Montana GOP Senate Nominee Suspending Campaign By Adam Graham-Silverman, CQ Politics Reporter

Oct. 10, 2002 - Montana Republican Senate nominee Mike Taylor plans to announce Thursday that he is suspending his campaign against incumbent Democrat Max Baucus, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

In a news conference in Helena, Mont., Taylor was expected to cite the tone of the campaign as the reason he is halting campaign operations.

The state Democratic Party began running an ad this week that accused Taylor of lining his pockets with money from a student loan program at a hair design school he ran.

Campaign spokesman Bowen Greenwood told The Associated Press that Taylor believes the ad, which includes videotape of Taylor from the 1980s in which he is wearing an open-front shirt and gold chains while massaging a man s face, was an attempt by Democrats to portray him as a homosexual.

"At this point, in order to win, Mike would have to stoop to their level," Greenwood said.

The move fueled speculation that another candidate, such as Marc Racicot, a highly popular former governor who is now chairman of the Republican National Committee, could replace Taylor. Last year, Racicot refused to run for the Senate, despite pleas from top Bush> administration officials and national GOP leaders.

New Jersey Democrats succeeded in replacing embattled Sen. Robert G. Torricelli with former Sen. Frank R. Lautenberg on their Nov. 5 ballots, surmounting a GOP legal challenge that was turned back by

the U.S. Supreme Court Oct. 7.

Under state law, Taylor, a state senator who made a fortune with his hair care products and school, can get off the ballot only by petitioning the state Supreme Court, but the situation is differs from New Jersey in several ways. Ballots already have been printed for the race and early voting began Sept. 20.

Write-in candidates, however, can file up to 15 days before the election, leaving an small opening for a challenger to Baucus.

One GOP source said that an effort to substitute Racicot was not behind Taylor s decision.

"I am not aware of anybody actively reaching out to Racicot about the race," the source said.

The Republican National Committee declined to comment on Racicot s interest in the race.

Despite Montana s Republican lean, Baucus has led in recent polls and in the money chase. He often cites his work with President <Bush> on his signature <tax cut law (HR 1836 - PL 107-16) and on Montana issues.

The Democratic ad cites Department of Education letters to Taylor and claims he caused students to default on their loans.

Taylor s wife took responsibility for what she called "clerical errors" that resulted in the letters from the department, but denied that Taylor was involved in a scam to bilk students.



ADMINISTRATION TAKES ACTION TO PROTECT AMERICA'S ECONOMY AND AMERICAN JOBS

PRESIDENTIAL ACTION

- Faced with a growing threat to the American economy and American jobs, the President today used his statutory authority under the Taft-Hartley Act to convene a Board of Inquiry to examine the work stoppage at the West Coast ports. A Board of Inquiry is part of a framework established by Congress to address labor disputes that threaten national health and safety.
- The dispute is a threat to America's national health and safety. The health of our economy in every corner of America is in jeopardy because of the dispute. In many areas of the economy layoffs have begun, thousands more jobs may be lost, and all Americans may soon begin to pay sharply higher prices for household goods.
- Each shipping container at these ports holds a part of the national economy from produce to computers, spare auto parts to lumber, consumer electronics to grain and wheat. Any household good sold on a store shelf can be found in these containers.
- The dispute is estimated by some to be costing America's economy as much as \$1 billion a day:
 - ✓ West Coast ports are crucial to US trade, handling over \$300 billion in trade a year. These ports handle more than half of all containerized imports and exports.
 - ✓ West Coast ports handle 25 percent of all US grain exports, 40 percent of all wheat, 14 percent of all corn, and seven percent of all soybeans exports.
 - ✓ Sixty-five percent of all US containerized food trade moved through these ports in 2001.
 - ✓ Layoffs have already begun in multiple industries around the country.
 - ✓ Millions of dollars in produce, fish, meat and poultry are rotting on docks and ships.
 - ✓ Trade with Asia is particularly affected. Japan, Korea, Taiwan, Hong Kong, China, Indonesia, Thailand, the Philippines, India, and Malaysia are the top 10 destinations for containerized US agriculture products. Together, these nations receive 85 percent of all agricultural shipments from the West Coast.
 - ✓ The costs to the economy become larger and more permanent the longer the ports remain closed.
 - ✓ Improvements in supply chain management mean that shipping delays quickly translate into empty store shelves and cancelled orders.
 - ✓ Air cargo carrier rates are increasing dramatically, increasing the retail cost of those goods shipped by air.
 - ✓ October is a critical inventory-building month for retailers: the value of imports through West Coast ports is greater in October than in any other month of the year. If the ports remain closed, revenues from the holiday shopping season will soon be affected.
 - ✓ As the duration of the shutdown increase, more manufacturers and retailers will use up their remaining inventory. Trucks and trains transporting goods to and from the ports are backing up the longer the shutdown continues, the more time it will take for shipping to return to normal.

- ✓ Reopening the ports, even if only for 80 days, will benefit the economy. The parties will be given time to settle the dispute. Manufacturers and retailers will be given additional time to adjust and prepare.
- ✓ Manufacturing is only barely beginning to recover from the recent recession, having lost nearly 1.9 million jobs in the last two years. Manufacturing cannot afford further jolts.
- ✓ With modern inventory techniques and the increased integration brought by globalization, shutting off much of our trade with Asia will affect not just large importers and producers, but also the tens of thousands of smaller U.S. firms that supply directly-affected firms.

Three times as much of the U.S. economy is now directly related to trade as was the case in 1971, the last time the United States had a major West Coast port stoppage.

- The employment consequences of a continued shutdown would fall hardest on those with the least economic opportunity workers with less job seniority are likely to be laid off first, and low-income families may have little savings to weather the effects of a shutdown.
- The dispute has implications for national defense. The American military relies on commercial ships using the West Coast ports to carry exports necessary for the support of armed forces. In addition, defense contractors receive components and materials through the West Coast ports that are necessary to supply the military's needs. The disruption of the flow of such military-related goods could impact national security.
- The Taft-Hartley process is the government's principal legal means of addressing a labor dispute that could have a devastating national impact. The government first sought mediation as an alternative solution to this dispute. Since the beginning of the dispute, the government has made itself available to help both parties resolve their differences. The Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service (FCMS) has been on the ground seeking a solution since before the work stoppage began. However, the mediation process has not been successful, and the President has decided to take action in order to protect America's national health and safety.

THE ISSUE

West Coast ports have been closed since the second shift on Sunday, September 29, when the Pacific Maritime Association (PMA) shut down the ports in response to a reported work slow-down by members of the International Longshore and Warehouse Union (ILWU).

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT

Step 1: The President's Executive Order

The President's Executive Order establishes a Board of Inquiry. The Executive Order states that:

- A labor dispute exists;
- The dispute affects a substantial part of the maritime industry, an industry engaged in trade, commerce, transportation (including the transportation of military supplies), transmission, and communication among the several States and with foreign nations; and

• A continuation of this lockout will imperil the <u>national health and safety</u>.

The law states that the President may begin the Taft-Hartley process if he determines that the labor dispute issue "will imperil the national health and safety." The President has determined that the short-term and long-term damage to our economy and our national health and safety constitute such a threat.

The President has appointed the following three Board of Inquiry members:

- Bill Brock (Chairman) Served as a member of the House of Representatives from 1963 to 1971, as a U.S. Senator from Tennessee from 1971 to 1977, and as U.S. Trade Representative and Secretary of Labor from 1985 to 1987. Currently Chairman of Bridges Learning Systems, an intervention program for academically troubled students
- Patrick Hardin W. Allen Separk Distinguished Professor of Law, University of Tennessee College of Law. A former Chief Counsel to the Chairman and Associate General Counsel in charge of the Division of Enforcement Litigation of the National Labor Relations Board, Professor Hardin has been on the faculty of the University of Tennessee since 1975. Editor-in-chief of *The Developing Labor Law* (3rd ed.)
- **Dennis R. Nolan** Webster Professor of Labor Law, University of South Carolina School of Law. Professor Nolan has been on the faculty of the University of South Carolina since 1974. Currently serves as Vice President of the National Academy of Arbitrators. Author of eight books and numerous articles on arbitration, collective bargaining, and labor disputes.

The President has chosen these three individuals for the Board because they are <u>unbiased</u>, <u>fair</u> and <u>experienced</u> at labor and employment issues.

Under the Taft-Hartley process, the Board's job is to inquire into the issues involved in the dispute and issue a public report that outlines the facts of the dispute – including each party's statement of its position. However, the law prevents the Board from making any recommendations or choosing sides in the dispute. The Board may only state the facts.

The Executive Order requires the Board to report back to the President by no later than October 8th.

Step 2: Petition for Injunction

After the President receives the Board's report, he may then direct the Attorney General to seek a court injunction to halt the work stoppage. To receive this injunction, the Government must establish that the dispute affects a substantial part of an entire industry and imperils the national health or safety.

If the court issues the legal injunction against further work stoppage, an 80-day clock begins, the ports would open, and employees would return to work.

Step 3: Reconvening the Board of Inquiry

After 60 days, if no agreement has been reached, the Board is required to issue a second public report to the President that includes:

- The current positions of the parties involved;
- The efforts which have been made for settlement;
- A statement by each party of its position; and
- A statement of the employers' (PMA) last offer of settlement.

Step 4: NLRB Secret Ballot Vote

Between days 61 and 75, the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) will conduct a secret ballot vote of ILWU employees on the PMA's last offer of settlement. The NLRB is required to certify the results to the Attorney General no later than five days thereafter.

At the end of the 80-day period the legal injunction is discharged. If the dispute is unresolved, and if ILWU employees have rejected the PMA's final offer in the NLRB secret ballot vote, the parties become free to engage in work stoppages again.

Step 5: President Reports to Congress

The law requires the President to send a final report to Congress on the entire Taft-Hartley process. The report may include further recommendations on how to resolve the labor dispute.

THE THREAT TO AMERICA'S NATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY


The President is taking this first step to protect our economy because the West Coast port dispute is causing serious damage to multiple industries and putting thousands of American jobs in jeopardy. This growing economic damage constitutes a threat to America's national health:

- Ford Motor Co. has 14 plants -- 10 assembly plants and four power train plants -- that receive parts from affected ports in Seattle and Tacoma, Wash., and Long Beach, Calif. The assembly plants that receive parts are Atlanta Assembly, Chicago Assembly, Kansas City Assembly, Louisville Assembly, St. Louis Assembly, Ontario Truck, Twin Cities Assembly, the Edison, N.J. assembly plant, the Norfolk, Va. assembly plant and an assembly and stamping plant in Hermosillo, Mexico. The power train plants affected are Cleveland Engine No. 2, Dearborn Engine, the Sharonville, Ohio, transmission plant and Van Dyke Transmission in Sterling Heights. (Detroit Free Press, October 5, 2002)
- New United Motor Manufacturing Inc. (NUMMI) of Fremont California has run out of material for their production line and has been forced to lay off two shifts, about 5,100 employees. They were told to take two days off. NUMMI builds the Pontiac Vibe, Toyota Corolla, Voltz, and Tacoma pickups. Honda of America Manufacturing is resorting to airlifting critical parts from Japan. (Automotive News, October 4, 2002 and reports to Maritime Administration)
- Matsushita Kotobuki, which manufactures televisions and VCRs for Panasonic, has had to stop
 production. They have laid off 150 workers in Vancouver, Washington. They could be rehired in
 one to two weeks. (KOIN, October 4, 2002)

- Hawaiian Express Service, a freight forwarder in Hayward, California, laid off 100 employees Friday.
 (The Mercury News, October 6, 2002)
- A shipment of blankets, clothing, and medical supplies destined for hurricane victims in Haiti has been stuck in Lynnwood, Washington, since Monday. And a container of similar supplies for Nicaragua is backed up on a rail car destined for Long Beach. (Heraldnet, October 5, 2002)
- Tyson, the world's largest meat producer, said it might have to adjust production in its beef, pork and poultry operations because the fresh meat it exports is perishable. More than half of the country's beef, pork and lamb export products go through West Coast ports, according to the U.S. Meat Export Federation. George's Inc., a poultry and egg company based in Springdale, also is being affected. (Arkansas Democrat Gazette, October 3, 2002)
- If the shutdown lasts even another week or two, it could take more than a month to unsnarl the backlog of idled or ruined goods -- a delay that could torpedo the holiday sales plans of a variety of retailers. Within three weeks, the shutdown could force companies around the country to jettison nearly a quarter-million jobs. (Contra Costa Times, October 2, 2002)
- Eastern Washington farmers and others shipping perishable goods are particularly anxious because the dispute comes during apple and potato harvests. Washington, on average, exports one of every three apples picked in the state, and it's the biggest exporter of french fries in the world. Apples farmers must get off to a quick start in the fruit selling season, said Richard Thomason, who grows red, granny smith, fuji and honey crisp apples on 120 acres in Brewster. If buyers can't find Washington apples, they will simply turn to other suppliers, he added. "I think agriculture is probably going to take the biggest hit on this thing," Thomason, chairman of the Washington Apple Commission, said yesterday. Seattle (WA) Post-Intelligencer, October 2, 2002
- Nissan North America eliminated the Saturday shift at its 6,000-employee plant in Smyrna, Tenn., and will soon shut down if the port lockout continues. The Smyrna plant manufactures almost 500,000 Altimas, Xterra SUVs, and Frontier pickups each year. (Buffalo News, October 5, 2002)
- No. 1 U.S. railway Union Pacific Corp. said the stoppage was cutting sales by as much as \$5 million a day. The Consumer Electronics Association, whose members include Microsoft Corp., said a prolonged lockout could cut consumer electronics sales by \$22-billion this year. Financial Post, October 5, 2002
- Food is rotting in cargo holds, and railroads have halted grain shipments from the Midwest. Wheat futures dropped sharply Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade as concerns rose that the lockout would hurt U.S. grain exports. (Associated Press, October 5, 2002)
- Elope Inc., a hat wholesaler in Colorado Springs, Colo., usually does brisk business this time of year. "We've already lost the Halloween business. It's Christmas I'm worried about now," said company chief executive Kevin Johnson. "If this isn't resolved in the next week, we're dead in the water." (Associated Press, October 5, 2002)
- Layoffs may begin Friday for 15 full-time employees at Quality Trading, one of the largest straw exporters in Oregon. Quality Trading is made up of 22 Willamette Valley farmers who cut, bale, store and ship straw to farmers in Japan, Taiwan and Korea. (Associated Press, October 5, 2002)

- Union Pacific, the nation's largest railroad, had 55 trains parked across the western United States, unable to move cargo. Grain shipments bound for export are sitting in warehouses and growers of perishable goods like apples and citrus worry that their harvests will not reach lucrative Asian markets. (Associated Press, October 4, 2002)
- At New United Motor Manufacturing Inc., half-assembled Toyota Corollas and Pontiac Vibes were sitting in limbo because the necessary engines, transmissions and vehicle frames were sitting in cargo holds at the Port of Oakland. (Chicago Tribune, October 4, 2002)
- California almond growers, who exported \$662 million worth of almonds in 2000, said each day of the shutdown threatens their ability to serve Asian consumers preparing for holidays. (Chicago Tribune, October 4, 2002)
- "We're already in a crisis," said James McCranie, executive vice president of marketing at Seald-Sweet, a citrus growers' cooperative in Vero Beach, Fla. McCranie said the co-op had at least 30 containers trapped at West Coast terminals, the first shipment of a crop of grapefruit headed for Japan. The fruit, which is carried in refrigerated containers that have no independent power source, will quickly rot if not handled properly. "The problem is you have no confidence that your cargo is being properly refrigerated and there's no way to divert it," McCranie said. "It's perfectly fine fruit and could be sold in Washington or Oregon. He complained that shipping lines were not able to give any information about where the cargo was and in what condition. "For a perishable, it couldn't be worse." (Journal of Commerce, October 4, 2002)
- Bill Ciesinski, manager of transportation and logistics at International Forest Products in Foxboro, Mass. said that the lock-out had brought some of his business to a halt. IFP had begun to load 6,000 metric tons of woodpulp aboard a ship in Eureka, Calif. just prior to the port shutdown. Ciesinski said his company was paying detention for the ship, hoping for a quick resolution of the dispute. "I'm holding the ship there because if I don't load it, I have to wait another month," he said. He also has had shipments of waste papers delayed. "It's jeopardizing letters of credits and if it is not settled by Sunday, we are going to lose a significant number of orders," he said. (Journal of Commerce, October 4, 2002)
- Phoenix-based Action Performance (ATN), a maker of die-cast model cars, was hit the day shippers locked out dock workers, on Sunday. The company had a shipment of thousands of model cars that were supposed to be unloaded that day so Action could record a sale before the quarter's end. The cars, however, didn't make it off the ship, so the company had to issue notices saying it wouldn't book \$5.7 million in expected revenue for the quarter. That caused Action's stock to slide \$1.10 to \$19.90 Thursday, a 5.2 percent drop. (CBS Marketwatch.com, October 4, 2002)
- Reports are coming in that such companies as Chiquita Brands (CQB) and Del Monte (DLM) were having to leave perishable goods on docks. Those companies, along with Dole (DOL), are expected to feel the effects. (CBS Marketwatch.com, October 4, 2002)
- California's sole auto plant halted production of Toyota Tacoma pickups and stopped making passenger cars before the end of the normal shift. (Memphis TN Commercial-Appeal, October 3, 2002)
- Gap Inc., the nation's largest clothing retailer, was hoping to receive its first shipment of apparel intended for the holiday season when the port shutdown began last Friday. (Newhouse News Service, October 3, 2002)

Retailers might not be able to get enough toys made in China in time for the holiday season. Electronics and technology companies won't be able to get television or computers assembled in the Pacific Rim, or parts for electronics they make in factories here. Foreign automakers won't be able to import cars or trucks made overseas, or the parts for cars they made domestically. (Atlanta Journal-Constitution, October 2, 2002

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Agriculture: The Heart of the Economy

"Agriculture is not just one industry among many. It is the heart of our economy. And it symbolizes some of the best and finest things about our nation: independence, hard work, risk-taking and sacrifice."

George W. Bush, September 1, 1999 Dallas Center, Iowa

I. Introduction

A. Summary

The President campaigned on major agricultural themes that included expanding the use of risk-management tools, opening new markets for U.S. agriculture and promoting free trade, eliminating the estate tax, advancing alternative use of agricultural products like ethanol and continuing reform of agriculture toward market-driven production. During the first two years of the Bush presidency, there has been real progress in all of these areas.

Agriculture Policy Principles

The Administration has worked to refocus the federal government's role in ensuring long-term prosperity of the U.S. agriculture sector. While working to ensure an ongoing safety net for farmers, the Administration has pursued policies that are predicated on the belief that markets better guide producer's operating and investment decisions, not artificial targets set by government programs. To this end, the President established the following core farm policy principles:

- **Providing a safety net.** Farm policy needs to be generous but affordable. It needs to offer a reliable safety net, while providing stable, predictable funding inside the boundaries of the Budget.
- Market oriented. Farm policy should result in minimal interference by farm programs on market forces, recognizing that poorly designed programs can stimulate overproduction and reduce prices.
- Enhancing conservation. Recognizing the unique role played by our nation's farmers and ranchers in safeguarding and enhancing the environment, farm policy should assist producers by providing incentives for better environmental practices particularly on working lands.
- Expanding markets abroad. The Administration is pursuing the longterm work of opening foreign markets to U.S. agricultural exports through international trade negotiations. Farm policy needs to be trade-

friendly; and, its provisions should reinforce rather than undermine U.S. free trade leadership in the world.

The President's agenda for U.S. Agriculture has two parts: 1) the successful negotiation and implementation of the Farm Bill and 2) the opening of new markets for agricultural products.

Farm Bill Implementation. The President signed the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill) governing farm programs through 2007. The Farm Bill will spend \$180 billion over ten years. By far, the major event in agriculture policy in this past year was the Farm Bill. After several years of low commodity prices, farmers have been looking to Washington for aid. Producers judge the President's farm policy almost exclusively by its effectiveness in delivering financial assistance. Secretary Veneman is implementing the Farm Bill to meet this standard. USDA is rapidly implementing the following programs:

- Sign up for several farm bill and disaster assistance programs (i.e. the \$752 Livestock Compensation Program) have begun and checks are already being mailed. This also includes the implementation of the option for producers to update historical average bases and crop yields.
- Sign-up for the new Dairy Program (the Milk Income Loss Contract Program) is underway.
- Marketing allotments for the Sugar Program announced.
- 2002 national crop loan rates announced
- Peanut program overhaul and buyout.
- Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) payments of nearly \$1.6 billion commence.

The major items of Farm Bill implementation will be completed by the beginning of 2003, with the exception of the conservation title. This leaves pursuit of new markets and enactment of the President's trade agenda as the primary focus of U.S. agriculture policy going forward. This position is enhanced by the achievement of Trade Promotion Authority.

Trade. The future of American agriculture is trade. Ninety-six percent of the U.S. potential customers for agricultural products are outside the United States. In addition, over twenty-five percent of U.S. farm income is generated by exports. U.S. producers export fifty percent of the wheat they grow, nearly forty percent of all cotton, and one third of soybeans. As the President said when he signed the Farm Bill, "Americans cannot eat all that

American farmers and ranchers produce...access to foreign markets is crucial to the livelihood of our farmers and ranchers."

Pursuit of a broad agenda of agricultural trade liberalization will be a high priority for this Administration, including but not limited to, our multilateral World Trade Organization (WTO) negotiations and regional (FTAA/ Central America) and bilateral (Chile etc.) free trade initiatives. This multifaceted approach is necessary to address the existing trade distorting practices impacting U.S. exports and world trade -- not all of which can be adequately disciplined in Free Trade Agreements. Domestic support and export subsidies are examples requiring a multilateral solution.

Future Policy Opportunities

With the signing and implementation of the Farm Bill, the President continues to address the primary concern of America's producers -- their economic well being. Having fought effectively for farmers' interests in the conventional area of farm income, the Administration should pursue the President's long-term agenda for agriculture -- trade. Farmers and other rural Americans will look to the Administration for assurance of the future prosperity of the agricultural sector. The Administration efforts to address this need must go beyond traditional programs and government payments. The initiatives presented are meant to demonstrate the President's leadership in broad aspects of rural American life, ranging from health to finance. Additionally, this vision can be reinforced in the year ahead by policy actions in such areas as rural development and civil rights.

B. Participation

NEC staff developed these proposals. USDA Undersecretary Bost played a substantial role in developing the initiative relating to child nutrition. NEC staff also consulted with Undersecretary Penn in developing this document. Secretary Veneman will be briefed prior to the policy review.

II. Looking Back: Review of '01 and '02

A. Achievements

H.R. 2646: The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002

- The Farm Bill re-authorized for six years federal agriculture, rural development and conservation and food assistance programs. The Senate adopted the bill on Wednesday, May 8 by a vote of 64 35, and the House completed action one week prior on May 2, with a vote of 280 141 to approve the bill.
- The Farm Bill improves the safety net for producers while adhering to the principles established by the President including being fiscally responsible, better balancing loan rates, adhering to U.S. commitments to the WTO and greater spending on conservation programs.
- The Farm Bill preserves the main market-oriented features of the '96 Freedom to Farm Act, including planting flexibility, no forced idling of cropland, no government stockpiling of crops, and price responsive payment programs.

Meeting the President's Principles:

- **Budget**. H.R. 2646 achieves fiscal responsibility because it does not exceed the limits of the Congressional Budget Resolution.
- Balances Loan Rates. H.R. 2646 provides a safety net for farmers and achieves it without encouraging overproduction and depressing prices. In the past, loan rates received by farmers and ranchers for some commodities were set too high. This bill better balances loan rates.
- Trade. The Administration worked to ensure that spending remains within the limits of our WTO agreements. H.R. 2646 contains a newly legislated "circuit breaker" to ensure our compliance with current and future international trade commitments. Recent estimates of farm payments should be well within WTO limits as a result of higher prices caused by the drought.
- Conservation. The legislation represents the single most significant commitment of resources toward conservation on private lands in the nation's history. The Administration argued for an additional \$17.1 billion of funding to address a broad range of conservation challenges faced by farmers and ranchers, including soil erosion, wetlands, wildlife habitat, and farmland protection.
- An increase of nearly 10%, to 39.2 million acres, for the Conservation Reserve Program idling environmentally critical land for species habitat, riparian buffers and soil protection.
- An additional 1.25 million acres of wetlands to be enrolled in the Wetlands Reserve Program. Wetland acreage the size of the state of Delaware will be restored and protected as a result of this Farm Bill. The

- amount of wetland protection provided by the Farm Bill will ensure that the Administration achieves or exceeds the goal of no net-loss wetlands.
- A new Grassland Reserve program will restore, improve, and protect 2 million acres of grassland, one of our nation's most fragile ecosystems.
- \$597 million is committed toward preserving open space and protecting prime farmland from urban sprawl. This funding is provided through the Farmland Protection Program, which partners with state, and locally led efforts to preserve farms and ranches.
- Provides \$200 million for a newly established forest conservation program on private lands.
- Provides \$50 million in assistance for farmers and ranchers in the drought-stricken Klamath Basin.
- Food Stamps. This Farm Bill is compassionate as it allows legal immigrants residing the U.S. for 5 years the ability to be eligible for food stamp assistance.

\$5.5 billion 2001 Agricultural Supplemental Assistance Package

- The Senate adopted a \$7.5 billion supplemental assistance package for 2001 that would have severely endangered farmers' ability to actually receive assistance as well provide it in a fiscally irresponsible manner.
- By holding the package to \$5.5 billion, the Administration achieved the desired balance of sufficient aid to producers and quick action that allowed funding to be fully distributed by the close of the 2001 fiscal year.
- The supplemental assistance represented a bi-partisan compromise and was supported by many national farm groups.

Launching A New Trade Round at Doha

On July 25, 2002, The U.S. Government announced an ambitious proposal to advance the agriculture negotiations in the Doha trade round. The proposal accomplishes the following:

• Requires all WTO members to reduce tariffs using a formula that would demand greater reductions for countries with higher tariffs than from countries with lower tariffs. Under this proposal, average agricultural tariffs would be reduced from 62 percent to 15 percent.

- Caps trade distorting domestic supports at 5 percent of a country's total agricultural production. This would result in a global reduction in trade distorting supports of \$100 billion.
- Eliminates export subsidies over a five-year period. The EU spends between \$2-5 billion annually on export subsidies while the U.S. spends between \$15-100 million annually.

Fiscally Responsible Drought Relief

- Following Congress' failure to pass fiscally responsible drought relief, the Administration responded with a generous but responsible livestock assistance program totaling \$150 million. This program provided drought-stricken ranchers with access to low cost feed supplies.
- The Administration recently announced the creation of a new \$752 million Livestock Compensation Program which will help mitigate the effects of the drought to livestock producers in 39 states.
- To date, the Administration has provided drought relief valued in excess of \$1.3 billion. All drought relief has been delivered through existing USDA authorities and resources.

Biotechnology

The Administration established an Agricultural Biotechnology Working Group (ABWG) on a PCC level directed by the NEC to better coordinate regulatory issues associated with agricultural biotechnology products. The ABWG is comprised of representatives of USDA, EPA, FDA, Commerce, State and various offices of the EOP. The work of the ABWG has resulted in the following positive developments:

- StarLink. The Administration has aggressively and successfully addressed the issue of Cry9C protein from StarLink corn, which was not approved for food use, being detected at low levels in corn based food products, seeds, and grain destined for export. This involved a coordinated approach by FDA, USDA, and EPA.
- Plant Incorporated Protectants (PIP) Rule. EPA finalized the PIP rule, which governs how developers of biotechnology-derived crops that express pesticidal properties will be regulated and licensed under the Federal Fungicide, Insecticide, and Rodenticide Act and the Federal Food Drug and Cosmetic Act.
- Adventitious Presence Policy (OSTP FR notice). Under the direction of the ABWG, OSTP published in the Federal Register a set of proposals

- to address concerns associated with the presence of low levels of biotechnology products that have not completed all regulatory reviews.
- Marketing Proposals. The USDA published in the Federal Register proposals to facilitate commerce of biotechnology derived crops. These proposals included procedures to ensure identity preservation and testing.
- PharmaPlant Guidance. FDA and APHIS published draft guidance on regulatory matters concerning the testing and commercialization of pharmaceuticals derived from genetically engineered plants.
- APHIS Biotechnology Reorganization. To meet future demands, the USDA has centralized the biotechnology regulatory functions within APHIS. This will allow for a more coordinated approach, drawing on the very best science and public input to guide their programs.

B. Outstanding Commitments

Energy

• The Renewable Fuel Standard, which will result in 5 billion gallons in ethanol use by 2012, will be part of a final energy bill, if one is enacted.

Estate Taxes

• While Congress enacted the Administration sponsored Economic Growth and Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2001, the permanent repeal of the estate tax remains an important political issue for farmers and ranchers.

Farm Savings Accounts

• While the Administration supported Farm Savings Accounts throughout the Farm Bill negotiations, Senate Democrats kept them out of the final Conference agreement.

Trade

• The Administration expects to conclude free trade agreements with Central America, Chile, and Morocco that will be important to US agriculture. Export prospects in Central American and Morocco are good for US wheat, feed grains, and soybeans.

III. Looking Forward: '03 Agenda

A. General Background

- The agricultural economy enters 2003 fundamentally strong, with low interest rates, moderate energy prices, manageable debt burden, and steady demand for farm products. However, farm income from market sources remains flat, with the prospect of modest improvement in 2003.
- Following four years of low commodity prices, the current drought has reduced this year's farm output significantly. Producers continue to rely heavily on federal payments, including offsets to drought losses this year.
- The weaker dollar and poor harvests abroad will help to boost demand for U.S. production in the months ahead. In the interim, U.S. farmers and ranchers increasingly look to Washington for their economic well being.

B. Legislative

- The Congress will debate reauthorization of the \$10 billion child nutrition/school lunch program.
- The Congress will need to complete work on an Agriculture Appropriations Bill.
- Outstanding debate of the transfer of APHIS as well as Plum Island Laboratory to the Department of Homeland Security.

C. Regulatory

Confined Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO)

• The EPA has been working on new regulations to control discharges from livestock feeding operations. These highly controversial regulations are due to be published in mid-December.

Total Management Daily Load (TMDL)

• The EPA is also working on controversial regulations that would expand its regulatory authority – under the Clean Water Act of 1972 – to govern non-point sources, such as agricultural runoff by individual farms, known as TMDL. A final rule is expected in mid to late 2003, but a decision to rescind a Clinton Administration rule could come as early as late November. EPA has been working with CEQ and OMB on this issue.

Implementation: Farm Bill Conservation Title

- The U.S. Department of Agriculture will propose regulations to implement the conservation title of the Farm Bill. These regulations will implement programs that will convert farmland to conservation uses, restore wetlands, and preserve prime farmland from urban sprawl. In addition, these regulations will result in significantly greater funding for the EQIP program that will help farmers comply with the aforementioned CAFO and TMDL regulations.
- The implementation of the conservation title will provide public opportunities for the Administration to bolster its pro-environment record, but in a manner also supported by farmers and ranchers.

Food Safety Initiative

• The U.S. Department of Agriculture will propose tough new standards for pathogens in many meat and poultry products.

D. Proposed New Policy

- 1) Payment Limits
- 2) Health Care for Farmers
- 3) Farm Saving Accounts
- 4) Child Nutrition Initiative
- 5) Rural Revitalization
- 6) Agriculture Anti-Discrimination Proposal

(D.1) TARGET FARM SUBSIDIES TO LESS WEALTHY FARMERS

I. Description of Specific Initiative

Seek legislation to tighten the eligibility requirements for receiving USDA farm payments by means testing. A relatively generous version would be to restrict subsidy payments to individuals having off-farm income below \$150,000. Applicants for farm subsidies would be required to self-certify at an USDA county office their eligibility and IRS taxpayer number. The proposal would not affect the size of the payment for those who are eligible.

II. Proposed Message/Theme

The 2002 farm bill is widely criticized as providing too much taxpayer money to rich people and corporations. The proposal would:

- Help to *strengthen the rural community* by restoring credibility and consolidating support for farm programs by targeting farm payments to real working farm families;
- Show a new kind of Republican by helping to dispel the popular impression that the Administration's reflexive sympathy is with the wealthy; rather, we'd favor results in federal programs rather than support "welfare" for the rich;
- Show the Administration *keeping its word*, after having taken public positions in favor of fairer treatment of farm payments


III. Anticipated Reaction

Non-farm interests, including the major editorial boards and conservative policy groups, will applaud the tightened limitations. A surprising extent of rural communities also will support it. Farm groups positions will vary by commodity and region but the American Farm Bureau will strongly oppose. Generally, southern growers of rice and cotton represented by Chairman Larry Combest will oppose it. During the farm bill deliberations, the Senate passed restrictive payment limitations proposed by Sen. Grassley that were loosened in the conference bill. The attached map shows USDA estimates of the impact from the restrictive Grassley legislation.

IV. Budget

Estimated savings are about \$100 million annually.

(D.2) AUTHORIZE ASSOCIATION HEALTH PLANS FOR FARMERS

I. Description of Specific Initiative

Association Health Plans (AHP) would enable more farmers to obtain quality health insurance. While commodity prices and market income for farmers has fallen in recent years, farm operating costs and health coverage costs are rising well above the general inflation rate. This has caused many farmers to buy inadequate or no health insurance, even while farming remains among the most dangerous occupations. Expanding AHPs through legislation to form larger pools of participants, for instance farmers from multiple states, would reduce premiums

II. Proposed Message/Theme

The President improved farmers' economic security by boosting their income with the 2002 farm bill. We can now reinforce farm income and rural economic security by reducing family expenditures for health care. The proposal would:

- Help to strengthen the rural community by building strong families through affordable, quality medical coverage.
- Display a market-based approach to a social problem.
- Show a new kind of Republican that cares about people needing solutions to problems in what is often perceived as a Democrat topic.

III. Anticipated Reaction

Positive all around. Many farm groups favor AHP proposals, but their preoccupation with the 2002 farm bill has delayed their promoting of the plans.

IV. Budget

This regulatory reform legislation is budget neutral.

V. Description of Related Proposals.

Link to Medical Savings Accounts

(D.3) STRENGTHEN FINANCES FOR FARMERS AND RANCHERS

I. Description of Specific Initiative

Farm And Ranch Risk Management accounts (FARRM) would provide producers a tool to improve their self-managing of their own finances. FARRM accounts would allow producers to sequester 20% of annual income tax-deferred, for use in emergencies under certain conditions. Accounts would be available to all producers including ranchers, and not simply farmers of the traditional subsidized field crops.

II. Proposed Message/Theme

The Administration fought with limited success in the 2002 farm bill for a safety net for all producers and market approaches to farm income. Since the President signed the bill, critics have called for greater market-orientation, and at the same time, a wider income safety net to help producers with the drought. FARRM accounts do both. The proposal would:

- Help to *strengthen the rural community* by improving the management of financial risk.
- Show the President *keeping his word* on a campaign item, a central farm bill position, as well as his recent comments in the drought that ranchers lack sufficient risk management tools.
- Reinforce the message that the Administration had an important proposal, market-oriented and compassionate, and an enduring interest in America's producers,
- Continue the Administration's tax relief theme, offered with fairness to all producers.

III. Anticipated Reaction.

Positive and bipartisan. Sens. Grassley and Baucus proposed a version in 2001. In its most modest form (deferred tax on owner contributions with mandatory withdrawal schedule), it is unlikely to raise major objection. Enhanced versions, which would hold more financial benefit to producers, would likely provoke objections.

IV. Budget

Treasury estimates lost annual tax revenue to average about \$100 million.

(D.4) PROMOTE HEALTHY SCHOOL FEEDING

I. Description of Specific Initiative

The increasing incidence of obesity and adult diseases in school-age children calls for new Federal efforts to promote healthy eating in schools. The legislative initiative would include educating students about healthy food choices, incentives and demonstration projects, and new federal requirements to reduce access to high-fat, high-calorie foods—inside and outside the school meals program

II. Proposed Message/Theme

Problems of child nutrition are receiving a great deal of attention from the Administration, media, Congress, health professionals and school districts. Administration leadership is wanted. The initiative would:

- Demonstrate compassionate Republicans;
- Focus on *solutions* that allow flexibility and choice at the local level through promoting a health school environment rather than simply restrictions;
- Shows the Administration *keeping its word* by following through on the Presidential initiative "HealthierUS", the Surgeon General's "Call to Action to Prevent and Decrease Overweight and Obesity", and "Healthy People 2010".

III. Anticipated Reaction

Likely to receive support from health professional, local community advocates and parents. While the initiative would support efforts in States and local school districts that are acting on concerns (including Texas, California, Connecticut, and New York), the education community's reaction probably would be mixed. Some local administrators might resist the loss of revenue to schools selling junk food, especially sodas. Likely opponents include the junk food industry, and some school districts and school food service providers. Could receive considerable support in Congress, since both houses are considering legislation related to obesity and health

IV. Budget

The initiative can be conducted within existing budget resources.

(D.5) RURAL REVITALIZATION

I. Description of Specific Initiative

Create a 21st Century Rural Capital initiative. It would consist of a new rural focus for SBA's LowDoc loan program and improvements in USDA credit programs as well as links to new Farm Bill programs promoting rural enterprise. The aim would be to increase availability of credit, projects, and business leaders. As a model, the LowDoc maximum loan amount would increase from \$150,000 to \$250,000. This action will allow the banks to make more loans, with reduced paperwork and rapid execution. Rural banks could charge a higher rate, offer a revolving line of credit, and provide 75%/85% guarantee.

II. Proposed Message/Theme

The needs of rural America's people, communities, and regions are increasingly distinct from those of traditional production agriculture. In the aftermath of a Farm Bill oriented towards land-based programs, the Administration can show its awareness of the aspirations of 65 million rural Americans who are not farmers or ranchers, many of whom are minorities. The initiative can go beyond providing government services to encouraging economic development based on the unique attributes of rural life. The proposal would:

- Help to *strengthen rural communities*, by promoting ownership and creating jobs.
- Build new coalitions, especially with Hispanic Americans.
- Focus on results.

III. Anticipated Reaction

Favorable. This area has been neglected.

IV. Budget

The initiative can be conducted within existing budget resources.

(D.6) AGRICULTURE ANTI-DISCRIMINATION PROPOSAL

I. Description of Specific Initiative

Seek legislation to reform the Department of Agriculture to eliminate discrimination from the Department's programs and activities. Specifically, the legislation, if enacted, would accomplish the following:

- 1) improve technical assistance given by the Secretary to minority farmers
- 2) ensure fair and timely action by the Secretary on loan and loan servicing of applications of minority farmers
- 3) encourage the Secretary to develop more effective means of providing diversity training to employees, and
- 4) encourage the Secretary to resolve pending administrative claims arising within the programs at USDA.

V. Proposed Message/Theme

This proposal fits the theme of a "new kind of Republican." The Administration has inherited this seemingly intractable problem from the previous Administration. In Congress' haste to fashion a legislative fix, the consent decree known as the Pigford class has continued to languish and is perceived to be perpetuated by USDA and the Administration. In solving this problem, the Administration will bolster efforts to reach out to non-traditional Republican constituencies.

VI. Anticipated Reaction

While, the Farm Bill created a position of Assistant Secretary of Civil Rights at USDA, none of the usual groups in the Congress have shown leadership. House/Senate Agriculture Committees are expected to respond favorably. Congressional Black Caucus' reaction will be muted praise. National organizations such as the Black Farmers and Agriculturalist Association (BFAA) will applaud such an action.

VII. Budget

Estimate most of the cost can be covered through existing resources.



Barron's on Midterms

Jim McTague wrote in Barron's: "...only two presidents since the Civil War have picked up seats in Congress in midterm elections: Franklin Roosevelt in 1934 and Bill Clinton in 1998."

This is true for the House of Representatives.

However, presidents have picked up Senate seats in midterm elections 10 times, 4 times since direct election began in 1914 (1914, 1934, 1962, 1970).

House Seats

Seats Gained Three Elections in a Row:

- Democrats 1848, 1850, 1852
- Democrats 1866, 1868, 1870 (Both parties gained in 1868 with Republicans gaining more)
- Republicans 1884, 1886, 1888
- Republicans 1900, 1902, 1904 (Both parties gained in 1902 with Democrats gaining more)

No matter how frequently the nation's chief executive comes, no matter how brief the stay, Arizonans swell with pride whenever Air Force One lands here.

President George W. Bush has been here before. He was here in the summer, when fires raged in the high country.

He has spent time in Mesa, a place not unlike his hometown of Midland, Texas. Today, the president travels to Flagstaff and Phoenix.

It's a different Arizona than the one his father knew, the state that two generations of Republicans could take for granted.

In 1988, his father won Arizona over Michael Dukakis, sweeping Maricopa County by 30 points. It marked the 10th consecutive Republican presidential victory in Arizona, a streak that ultimately spanned 44 years and nine presidencies.

2 GOP candidates hope Bush visit helps efforts

PHOENIX — The Republican candidates in two high-profile and hotly contested Arizona races said they're hoping President Bush's visit Friday will propel them past their opponents.

Bush will stop first for a midday rally in Flagstaff, where organizers hope thousands will turn out to welcome the president and to support gubernatorial candidate Matt Salmon and congressional candidate Rick Renzi. Bush is then scheduled to speak in Phoenix at a \$700-a-plate fund-raising dinner for Salmon.

Both Salmon and Renzi, the Republican nominee for the 1st District congressional seat, hope Bush's endorsement will help them break away from their respective opponents.

"It's a huge boost to our campaign efforts," Renzi spokesman Joe Galli said Thursday. At the Flagstaff rally, "we'd anticipate that he's going to give a real rousing speech on behalf of our Republican candidates."

Nationally, Republicans and Democrats are closely watching Renzi's neck-and-neck race against Democrat George Cordova. The 1st District, one of two new seats in Arizona this year, covers a vast section of the state, including the Grand Canyon, Flagstaff, the Navajo Reservation and Casa Grande. Statistically, the district gives Democrats a slight edge, but a recent poll showed the two candidates virtually tied.

Supporters hope Bush's visit will help tip the scales in Salmon's favor over Democratic gubernatorial contender Janet Napolitano.

"It's the biggest shot in the arm a candidate can ever get to have the leader of the free world come in and endorse his candidacy," Salmon said.

Salmon is scheduled to introduce Bush at the rally in Flagstaff and to fly back to Phoenix for the fund-raiser on Air Force One, his spokeswoman, Camilla Strongin, said.





Subject: talking points for friends on why liability provisions are good

- 1. This bill will significantly improve the legal system. It gets all cases into a single federal court for pre-trial and trial proceedings. That important procedure will prevent the conflicting rulings, home cooking, forum shopping, and outrageous verdicts and judgments that the tort system produces every day in local courts around the country.
- 2. The final deal is an improvement from the Senate bill, which did NOT have consolidation (contrary to popular belief).
- 3. We would have preferred to improve the legal system even more, particularly with respect to existing state laws on punitive damages, but ultimately the choice was between no bill and accepting only the improvements described above. Given the importance of this bill to the economy, and given the indisputable fact that this bill will improve the legal system, the President decided to seek a bill, help American workers and the economy, and improve the legal system.
- 4. We sought a ban on punitive damages, as the President often stated, and we are disappointed that there is not such a ban. But the Senate leadership was willing to kill the bill rather than accept any positive provision on punitives. The President was not willing to kill the bill so long as the bill improved the legal system, which this bill clearly will do.

Background: Without the bill, state laws on liability, damages, and punitives would apply. With the bill, state laws on liability, damages, and punitives will apply, but in a single federal court that will hear all cases. No one can credibly say that the bill worsens existing law on liability, damages, or punitive damages.

American Bar Association Resolution

This week, the American Bar Association's House of Delegates passed a strong resolution on the judicial confirmation process. The resolution and accompanying report are attached.

The resolution provides that the "Senate Committee on the Judiciery should promptly act on nominees" and "the Senate of the United States should promptly advise and consent to or reject the nominees." The report accompanying the resolution states that "the federal courts [] suffer, and so does the rule of law" as a result of current delays in the judicial confirmation process. The report specifically references the President's May 9, 2001, nominees. The report also refers to what it terms an "emergency situation" in the federal courts and states: "Vote them up or down, but don't hang them out to dry."

RECOMENDATION

RESOLVED, that the prompt filling of existing judicial vacancies in the federal courts of the United States is essential for the efficient, responsible, and effective administration of justice; and that undue delays in the nomination and confirmation of candidates for vacancies in the federal courts of the United States adversely affects such effective, responsible and timely administration of justice;

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the American Bar Association urges the following:

- 1. The president of the United States should promptly nominate candidates to fill vacancies in the federal courts of the United States.
- 2. The Senate Committee on the Judiciary should promptly act on nominees,
- 3. The Senate of the United States should promptly advise and consent to or reject the nominees.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the American Bar Association urges its members and state, local and territorial bar associations to encourage the President to make prompt appointments to fill federal judicial vacancies and to contact the appropriate members of the Senate to urge prompt hearings and votes on pending nominations for the federal courts of the United States.

REPORT

Introduction

This report will be short on rhetoric and long on statistics. The number of judicial vacancies in the federal courts was termed "alarming" by the Chief Justice of the United States in his 2001 Year-End Report on the Federal Judiciary. President George W. Bush, a Republican, began making judicial nominations on May 9, 2001. The Senate, controlled since June 2001 (after reorganization) by the Democrats, was responsible for the confirmation process. This process includes control of the setting of hearings at the Senate Judiciary Committee and control of the calendar of consent proceedings in the United States Senate as a whole. As noted by the Chief Justice, "When the Senate adjourned on December 20th [2001], 23 court of appeals nominees and 14 district court nominees were left awaiting action by the Judiciary Committee or the full Senate,"

The Present State of Affairs

Since the beginning of this year, the same delay in holding hearings and acting upon the nominees has continued: By July 19, 2002, President Bush nominated (or

renominated) a total of 113 prospective Article III judges,³ 59 of whom have been confirmed by the Senate. Here is the complete breakdown on pending nominations as of July 19, 2002:

- Total nominations pending before the Senate:
 - 21 Circuit Court
 - 32 District Court
 - 4 Claims Court
 - 1 International Trade Court.
- Nominations pending before the Senate Judiciary Committee awaiting a hearing:
 - 16 Circuit Court
 - 19 District Court
 - 4 Claims Court
 - 1 International Trade Court.
- Nominations pending before the Senate Judiciary Committee awaiting a vote:
 - 1 Circuit Court
 - 5 District Court
- Nominations scheduled for a hearing:
 - 0 Circuit Court

Also nominated were four nominees for the U.S. Court of Claims and one for the International Trade Court.

- 0 District Court
- 0 Claims Court
- Nominations pending before the full Senate awaiting a vote:
 - 3 Circuit Court
 - 12 District Court
- Nominations Confirmed by the Senate:
 - 11 Circuit Court
 - 48 District court.

As of July 19, 2002, there were 91 existing Article III federal judicial vacancies.

Of these 91 vacancies, 29 are circuit seats and 62 are district seats. These 91 vacancies constitute 10.6 percent of the federal judiciary. Thirty-five of the 91 vacancies are so-called "judicial emergency" vacancies. Twenty-six nominees pending are for positions designated as "judicial emergency" vacancies. Nothing has changed.

Indeed, data recently released by the bipartisan Constitution Project at

Georgetown University and Professor Wendy Martinek of Binghampton University,

points out that in the first year of President George W. Bush's term in office, successful

The formulation by which a judicial vacancy is determined to be a "judicial emergency" is quite convoluted: In its simplest format any court with more than one authorized judgeship and only one active judge has a "judicial emergency."

nominees took an average of 112 days from nomination to confirmation. On May 9, 2002, the anniversary of his first judicial nominations, President Bush met with members of the Senate Judiciary Committee to take stock of the situation. Of the 11 circuit court nominees who were named 365 days previously, only 3 had been granted hearings at the Senate Judiciary Committee. Nothing came of the meeting. Those 8 have still not had hearings. By July 19, 2002, President Bush had nominated 32 individuals to serve on circuit courts, but only 11 were confirmed, for a confirmation rate of less than 35 percent. Finally, there are more judicial vacancies today than when President Bush took office.

The Damage

The purpose of this Report and Resolution is not to excoriate either Democrats or Republicans; as the Chief Justice has pointed out, in the second term of President Clinton, a Democrat, the Senate, then controlled by Republicans, confirmed only 17 judges in 1996 and 36 in 1997. The fact is that whoever may bear responsibility for delays in the process, it is the federal courts that suffer, and so does the rule of law. As noted recently by Senator Arlen Specter in a published letter in Legal Times, "filling vacancies is the most pressing issue facing our lower courts – due to the correlation between judicial vacancies and delays in processing cases." The Senator goes on to cite examples of hardship arising from the present situation:

- 50% vacancy rate on the 6th Circuit Court of Appeals, resulting in a death penalty appeal left pending for eight years, and a plaintiff in a civil case dying after having waited more than 15 months just to have an oral argument in a job discrimination suit.
- More than a quarter of the seats vacant in the 4th Circuit court of Appeals despite four declared judicial emergencies and one seat vacant for eight years. A municipality in South Carolina is waiting 39 months for clarification of the constitutionality of a municipal ordinance. A maritime Longshoremen's Act claim has been pending for 38 months.¹⁰

A real possibility arising from the often lengthy and unpleasant nature of the confirmation process is that successful lawyers in private practice will become reluctant to serve. As the Chief Justice notes, "for lawyers coming directly from private practice, there is both a strong financial disincentive and the possibility of losing clients in the course of the wait for a confirmation vote." We simply cannot lose this component from the reservoir of available and willing candidates for judicial office. In the words of the Chief Justice, "The Senate ought to act with reasonable promptness and to vote each nominee up or down. The Senate is not, of course, obliged to confirm any particular nominee. But it ought to act on each nominee and to do so within a reasonable time." We respectfully agree: Vote them up or down, but don't hang them out to dry.

Prior House of Delegates Action

As noted above, the situation arising from the state of judicial vacancies is not unique to our time, and the House has dealt with it previously: In February 1990, at its Mid-Year Meeting, the House passed Report No. 8F, sponsored by the Virgin Islands Bar Association and the Standing Committee on Judicial Selection, Tenure, and Compensation. The Resolution, inter alia, urged "the President of the United States to expedite the appointment to vacancies existing in the United States judicial system and that the Senate take prompt action in considering confirmation of such nominees."

In 1998, at the Mid-Year Meeting, the House passed Report No. 8A, sponsored by numerous bar associations and Sections. The Resolution, inter alia, urged, "the President of the United States promptly to advance nominations for current vacancies for federal judicial positions and the Senate of the United States to hear and vote on those nominations in an expeditious manner."

In October of 1997, at a meeting of the Board of Governors attended by Senator Patrick Leahy, now Chairman of the Senate Committee on the Judiciary, the Board approved the following Resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Governors of the American Bar Association, which includes members of both political parties, urges the United States Senate promptly to hear and vote on pending nominations for United States District Courts and Courts of Appeal.

Further Resolved, That such action is essential for the effective and efficient administration of justice in the United States.

The present report recognizes the existence of the prior actions by the House and the Board of Governors. We believe, however, the present resolution is required by the emergency situation existent in the federal courts. In addition, the present resolution focuses with greater emphasis on the role of the Senate Committee on the Judiciary as a cause of the blockage in the confirmation process: The notion that that Committee, by the simple expedient of refusing to hold timely hearings may avoid confirmation proceedings

in the full Senate, is simply unacceptable to our notion of an appropriate and constitutional nomination process.

Finally, this resolution is presently timely because Report No. 112, which will be considered by the House at the August 2002 Session, and presented by ABA member C. Boyden Gray, contains unsatisfactory language which can only be overcome by House approval of the present resolution. The most unacceptable portion of the Gray Report is its insistence upon urging that the Senate Committee on the Judiciary clear nominees for a full Senate vote within a specific time period. We believe that urging such a requirement upon a full committee of the Senate by the ABA is, to say the least, presumptuous. Note that Senator Specter, in the protocol he would require of the Senate Committee requests precisely such a time limitation. We believe Senator Specter's proposal is a reasonable one for a United States Senator who is himself a Member of that Committee.

Mexico IS the issue

President Bush has been absent on one of the major topics in our country

President George W. Bush is no dummy.
Sure, the media and late-night comedians portray him as a word-slurring Texan who is more comfortable trimming brush at his ranch than trimming budgets in Washington. There's some truth to that image, but Bush didn't become president on a whim.

He's a shrewd judge of character and is good delegator. He usually surrounds himself with some of smartest, toughest and most skilled people in the country, who make this job that much easier.

Karen Hughes, Condoleezza Rice and Colin Powell all have the president's ear. They are intelligent and articulate, and they too surround themselves with some of the nation's top minds.

That's why it's that much harder to understand why the Bush administration continues to keep this country's relations with Mexico in the deep freeze about as far down in there as last year's venison.

Immigration, water, immigration, Fox, trucks, immigration and economics keep coming up, and each time an issue comes forth the Bush folks choose to deal with the subject by not dealing with it, simply giving it the old "We're busy running a war" bit.

So with Powell, undersecretaries of state, negotiators and even governors who will move at his whim, Bush refuses to talk about Mexico and address any issue that has come up since 9-11. And that's unfortunate.

We believe that the Bush administration is capable of chewing gum and walking at the same time. The White House ought to be able to deal with two fires at once. It ought to be able to have Powell in Israel and Saudi Arabia and an undersecretary of state in South Texas and Mexico with a staff furiously working to hammer out answers to the problems that have been mounting in this region because of Bush's inaction.

Next to the war on terrorism, Mexico IS the issue. We would understand that truth even if we weren't here on the border, where the issues affect us even more directly.

And while Bush has completely ignored the region, we've watched over the months state and local leaders such as Gov. Rick Perry tell constituents they would relay messages and


They've promised action. We've seen nothing. So Bush not only doesn't think the region is worth talking about now, he's not even giving the time of day to his own party members, friends and the very folks to voted him into office from South Texas. Which is even more puzzling.

Perhaps the president believes he must be the entire country's leader and shouldn't concentrate on what he might now perceive as a local or regional issue. Here's another news flash: Mexico IS the issue — for the entire country. Trade, immigration, water, economics, people and whatever else you might to throw in for good measure.


If he doesn't, we just might begin to believe what we see.


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

Campus protest undercurrents

The liberal movement has finally met the enemy . . . and it is them.

On college and university campuses all across the United States, liberal professors and students are uniting in their latest cause. A naive, misguided and highly charged campaign against the State of Israel.

I have long maintained that many on the left who participate in these protests, be they against the International Monetary Fund and World Bank, possible war with Iraq, or now Israel, would rather protest life than live life.

If they are older, rather than look in the mirror and admit life and success have passed them by. they get involved in any cause so they don't have to confront their own failures. If students, many times they come from affluence,

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
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

Dear Mr. President.

In this decisive hour of our nation's history we are writing to express our deep appreciation for your bold, courageous, and visionary leadership. Americans everywhere have been inspired by your eloquent and clear articulation of our nation's highest ideals of freedom and of our resolve to defend that freedom both here and across the globe.

We believe that your policies concerning the ongoing international terrorist campaign against America are both right and just. Specifically, we believe that your stated policies concerning Saddam Hussein and his headlong pursuit and development of biochemical and nuclear weapons of mass destruction are prudent and fall well within the time-honored criteria of just war theory as developed by Christian theologians in the late fourth and early fifth centuries A.D.

First, your stated policy concerning using military force if necessary to disarm Saddam Hussein and his weapons of mass destruction is a just cause. In just war theory only defensive war is defensible; and if military force is used against Saddam Hussein it will be because he has attacked his neighbors, used weapons of mass destruction against his own people, and harbored terrorists from the Al Qaeda terrorist network that attacked our nation so viciously and violently on September 11, 2001. As you stated in your address to the U.N. September 12th:

"We can harbor no illusions. . . . Saddam Hussein attacked Iran in 1980 and Kuwait in 1990. He's fired ballistic missiles at Iran and Saudi Arabia. Bahrain, and Israel. His regime once ordered the killing of every person between the ages of 15 and 70 in certain Kurdish villages in Northern Iraq. He has gassed many Iranians and forty Iraqi villages."

Disarming and neutralizing Saddam Hussein is to defend freedom and freedom-loving people from state-sponsored terror and death.

Second, just war must have just intent. Our nation does not intend to destroy, conquer, or exploit Iraq. As you declared forthrightly in your speech to the U.N. General Assembly:

"The United States has no quarrel with the Iraqi people... Liberty for the Iraqi people is a great moral cause, and a great strategic goal. The people of Iraq deserve it; the security of all nations requires it. Free societies do not intimidate through cruelty and conquest, and open societies do not threaten the world with mass murder. The United States supports political and economic liberty in a unified Iraq."

This is clearly a just and noble intent.

Third, just war may only be commenced as a last resort. As you so clearly enumerated before the U.N., Saddam Hussein has for more than a decade ignored Security Council resolutions or defied them while breaking virtually every agreement into which he has entered. He stands convicted by his own record as a brutal dictator who cannot be trusted to abide by any agreement he makes. And while he prevaricates and obfuscates, he continues to obtain and develop the weapons of mass destruction which he will use to terrorize the world community of nations.

The world has been waiting for more than a decade for the Iraqi regime to fulfill its agreement to destroy all of its weapons of mass destruction, to cease producing them or the long-range missiles to deliver them in the future, and to allow thorough and rigorous inspections to verify their compliance. They have not, and will not, do so and any further delay in forcing the regime's compliance would be reckless irresponsibility in the face of grave and growing danger.

Fourth, just war requires authorization by *legitimate authority*. We believe it was wise and prudent for you to go before the U.N. General Assembly and ask the U.N. Security Council to enforce its own resolutions. However, as American citizens we believe that, however helpful a U.N. Security Council vote might be, the legitimate authority to authorize the use of U.S. military force is the government of the United States and that the authorizing vehicle is a declaration of war or a joint resolution of the Congress.

When the threat of Soviet nuclear missiles in Cuba presented a grave threat to America's security, President Kennedy asked for the support of the U.N. and the Organization of American States, but made it clear, with or without their support, those missiles would either be removed by the Soviets, or we would neutralize them ourselves. The American people expected no less from their president and their government.

Fifth, just war requires *limited goals* and the resort to armed force must have a reasonable expectation of success. In other words, "total war" is unacceptable and the war's goals must be achievable. We believe your stated policies for disarming the murderous Iraqi dictator and destroying his weapons of mass destruction, while liberating the Iraqi people for his cruel and barbarous grip, more than meet those criteria.

Sixth, just war theory requires noncombatant immunity. We are confident that our government, unlike Hussein, will not target civilians and will do all that it can to minimize noncombatant casualties.

Seventh, just war theory requires the question of proportionality be addressed. Will the human cost of the armed conflict to both sides be proportionate to the stated objectives and goals? Does the good gained by resort to armed conflict justify the cost of lives lost and bodies maimed? We believe that the cost of not dealing with this threat now will only succeed in greatly increasing the cost in human lives and suffering when an even more heavily armed and dangerous Saddam Hussein must be confronted at some date in the not too distant future. We believe that every day of delay significantly increases the risk of far greater human suffering in the future than acting now would entail.

How different and how much safer would the history of the twentieth century have been had the allies confronted Hitler when he illegally reoccupied the Rhineland in 1936 in clear violation of Germany's treaty agreements? It is at least possible that tens of millions of the lives lost in World War II might not have been lost if the Allies had enforced treaty compliance then instead of appeasing a murderous dictator.

We are extremely grateful that we have a president who has learned the costly lessons of the twentieth century and who is determined to lead America and the world to a far different and better future in the twenty first century. As you told the world's leaders at the U.N.:

"We must choose between a world of fear and a world of progress. We cannot stand by and do nothing while dangers gather. We must stand up for our security, and for the permanent rights and hopes of mankind. By heritage and by choice, the United States of America will make that stand."

Mr. President, we make that stand with you. In so doing, while we cannot speak for all of our constituents, we are supremely confident that we are voicing the convictions and concerns of the great preponderance of those we are privileged to serve.

Please know that we join tens of millions of our fellow Americans in praying for you and your family daily.







Such a move is not imminent, they say. For the near term, **McCain**, who upset Bush in the 2000 New Hampshire primary and won 5 million primary-season votes, will work to build a centrist faction within the GOP to mirror the moderate "New Democrats."

But if Bush struggles as president, and if **McCain** loses on key issues such as defense funding and campaign finance reform, advisers say he may challenge Bush in the same way the reformist Teddy Roosevelt, **McCain's** hero, battled a conservative Republican, William Howard Taft, in 1912.

Maverick Republican Sen. John **McCain** of Arizona, in a widening rift with President Bush and his party's dominant conservative wing, is talking with advisers about leaving the GOP and launching a third-party challenge to Bush in 2004, those close to the senator say.

Such a move is not imminent, they say. For the near term, **McCain**, who upset Bush in the 2000 New Hampshire primary and won 5 million primary-season votes, will work to build a centrist faction within the GOP to mirror the moderate "New Democrats."

But if Bush struggles as president, and if **McCain** loses on key issues such as defense funding and campaign finance reform, advisers say he may challenge Bush in the same way the reformist Teddy Roosevelt, **McCain's** hero, battled a conservative Republican, William Howard Taft, in 1912.

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

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
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Biography of Keith Nahigian, President

Without Confetti?

Victorious presidential campaigns usually pick over the carcasses of the defeated. This is an ugly way to put it, but it's the red-blooded truth. It can mean new employment opportunities for beaten campaign workers, but the process is awkward.

The winners are sometimes a tad too arrogant for their own good, not even recognizing where they are weak and could use help. The losers are sometimes too swollen with pride--or is that death?--to switch allegiances right away. Which pretty much explains the tension between the campaigns of George W. Bush and John McCain. A bitter fight is not easily forgotten. Never mind the candidates' bury-the-hatchet meeting in Pittsburgh the other day--cordial but standoffish--after which there was a ritual endorsement and a few thin smiles. The fact is, the Bush campaign has not hired a single McCain staffer.

"We've made overtures to one or two of them, and they've made very clear that they are happy where they are," explains Bush spokesman Ari Fleischer.

Pouty McCain aides unwilling to join the larger Republican cause of electing Bush?

"I don't think they think they need any change," explains **Keith Nahigian**, who was in charge of scheduling and advance work for the McCain campaign. "They won. It's like asking the Yankees if they need some players from the Indians."

Pssst: Before we let this go any further, we happen to know there have been back-channel efforts to gauge Nahigian's interest in joining the Bush team. Coy overtures from Bush intimates, coy responses from our man Keith.

Which brings us to our featured presentation, "Cool Campaign Confetti Tales."

Of all the signature McCain things that have been touted--the war-hero thing, the maverick thing, the Straight Talk Express thing--the one thing every presidential campaign quietly envied about the senator, and that includes the Bushies, is the confetti thing. John McCain is the king of colored-paper special effects usage.

There was the time, for instance, in Peterborough, N.H., when the crowd at an overflow town hall meeting was showered with red-white-and-blue confetti for more than three

minutes. (Note for the uninitiated: Campaign confetti showers usually last seconds.) Pictures from that event landed on the front pages of seven major newspapers and the cover of Time magazine.

Then there was the 3 a.m. New Hampshire victory rally at an airport hangar in Greenville, S.C. The hangar was transformed into a rave--strobe lighting danced across the crowd to the beat of the music and Day-Glo confetti.

And then there was the finale to an outdoor rally in Little Saigon in Orange County, Calif., where tens of thousands of yellow butterfly-shaped pieces of confetti floated above the crowd.

Behind all this work was Greg Crossey, a partner in the Balloon Co., a Pittsburgh outfit that produces large-scale balloon and confetti effects. Crossey performs his magic at fancy Washington galas, sporting events and political gigs. He has been involved in presidential campaigns since 1988, but never anything like the McCain campaign, where he became known simply as McCain's "confetti guy."

"I'd give them the most crazy idea for confetti," Crossey recalls, "knowing if I did, it wouldn't look like a presidential campaign."

Such as?

"Flood an arena with black light and launch confetti from six different locations in the arena," he says. "Use real cheesy colors, like lemon yellow, lime green and cobalt blue."

Use different shapes: circles, stars. Do themed confetti: black-and-white checks at a NASCAR Cafe event. Add in other effects: thousands of feet of streamers that explode like paper fireworks.

He'd tell the McCain people what he was thinking, and usually they'd go: Cool.

Crossey got so psyched.

"A lot of people will tell you that, but very few campaigns will let you do that."

Which gets us back to Nahigian, whose job was to plan McCain's events. He's the one who brought the Confetti Guy into the campaign, took him on the road, made him feel special, teamed him up with the sound and light guys. Essentially, Nahigian would take the ideas of the campaign's political strategists and try to design an event that looked good on television. "Make the right picture," as he puts it.

It became known as the McCain confetti look.

"It got to a point where if we didn't do it, the crowd would be mad," recalls Nahigian. "
'Where's our confetti?' It was like a Vegas show. The thing I would push them on is, I
want different, weird. Every day."

The Bush campaign does not do different, weird, every day. Which is why Nahigian always hesitates when asked about joining Bush's squad.

"Their events are the same," he says. "What they can't understand is the confetti's part of a whole package." Meaning music by Fatboy Slim and Van Halen. Meaning a 100-foot boardwalk that led McCain from the stage into the crowd. Meaning black floodlights. "You can't just shoot confetti off at the end of a Salon E event in a ballroom."

Crossey concurs: "The Bush campaign needs to create more excitement."

That said, will it happen?

"They've decided they are not going to use our services yet," says Crossey, who has had discussions with the Bush campaign and would like to help.

As for Nahigian, all of 32 years old and doing this stuff for politicians since 1990, he is not sure he wants to continue on. He's already worked for Dan Quayle, Steve Forbes, Bob Dole, New Jersey Gov. Christine Todd Whitman and the Republican National Convention. "I'm trying to figure out where I want to go next, if I even want to stay involved in this campaign cycle."

Perhaps, in the back of his mind, Nahigian is still stewing.

As for the Bushies, they won. Maybe they don't need a confetti operation.

"This is not the confetti season," says Fleischer. "This is the policy season. There is a time for rallies, a time for crowds. This is a time for policy."

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Nahigian -- McCain's staff members recommended the small neighborhood bookshop up the order. "Trust us," they said.


