI is a faith-based program operated by PF through a contract with TDCJ. IFI is a largely volunteer driven profound ways. It represents perhaps the first full-scale attempt to offer comprehensive programming emphasizing education, work, life skills, values restructuring, and one-onone mentoring in an environment where religious instruction permeates all aspects of the prison environment.

Reanalyzing data previously compiled and analyzed by the Criminal Justice Policy Council of Texas, this study tracks the two-year post-release recidivism rates for those prisoners that entered the IFI program from April of 1997 through January of 1999, and were released from prison prior to September 1, 2000. In addition, this report summarizes the results of an intensive on-site, multi-year field study of IFI, including indepth interviews with IFI staff and participants.

To allow for a two-year tracking period, IFI participants included in the current study are those who have had the potential to be out of prison for at least two years by September 1, 2002. A total of 177 participants met these requirements and thus form the basis of the IFI study group. Comparison groups were selected from the records of inmates released during the evaluation period that met program selection criteria but did not enter the program. The comparison groups were matched with IFI participants based on the following characteristics: race, age, offense type, and salient factor risk score. A total of 1,754 inmates were identified as the matched group for this study.

Anchored in biblical teaching, life-skills education, and group accountability, IFI is a three-phase program involving prisoners in 16 to 24 months of in-prison programs and 6 to 12 months of aftercare following release from prison. In this ambitious correctional experiment, IFI is responsible for implementing, administering, and funding inmate programs, and TDCJ is responsible for housing and security matters. IFI and TDCJ are testing the proposition that by intentionally working together they will be able to achieve the civic purpose of recidivism reduction and thereby increase public safety. 05/21/2003 18:30 7039

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EXECUTIVE OFFICE

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Among the study's key findings are the following:

- The IFI participants in this study include 75 prisoners who completed all phases of the program (called IFI Graduates), 51 who were paroled early, 24 who voluntarily quit the program, 19 who were removed for disciplinary reasons, 7 who were removed at the request of the staff, and 1 who was removed for serious medical problems. The total number of IFI participants comes to 177 offenders who were released prior to September 1, 2000. IFI participants were compared to a matched group of 1,754 inmates who met the IFI selection criteria but did not participate in the program.
- 2. 17.3% of IFI program graduates and 35% of the matched comparison group were arrested during the two-year post-release period. A program graduate is someone who completes not only the in-prison phases of IFI dealing with biblical education, work, and community service (usually lasting 16 months), but also includes an aftercare phase (usually lasting 6 months) in which the participant must hold a job and have been an active church member for 3 consecutive months following release from prison.
- 3. 8% of IFI program graduates and 20.3% of the matched comparison group were incarcerated during the two-year post-release period.
- 4. Considering all participants, including those inmates who did and did not complete all phases of the program, 36.2% of IFI participants were arrested compared to 35% of the matched group during the two-year tracking period. Among the total number of IFI participants, 24.3% were incarcerated compared to 20.3% of the comparison group during the two-year post-release period.
- 5. Mentor contact is associated with lower rates of recidivism.
- 6. Initial skepticism of the IFI program diminished over time with TDCJ staff eventually embracing the program.
- 7. Narratives of IFI members revealed five spiritual transformation themes that are consistent with characteristics long associated with offender rehabilitation:
 (a) I'm not who I used to be; (b) spiritual growth; (c) God versus the prison code; (d) positive outlook on life; and (e) the need to give back to society.
- 8. Spiritual transformation can best be understood as a developmental process marked by key turning points or events.
- 9. Completing the IFI program, and continued positive pre and post-release mentoring are linked to both the offender's spiritual transformation and rehabilitation.

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10. Lack of post-release accountability via mentors and congregations, the decision of the IFI participants to isolate themselves from those that could most benefit them, and finally, the tendency to not accept personal responsibility for poor decision-making, are factors associated with recidivism.

President Bush's Boy Feels the Sting of His Boss' Mistake

KeepAndBearArms.com -- The New Hampshire State Republican Committee is sponsoring a series of in-state visits from party bigwigs. Last night, Karl Rove, advisor to the President, and a friend of George W. Bush for 30 years, spoke at a lecture hall at Southern New Hampshire University, in Manchester. The hall was full, with several hundred people there, including a state senator, a recent Congressional candidate, and a number of other people I knew. (New Hampshire's a small state.) I sat in the front row, and after Rove's speech, was the last of a half-dozen people to be recognized for questions.

I introduced myself as a director of <u>Gun Owners of New Hampshire</u>, the NRA state affiliate, noting -- for the benefit of the audience -- that even Bill Clinton admitted that the country's 83 million gun owners, and the NRA, delivered the electoral votes of Arkansas, Tennessee, and West Virginia in the 2000 election. I then told of assistant White House Press Secretary Scott McClellan's statement a couple of weeks ago that President Bush had joined Democrat senators Dianne Feinstein and Chuck Schumer in calling for renewal of the so-called Assault Weapons Ban of 1994, due to <u>sunset</u> after ten years in 2004.

My question was whether President Bush was aware that many thousands of gun-rights activists around the country felt so <u>strongly</u> about this that we had drawn a <u>line in the sand</u> (my exact words), and would not support ANY politician -- even President Bush himself -- who supported this atrocious legislation.

Rove began his answer by referring to the tremendous amount of email that the White House had received on this subject, but then he shot back the question of whether we supported Bush in the 2000 elections.

I said "absolutely." His follow-up was that Bush had publicly campaigned on his position of "enforcing existing gun laws," and his position hasn't changed; he was just being consistent. Rove then closed the session and walked off the stage. Just a few minutes later, I approached him to continue in private as he was leaving the building; I was the last to do so before he got into his car. This is where it got interesting: Rove took my arm and literally got in my face, using the old drill sergeant intimidation trick of speaking through clenched teeth with his nose an inch from mine. It didn't work, because I'm taller (and older, and uglier) than he is, and I took HIS arm in turn. He told me that Bush was sticking to his position, but that Congress would never pass the legislation. I told him that there were a lot of us, that we were dead serious, and that if Bush let the ban get renewed he'd lose the election, because freedom is more important than politics. He looked at me -- still with clenched teeth -turned, and walked to his car, obviously angry.

GOOD! First, his anger told me that he knew that the hypocritical strategy was dangerous. More importantly, it tells me he'll remember the exchange.

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

These rocket motors are large composite structures with domes at the end, measuring 8 ft long and 4 ft in diameter. Hoop stress and helical stress analysis using FEM are important in these structures.

Dr. Gramoll has extensive experience in computer-aided design of aircraft and space structures and has worked with Dr. Mensah on Army contracts on advanced composite structures. Dr. Gramoll brings expertise in carbon fiber technology, selection of materials for composites structural applications and test and evaluation of composite materials.

6.0.3 ADVISORY BOARD MEMBER

Dr. Sathya V. Hanagud, is currently full Professor at the School of Aerospace Engineering at Georgia Institute of Technology, Atlanta, Georgia.
