
Senator John Kerry is expected to announce initiatives today before the International Association of Fire Fighters to increase homeland security, including the "creation of a volunteer community defense force." We wanted you to have factual information on what the USA Freedom Corps has achieved in the first year with respect to mobilizing the country to help protect the homeland. Attached are maps showing our progress and our Citizen Corps Annual Report. Below are key talking points.

- > State Citizen Corps Councils formed by the Governors in 37 states and territories with all 56 expected to have Councils by Spring 2003.
- More than 400 Citizen Corps Councils formed in 47 states and territories serving more than 20% of the population (more than 56M people).
- > \$21 million in grants from FEMA distributed to States and territories, with 75% of this amount expected to be passed down to local communities by April 23. Additional \$20 million from the FY 03 Appropriations. Of this \$18 million expected to be passed down to states and locals for Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training which is conducted primarily through the local fire departments.
- > National Citizen Corps Council formed comprised of leaders from 43 organizations. The fire fighter groups have five organizations on the Council: The International Association of Fire Chiefs, the International Association of Fire Fighters, the National Association of State Fire Marshals, the National Volunteer Fire Council, and the US Fire Administration (FEMA).
- **CERT** training is currently available in 244 localities in 42 states.
- Neighborhood Watch is at 60% of their 2 year goal of doubling the number of groups.
- New Medical Reserve Corps of doctors and nurses formed and HHS distributed \$2M dollars in grants to 42 communities and plans to award another 8M in FY 03 to approximately 120 communities.
- ➤ Volunteers in Police Service programs are registered in more than 337 localities in 47 States and Territories, more than tripling the number of programs since the SOTU.










Citizen Corps Medical Reserve Grants FY 2002

City / County Medical Reserve Corps Grant Recipients - November 1, 2002






Dear Fellow Americans:

Americans are responding to the evil and horror of the terrorist attacks of September 11 with a renewed commitment to doing good. In communities around the country people are serving others in countless ways, from helping their local fire department, to volunteering with the local Red Cross, to joining a neighborhood or community watch program.

To capture the spirit of service that has emerged throughout our communities, we launched the USA Freedom Corps initiative earlier this year. As part of that initiative, we created Citizen Corps to help coordinate volunteer activities that will make our communities safer, stronger, and better prepared to respond to any emergency situation.

Because every community is different, we are asking cities and counties across the country to create Citizen Corps Councils of their own design, bringing together first responders, volunteer organizations, law enforcement agencies, and community-serving institutions, such as schools, hospitals, and houses of worship.

Some Citizen Corps Councils will feature local activities that reflect new and existing national programs such as Neighborhood Watch, Community Emergency Response Teams, Terrorism Information Protection System, Volunteers in Police Service, and the Medical Reserve Corps. Some will include local programs that involve partnerships with law enforcement agencies, hospitals, first responders, and schools.

What all Citizen Corps Councils will have in common is that our local leaders will be working to expand opportunities for their community members to engage in volunteer service that will support emergency preparation, prevention, and response. This guide offers a suggested framework for community activity that will allow local government leaders to begin their own Citizen Corps Council and activities.

Together, we can protect our communities and make them places where responsibility and service are reflected in the good we do for others.

Executive Summary (2)

Since the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, Americans have acted with courage, compassion, and unity. To capture this spirit and to foster an American culture of service, citizenship, and responsibility, President George W. Bush has called upon all Americans to dedicate at least two years of their lives—the equivalent of 4,000 hours—in service to others. He launched the USA Freedom Corps initiative to inspire and enable all Americans to find ways to serve their community, their country, or the world.

Citizen Corps is the component of USA Freedom Corps that creates opportunities for individuals to volunteer to help their communities prepare for and respond to emergencies by bringing together local leaders, citizen volunteers and the network of first responder organizations, such as fire departments, police departments and emergency medical personnel. The goal is to have all citizens participate in making their communities safer, stronger, and better prepared for preventing and handling threats of terrorism, crime, and disasters of all kinds.

CITIZEN CORPS LEADERSHIP

The Citizen Corps effort will be coordinated at the local level by Citizen Corps Councils, or a similar coordinating body, which will bring together leaders from the relevant sectors of your community. The purpose of the council is to have all decision makers at the table to manage existing volunteer resources, to leverage mutually supportive endeavors among the represented groups, and to direct the overall local plans to implement Citizen Corps in the community.

At the state level, all Governors have appointed a state coordinator for Citizen Corps to facilitate this locally driven initiative. The state coordinator will work closely with the local governments, other state organizations, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the Department of Justice (DOJ), the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), and other federal agencies to implement a successful Citizen Corps program for the state.

Key state responsibilities include: identifying needs and developing a statewide strategy for increasing the first responder and volunteer collaboration; developing statewide marketing strategies; matching Citizen Corps training needs with other major state training initiatives; reporting statewide accomplishments; and ensuring that

Citizen Corps communities receive considerations for relevant grant funding administered by the state.

President Bush has requested more than \$230 million from Congress in Fiscal Year 2003 to support and expand Citizen Corps initiatives. This amount includes funds to support the five national Citizen Corps programs, including nationwide training and grants to communities through the state to support local activities that foster preparedness programs and partnerships between the first responder organizations and the volunteers.

CITIZEN CORPS PROGRAMS

Citizen Corps programs build on the successful efforts that are in place in many communities around the country to prevent crime and respond to emergencies. Programs that started through local innovation are the foundation for Citizen Corps and this national approach to citizen participation in community safety.

Currently three federal agencies, FEMA, DOJ, and HHS, administer five programs that are being promoted at the national level as part of Citizen Corps. These programs will be implemented nationwide by fall 2002. FEMA coordinates the overall effort of helping communities establish local Citizen Corps programs.

The five national Citizen Corps programs are:

The goal is to double the number of groups participating in Neighborhood Watch by 2004. ★ FEMA's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program provides training in emergency preparedness and in basic response techniques to local trainers who in turn train citizens, enabling them to take a more active role in personal and public safety. The goal is to triple the number of citizens who are CERT trained, increasing the number nationwide to 600,000 by 2004. * Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) is a program administered by DOJ. ★ HHS will administer a community-based Medical Reserve Corps that will be launched in fall 2002. Medical Reserve Corps volunteers can also play a productive role in meeting pressing but non-emergency public health needs of the community throughout the year. The initiative's design is based on existing programs, such as Highway Watch and Coast Watch, that allow truckers and ship captains to report dangerous conditions along their routes.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT IMPLEMENTATION
Citizen Corps is designed to be tailored to each
community and will be managed at the local level by
Citizen Corps Councils, or a similar entity,
comprised of leaders from: emergency management
and the first responder community; volunteer,
community service, faith- and community-based
organizations; educational institutions; medical
facilities; business and industry; and the community's
neighborhood networks.

Each community that is implementing Citizen Corps should consider creating a Citizen Corps Council. This guide will help your community join the many others across the country that have already started Citizen Corps Councils in order to be prepared to fully implement the Citizen Corps programs in their communities.

The primary objectives of the councils are to:

- * Match the needs of first responders with the skills and abilities of volunteers to make their families, their homes, and their communities safer from the threats of terrorism, crime, and disasters.
- * Educate the public on safety, help citizens take an active role in protecting themselves from harm, and teach citizens what to do in the event of a crisis.
- * Spearhead efforts to offer citizens new and existing volunteer opportunities, educational information, and training courses to address crime, terrorism, and natural disaster risks.

- * Capture innovative practices and report accomplishments that can be replicated in other communities nationwide.
- * Survey the community to assess increased awareness and Citizen Corps participation.

Creating a new organization to start Citizen Corps is not required. If your community already has a strong team that brings together all sectors of your community, including first responders and volunteer groups, you may want to ask this group to take on the responsibility of promoting Citizen Corps and to acknowledge this group as affiliated with Citizen Corps. You are strongly encouraged to leverage existing resources and build on current successful programs whenever possible.

BENEFITS TO THE COMMUNITY

Major disasters in a community can overload the capability of first responders, especially during the first 12 to 72 hours of the response. Having citizens who are better prepared to take care of themselves

and others during times of crisis will allow first responders to focus their efforts on the most critical, life-threatening situations.

In addition, there are many tasks that a well-trained and organized group of volunteers could perform on an ongoing basis that would free up sworn officers, licensed health professionals, and professional firefighters so that they could focus more on immediate emergency response needs and less on the routine or administrative aspects of their responsibilities. Successful models of such activity exist throughout the country and are primed to be taken nationwide.

OVERVIEW

During his 2002 State of the Union address, President George W. Bush called upon every American to commit at least two years of their lives - the equivalent of 4,000 hours - to the service of others. Through the USA Freedom Corps, he wants to help every American answer that call to service by strengthening and expanding service opportunities to protect our homeland, to support our communities, and to extend American compassion around the world.

Coordinated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Citizen Corps is the component of the USA Freedom Corps that focuses on opportunities for people across the country to participate in a range of measures to make their families, homes, and communities safer from the threats of terrorism, crime, and disasters of all kinds. Citizen Corps also brings together a community's first responders, firefighters, emergency health care providers, law enforcement, and emergency managers with its volunteer resources.

Citizen Corps will help people across America take a more active role in crime prevention, support the emergency medical community, and be better trained in a wide range of emergency preparedness and disaster response activities. The events of this past year have motivated many Americans to want to help others more and to strengthen their communities. Citizen Corps offers the means for citizens to help make our communities safer, stronger, and better prepared and to answer the President's call to service.

COMPONENTS OF CITIZEN CORPS

The Citizen Corps effort will be coordinated at the local level by Citizen Corps Councils, or a similar coordinating body, which will bring together leaders from the relevant sectors of your community. The purpose of the Council is to have all decision makers at the table to manage existing volunteer resources, to leverage mutually supportive endeavors among the represented groups, and to direct the overall local plans to implement Citizen Corps in the community.

Additional explanation of the Citizen Corps Councils is provided in Section II.

Current National Programs

Currently, there are five federal programs that are being promoted at the national level to be implemented locally as part of Citizen Corps. The long-term goal is to have every community implement all five programs.

- ★ The Citizens' Preparedness Guidebook, produced by the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC) with support from DOJ, provides current crime and disaster preparedness techniques, as well as the latest information on terrorism, to give Americans guidance on how to prepare in our homes, neighborhoods, at work, at the airport, in places of worship, and in public spaces. The guide is available on the Citizen Corps website www.citizencorps.gov or by calling NCPC at 1-800-WE-PREVENT (1-800-937-7383).
- * Appendix A provides the website address of other federal agencies and organizations that have useful information relating to the Citizen Corps mission.

Other Activities

There are many other opportunities for participating in Citizen Corps. There is a vast array of educational and volunteer activities already underway across the country that focus on making communities safer, stronger, and better prepared. They can be either interest-based programs or broad, community-wide initiatives. If your community participates in such activities, you may choose to integrate these efforts into the local Citizen Corps right away. Examples

could include:

- * Local activities that are similar to Neighborhood Watch, CERT, or VIPS, but may have different names in your community;
- * Family preparedness materials being taught and distributed in neighborhoods, in the workplace, and throughout the school system;
- * Community, faith-based, and youth programs that establish neighborhood support networks and disseminate disaster preparedness educational materials and preparedness kits to disadvantaged, elderly, non-English speaking, and persons with disabilities;
- * Programs that involve volunteer medical professionals in an organized response to emergencies, such as those administered by the American Red Cross;
- * Volunteer amateur radio operators serving as reserve communications experts in times of crisis;
- * Volunteer engineers and engineering students performing structural analysis on critical infrastructure, lifelines, schools, and at-risk buildings;
- * Programs for volunteers to participate in projects to reduce the damage to schools, hospitals, and other public buildings from known hazards in your area, such as floods, tornados, earthquakes, and hurricanes;
- * Community and family disaster preparedness efforts conducted by established volunteer groups such as local Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) and Volunteer Centers, or community service organizations, churches and faith-based organizations already active in your community;
- ★ Volunteer fire departments and emergency medical teams;
- * Programs supported by the local Chamber of Commerce to train business owners and employees on disaster preparedness and emergency response measures;
- ★ High schools and college community service groups that promote Citizen Corps principles; and
- * Volunteer participation in developing a community communications system for the color-coded Homeland Security Advisory System.

Every community is different. Citizen Corps calls on your community's creativity and inventiveness to develop other programs or activities that work in your area and that encompass all sectors of your community. Successful programs or approaches to citizen participation that start in one community can spread nationwide through the Citizen Corps network.

BENEFITS TO YOUR COMMUNITY

Securing our safety and freedom requires that we all work together. Every American has a critical role to play. Major disasters in a community can overload the capability of first responders, especially during the first critical 12 to 72 hours of the event. Citizen Corps will provide the community with a well-trained, readily available pool of local people who know their community and who can help during this critical time when outside assistance may have not yet arrived.

On a day-to-day basis, your council will help citizens take a more active role in crime prevention, risk reduction, emergency preparedness, and public health issues. Citizen Corps Councils and the programs they oversee will make your community a safer, better place to live. Specific benefits include:

- * Supplementing a community's professional police, fire, emergency management, public health, and public safety capabilities where appropriate, especially in times of emergency;
- ★ Giving the residents of your community a greater sense of security, responsibility, and personal control;
- * Showcasing your community's efforts in crime prevention, public health and safety, emergency medical response, risk reduction and mitigation practices, emergency preparedness, and emergency response as part of the national Citizen Corps initiative;
- * Bringing together the volunteer and the first responder communities to promote the concept that everyone has a role in making their community safer, stronger, and better prepared;
- ★ Demonstrating your leadership and your personal commitment to the safety of your community;
 - * Building community pride and patriotism; and
- ★ Preparing us all for the vital role of caring for ourselves and others in times of crisis. ■

Citizen Corps Councils

ORGANIZING A CITIZEN CORPS COUNCIL Communities all across America already embrace the principles of Citizen Corps. There are many elected officials, business leaders, and involved citizens already doing their part to make their community a great place to live. Many communities also already have an organization that promotes public health and safety, disaster preparedness, and crime prevention in the community. No doubt, there is a strong base already involved in this effort in your own community. These activities are at the heart of Citizen Corps.

The Citizen Corps Councils will bring together leaders from the relevant sectors of your community to coordinate the Citizen Corps effort. The purpose of the council is to have all decision makers at the table to manage existing volunteer resources, to leverage mutually supportive endeavors among the represented groups, and to direct the overall local plans to implement Citizen Corps in the community. Each community should have only one group that has the lead role in implementing Citizen Corps.

Each community and region will have to determine its geographic boundaries and its own membership. Suggested membership of the Citizen Corps Council, or similar entity, includes the following:

- * Leadership from elected officials, such as the mayor, city council members, county commissioners, or the tribal government leaders;
- ★ Leadership from emergency management and from the first responder community: law enforcement, fire, and emergency medical services, and health care providers;
- * Leadership from volunteer, community service, and faith-based groups, including a local VOAD group and Volunteer Center, if you have one;
- * Leadership from any existing community substructure, such as advisory neighborhood commissions, wards, voting districts, census tracts, water and sewer districts, or other groups that represent a large crosssection of the community; and

★ Leadership from major industries or other groups in the area, such as community leaders from educational institutions and school boards, the business community, environmental and transportation groups, including airports, and utility providers. Other representatives could be from specific segments of the community, such as the elderly, minority populations, non-English speakers, and local media executives.

The primary qualification to participating on the council is making a commitment to educate the public on safety, to help citizens take an active role in protecting themselves from harm, to teach citizens what to do in the event of a crisis, and to expand volunteer opportunities that will make the community safer.

You do not need to create a new organization to start Citizen Corps. Leveraging existing resources is strongly encouraged. If your community already has a strong team that brings together all sectors of your community, including first responders and volunteer groups, you may want to ask this group to take on the responsibility of promoting Citizen Corps and to acknowledge this group as affiliated with Citizen Corps.

There may be an existing group in your community that includes many of the appropriate participants, such as local emergency planning committees, that could take the lead in joining with additional relevant parties to implement Citizen Corps.

There are a number of national organizations, such as the American Red Cross and the Salvation Army, that could be key participants in your local management structure. If your community does not have local representation of these groups, you may want to contact the national organization to see how you can start a local affiliate.

However you choose to establish the local management structure, this group should be charged with managing all aspects of Citizen Corps at the local level and with bringing Citizen Corps programs and principles to residents of the community.

The purpose of the Citizen Corps Council, or similar coordinating group, is to develop a systematic, efficient, and effective method for providing public

education and training opportunities, stimulating wide-spread participation, and organizing volunteer programs to increase the safety of your community. Having duplicative efforts or competing entities is not productive.

Depending on the size of your community, you may need to have a steering committee within the Citizen Corps Council and subcommittees to focus on particular efforts. Subcommittees could be assigned a particular function, such as marketing and communications, or a particular focus, such as K-12 education on emergency preparedness.

THE IMPORTANCE OF LEADERSHIP

Leadership within the council is critical for success. This leader could be an elected community official, an executive with one of your community's major employers, the head of your community's economic development group, or a leader from the volunteer community. Because of the first responder's role in the event of an emergency, it is suggested that first responder representatives not take the lead role for the council.

The most important qualifications for the leader of the council are the ability to motivate team members to reach your collective goal of making your community a safer place to live, work, and play and of providing opportunities for all citizens to participate; and a commitment to broad community representation. If the local elected official is not the operational leader of the council, it will be critical that he or she provide clear and public support to the council through public endorsements and be kept informed of council activities.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CITIZEN CORPS COUNCIL

While this initiative provides tremendous flexibility for you to implement Citizen Corps in a way that best suits your community, some general responsibilities of the local organizing group include:

- * Creating an action plan to involve the community in prevention, preparedness, and response activities and to mobilize the community in a large-scale event;
- ★ Identifying ways in which the community's volunteer resources can help meet the needs of its first responders;

- * Working with existing neighborhood leaders, or creating a neighborhood leadership structure, to design a systematic approach to educate the public and encourage Citizen Corps participation throughout the community;
- * Spearheading efforts to offer citizens new and existing volunteer opportunities, educational information, and training courses to address crime, terrorism, public health issues, and natural disaster risks;
- * Recognizing all activities that promote prevention, preparedness and response training as a part of Citizen Corps and encouraging new endeavors;
- ★ Organizing special projects and community events to promote Citizen Corps activities and recruiting volunteers to participate;
- * Fostering a spirit of mutual support by working with Citizen Corps Councils in neighboring communities and jurisdictions to be able to share resources in times of need;
- * Capturing innovative practices and reporting accomplishments to the state coordinator for Citizen Corps; and
- ★ Surveying your community to assess increased awareness and Citizen Corps participation.

LIABILITY ISSUES

Councils should consult with a local attorney regarding any risks or liabilities that might arise from its activities. Most local bar associations encourage members to provide pro bono (free of charge) services to worthwhile causes. A council's potential exposure to liability for acts or omissions of its staff or volunteers will vary from state to state.

Individuals who participate in council activities should be advised of their potential risks of liability under state law as well. Some volunteer activities may be covered by so-called Good Samaritan laws in the various states, these laws protect volunteers who render assistance in limited circumstances. Councils may consider obtaining release from liability and similar instruments if the local counsel deems it necessary. A compendium of state liability laws is available at www.citizencorps.gov/ccorps.



INITIAL MEETINGS

Creating a Citizen Corps Council or asking an existing organizing group to expand their mission and take on this responsibility is an easy first step to making Citizen Corps an active part of your community. You may want to hold one or more brainstorming sessions, where council members can collectively identify goals for your community and develop a better understanding of the risks your community faces. Topics that the Citizen Corps Council might address can include:

- * Educating council members on the roles, responsibilities, and practices of the first responders, volunteer organizations, and any existing neighborhood organizational structure in the community;
- * Identifying the existing activities and resources within your community that support Citizen Corps principles;
- * Identifying volunteer groups and opportunities within your community that could assist in reducing risk or that could supplement resources in an emergency;
- * Creating a menu of volunteer opportunities in which community residents could easily participate or partnering with the local Volunteer Center, if you have one, to design volunteer recruitment strategies;
- * Assessing resources within your community that could be drawn on to support volunteerism and public education in your community;
- * Identifying possible resources to support Citizen Corps, including local private sector support and contributions from foundations and non-profit organizations;
- * Discussing opportunities to build public awareness and to educate the community about Citizen Corps opportunities within your community; and
- * Developing a wish list of additional resources that your community might need to support a comprehensive Citizen Corps effort.

DEVELOPING A CITIZEN CORPS ACTION PLAN

As you begin to assess your needs and resources, you should work toward developing a clear mission statement and an action plan. Your Citizen Corps Council action plan could include short and long-term

goals, a community communication system for emergency warnings, and a community mobilization plan with a specific plan outlining how to meet these goals.

Short-term goals could include having working smoke alarms and emergency kits in every household by the time school starts again in the fall, having each business in the community practice their evacuation plans within a month, training all senior high school students in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), or having Neighborhood Watch groups in all neighborhoods of the community. You may also want to target specific groups within your community, such as people living in high-risk areas, the youth population, and Americans with disabilities or disadvantaged populations.

It will be important for you to set meaningful, attainable goals, to make them public, to meet them, and then to recognize and celebrate your success.

LINKING LOCAL ACTIVITIES WITH THE NATIONAL EFFORT

It will also be important for you to link local activities to the national effort. Although you may have an existing organization take on this responsibility and not create a new Citizen Corps Council, it is critical that all activities at the local level that encompass citizen participation in emergency preparedness, response capability training, crime prevention, and skill-based volunteer programs related to community safety be identified with Citizen Corps.

A great way to get started is to have a public event to recognize the activities that volunteers, first responders, and residents in your community are already doing that relate to Citizen Corps. Explain that there is a new national initiative to link all these activities and to introduce other activities to promote personal and community safety. Make a commitment to help each resident in the community participate in Citizen Corps. Citizen participation can include:

* Becoming better prepared and taking measures to reduce risk within their home, such as putting together a family emergency preparedness plan and kit, installing smoke detectors or elevating electrical

appliances above flood stage, securing free standing shelving to a wall or strapping down a water heater;

- * Being a part of a Neighborhood Watch Program group;
- * Becoming a volunteer firefighter or emergency medical technician;
- ★ Volunteering their particular skills to help with community risk assessments; and
- ★ Volunteering with community organizations already active in disaster preparedness and response.

The goal is to include everyone in your community. One of your first steps to support Citizen Corps is to promote the initiative and to expand the range of opportunities available to the residents of your community. Other opportunities for Citizen Corps volunteers are listed in Appendix C.

There is no standard way to approach promoting your local efforts; each community is encouraged to be creative and to use the Citizen Corps message to promote participation. Your community may host community-wide Citizen Corps community preparedness days to challenge everyone in the community to put together a home emergency preparedness kit. Another may put the Citizen Corps logo on appropriate local websites. Another may use the local media outlets to promote local Citizen Corps activities and to educate the public. Another may focus on the school system to disseminate information. And some communities will do all of these and more.

Information Sharing

A critical part of making Citizen Corps a success is building a network of communities that are committed to engaging their citizens in making their neighborhoods safer, stronger, and better prepared for all situations. To facilitate this network, FEMA maintains a web-based directory of Citizen Corps Councils. Through this directory you will be able to contact other Citizen Corps Councils throughout the nation and have a direct exchange of information with your counterparts. This directory will also enable your state and federal partners to contact you

with updated information as the programs evolve nationally and to collect innovative local practices for national promotion.

As soon as you have designated a group to coordinate Citizen Corps in your community, please log on to www.citizencorps.gov/ccorps and register your Citizen Corps Council contact information by clicking on the registration link. In providing this information to FEMA, you will be agreeing to be part of a list to be shared with other community leaders working to create Citizen Corps in their community.

NATIONAL CITIZEN CORPS PROGRAMS IN YOUR COMMUNITY

The current five federal Citizen Corps programs will be implemented nationwide by fall 2002.

Right now, every community can start Neighborhood Watch groups. Guidance on how to begin is available from your local sheriff's department, your local police department, or from the National Sheriffs' Association. (Visit the National Sheriffs' Association at www.usaonwatch.org for more information.) A strong network of Neighborhood Watch groups can also serve as a delivery system for other Citizen Corps materials, such as emergency communications, Community Emergency Response Team training, or a family preparedness checklist.

FEMA's Are You Ready? A Guide to Citizen Preparedness provides practical information on how your family can prepare for any disaster. Available on the Citizen Corps website, www.citizencorps.gov, this guide can be used to help everyone in your community be better prepared.

The Community Emergency Response Team training program is a 20-hour course, typically conducted over a seven-week period. Training sessions cover disaster preparedness, fire suppression, basic disaster medical services, light search and rescue, team organization, and a module on protection against terrorist threats.

The training also includes a disaster simulation in

Getting Started (continued)

which participants practice skills that they learned throughout the course. Your local fire and emergency medical services departments (EMS) may have a key role in bringing CERT to your community. Many states already have experienced CERT trainers who could come to your community and provide training. Soon, every state will have this capability.

VIPS was launched nationwide in May 2002 and examples of best practices are available at www.policevolunteers.org. The Medical Reserve Corps guidance will be launched nationwide in falll 2002. Operation TIPS is in development.

Available Resources

Fortunately, implementing Citizen Corps in your community can be accomplished with resources that you may already have available. Volunteer agencies in your community and your Volunteer Center, if you have one, can help you better direct volunteer interest to Citizen Corps activities. There are many low-cost ways for local businesses to participate; by donating the cost of a publication, by sponsoring a Citizen Corps volunteer fair, by sponsoring training for employees or neighborhood residents, and by practicing emergency preparedness plans for the business. The federal and state governments will provide training materials and technical assistance to help you get started and to help you sustain the momentum.

The Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS), a federal agency that operates nationwide service programs, may make available to Citizen Corps Councils volunteers that participate in AmeriCorps, Senior Corps, and Learn and Serve America programs. Many of these participants are already active in disaster-related programs with other voluntary agencies. Volunteers could serve to help communities establish a training and information delivery system in neighborhoods, schools, and businesses, and could help with family preparedness and crime prevention initiatives in the community or across a region.

Volunteer support and participation in Citizen Corps can come from a variety of sources. Encourage your council members to be creative when thinking about potential resources that exist throughout the community. Appendix A is a list of government, emergency management, and first responder community websites that may be helpful to you as you expand your volunteer base. Appendix B includes a list of questions to help your council identify possible resources, including people, materials, and financial.

President Bush has requested more than \$230 million from Congress in Fiscal Year 2003 to support and expand Citizen Corps initiatives. This amount includes funds for FEMA, DOJ, and HHS to support the five national Citizen Corps programs, including nationwide CERT training, and grants to communities through the state to support local activities that foster preparedness programs and partnerships between the first responder organizations and the volunteers.

Communicating Success

Communicating success is a key element of sustaining momentum. It is important to share your success with the residents of your community as well as with your state and federal partners. By sharing ideas and practices that work in one community, similar actions can be embraced by other communities and can inspire further creativity.

Developing a strong Citizen Corps Council will require significant proactive communication with residents of your community. Identifying creative ways to get the message out about opportunities available through Citizen Corps, as well as calling your citizens to action and communicating success, will require an ongoing communications strategy that can include media coverage, events, and presentations.

You may want to consider forming a communications committee within your council that includes local media representatives, public relations and marketing executives, and talented spokespersons who will help you to effectively recruit and educate the members of your community.

The communications committee may want to consider:

- * Developing a presentation about Citizen Corps in your community that can be shared at meetings held by groups within your community. Once a presentation has been developed, council members can fan out to present Citizen Corps to community groups, local parent/teacher associations, volunteer clubs and other groups that are interested in Citizen Corps.
- ★ Planning a media outreach strategy that will tap into and develop relationships with your community's

local media to educate them on Citizen Corps. Media opportunities might include interviews with participants active in Neighborhood Watch, coverage of your local government's proclamation of Citizen Corps week, letters to the editor, or meeting with the editorial board about Citizen Corps. Local media could also sponsor a regular newspaper or television spot to feature volunteer opportunities and Citizen Corps activities/success stories.

- * Designating contacts for speaking to the media and working with these contacts to develop a consistent message for promoting Citizen Corps within your community.
- * Incorporating Citizen Corps into newsletters and other publications developed by your community's local government, Chamber of Commerce, or neighborhood associations.
- * Planning a community Citizen Corps fair to bring together specific volunteer opportunities in your community with citizens interested in contributing. By inviting a local radio station to sponsor it, they could also provide public service announcements in advance to promote the fair and broadcasting live from the fair on the day of the event. Your local Volunteer Center may be able to help arrange such an event.
- * Contacting members of Congress and their local staff to help promote Citizen Corps activities within your community.

You may also want to create a recognition committee to provide support and recognition to Citizen Corps volunteers. Your local Volunteer Center can assist you with ideas for appropriate public recognition.

Government Roles 1

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

Citizen Corps is a vital component of President Bush's new USA Freedom Corps initiative, through which he wants to inspire every American to answer the call to service and to strengthen and expand service opportunities to protect our homeland, to support our communities, and to extend American compassion around the world. President Bush will continue to echo his call to service and encourage Americans to serve their communities through Citizen Corps.

Additional aspects of the federal government role in Citizen Corps will include:

- * Promoting Citizen Corps at the national level and providing a national message, a logo, and a brand;
- * Fostering state and community participation, overseeing progress, recognizing accomplishments, and providing opportunities for mentoring and sharing ideas and resources;
- * Compiling accurate information and developing training standards and training materials for Citizen Corps activities;
- * Conducting train-the-trainers courses to develop state training capabilities and providing on-line educational opportunities, as appropriate;
- ★ Helping identify volunteer programs and initiatives that support the goals of Citizen Corps;
- ★ Helping secure national partnerships to promote Citizen Corps throughout the country; and
- * Developing financial incentives and tie-ins with other federal programs to encourage local government participation in Citizen Corps.

At the national level, Citizen Corps is coordinated by FEMA, in collaboration with DOJ, and HHS and is supported by CNCS. In addition, FEMA is working with other federal agencies, national volunteer organizations, and representatives from first responders associations. FEMA's regional offices will work with states and communities to help make Citizen Corps a success.

STATE GOVERNMENT

The responsibilities of state governments mirror those of the federal government and include the mission to encourage every community in the state to participate in Citizen Corps.

Local Citizen Corps Councils will be supported by a state coordinator for Citizen Corps. States are also encouraged to create a state Citizen Corps Council to bring together a number of state, local, and community organizations to discuss opportunities for collaboration and ways to address the needs of communities across the state and to share innovative practices and ways to avoid pitfalls. Since this is primarily a local government initiative, it is critical that the state coordinator has a good working relationship with the local governments and serves as an advocate.

Key state responsibilities include: identifying needs and developing a statewide strategy for increasing the first responder and volunteer collaboration; developing statewide marketing strategies; matching Citizen Corps training needs with other major state training initiatives; reporting statewide accomplishments; and ensuring that Citizen Corps communities receive consideration for any relevant grant funding administered by the state.

States could also support Citizen Corps by developing relevant state policies and practices. To lend their support, governors and other state representatives could also promote Citizen Corps in public speaking engagements, press conferences, and media events.

Conclusion On

We have experienced many changes as a nation since September 11, 2001. We are now more aware of our vulnerabilities, more appreciative of the freedoms we are protecting, and more understanding that we have a personal responsibility for the safety of our families, our neighbors, and our communities. Citizen Corps was created to engage all Americans in making our communities safer, stronger, and better prepared for any situation.

This is an exciting time in our nation's history. We have the opportunity to reinvigorate our national identity and to build an American culture of service, citizenship, and responsibility. We must not miss this opportunity to harness the innumerable acts of kindness taking place in our communities everyday and to make them a part of this profound cultural change.

Appendix B Potential Resources for Citizen Corps Councils

These questions may help you identify resources to help you implement Citizen Corps.

GENERAL.

- 1. Who could champion this initiative in your community? Who might champion it within segments of your community? What is the best way to foster city/county/regional collaboration?
- 2. What organizations are already active in programs relevant to Citizen Corps objectives?
- 3. Which organizations usually sponsor or participate in various events that happen in your community (e.g., days of service, parades, fairs, block parties, speakers, carnivals, etc.)?
- 4. What federal, state, or non-profit agencies serve your community? Could they provide staff, guidance, or training to participate in Citizen Corps activities, such as United Way?
- 5. Does a regional planning council or a related organization include your community within its sphere of interest?
- 6. What current preparedness activities are in progress in your communities? How can you involve youth organizations, such Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts or Explorers in Citizen Corps activities?

VOLUNTEER

- 7. Do you have a Volunteer Center in your community where volunteer opportunities can be registered and where you can receive assistance with recruitment efforts? What do you need to do to start one?
- 8. Is there a state or local VOAD that could provide training and planning assistance for emergency preparedness, mitigation, response, and recovery?
- 9. How can you involve organizations such as the American Red Cross and the Salvation Army that are already active in disaster preparedness and response?

- 10. Are there courses and programs already being provided in your community by voluntary organizations?
- 11. What volunteer groups are already in active in the community that can be called upon to serve as Citizen Corps Council partners, including community service groups, faith-based groups, and high school civic groups?
- 12. Is your community served by AmeriCorps volunteers? Does your community have an active Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP)?
- 13. Are there volunteers already working and trained with organizations whose missions complement the goals of Citizen Corps? How can you tap into organizations that already recruit, manage, and place volunteers?
- 14. What other organizations, such as universities, volunteer groups, civic organizations, business councils, mosques, churches, or synagogues, can be tapped to sponsor volunteer participation or community events?

SCHOOLS AND UNIVERSITIES

- 15. Are there colleges, universities, or vocational/technical schools in your community that have sponsored or participated in local preparedness activities?
- 16. Do any of these institutions have curricula or degrees of study programs related to civic administration or emergency management? Do they have an internship program that you could tap to support council efforts?
- 17. What other resources might your community's colleges, universities or vocational/technical schools provide to your Citizen Corps Councils?
- 18. Do your local high schools incorporate a community service element as part of their graduation requirement? How can you involve high school clubs' members or their leaders in Citizen Corps?

Appendix B Potential Resources for Citizen Corps Councils

BUSINESS SECTOR

- 19. Which businesses in your community have corporate policies and value statements that encourage worker participation in community life?
- 20. Are there businesses in your community that have a good fit with the goals of Citizen Corps, such as insurance companies, security firms, training facilities, or manufacturers of preparedness kit items?

MEDIA

- 21. Are there individuals or local celebrities in your community who would be willing to serve as motivational speakers to encourage people to participate in Citizen Corps?
- 22. Which TV, radio, print, or other media outlets in your area are community-service oriented?
- 23. Which journalists or reporters in your community frequently cover human interest stories or stories on disaster and emergency management?
- 24. Is there a local weather forecaster or news anchor who could be encouraged to serve as a Citizen Corps Council member?

Appendix C Opportunities for Citizen Corps Volunteers

The following are examples of how citizens can engage in volunteer opportunities that support the efforts of Citizen Corps. This is by no means an exhaustive list but is intended to give you some ideas for getting your citizens involved.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAM

- * Arrange for home security inspections by crime prevention officers to identify security vulnerabilities
 - **★** Upgrade locks, security hardware, and lighting
- * Train family members to keep valuables secure and to lock windows when leaving home
- ★ Train family members on identifying suspicious behaviors that could indicate terrorist activity
- * Ask neighbors to watch for suspicious activity when the house is vacant
- * Organize block WATCH groups to assist children, the elderly, and other especially vulnerable persons if they appear to be distressed, in danger, or lost
- * Organize meetings with neighborhood groups and trained crime prevention officers to discuss security needs and crime prevention strategies
- * Obtain and study informative materials from the National Sheriffs' Association, the National Crime Prevention Council, and local law enforcement agencies

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAMS (CERT)

- ★ Staff a community education booth at community events
- ★ Identify safety needs and vulnerable individuals in your neighborhood
- ★ Distribute disaster education material in your neighborhood, in multiple languages if appropriate
- * Assist with writing and distributing a CERT newsletter
- ★ Help organize drills, activities, and supplemental training for your team
- * Participate in a speaker's bureau to schools and clubs

- * Assist emergency management officials and fire departments with installing smoke alarms and other special projects
- * Help with CERT administrative duties by maintaining databases, helping with class registration, and assisting with class logistics
 - **★** Organize recognition activities for volunteers
- * After CERT training, assist in evacuation, shelter management, donations management, care of responders at fires or emergencies, mass care of victims from a large event, damage assessment, and perimeter control

VOLUNTEERS IN POLICE SERVICE (VIPS)

- **★** Take police reports
- ★ Make follow-up telephone calls to victims
- **★** Conduct fingerprinting
- ★ Engage in crowd/parking control at special events
- ★ Participate in search and rescue missions
- ★ Participate in mounted patrols in parking lots at high school football games
- ★ Operate metal detectors at a courthouse
- **★** Serve subpoenas

MEDICAL RESERVE CORPS

During emergencies, members of the Medical Reserve Corps could:

- **★** Assess and monitor the condition of patients
- * Counsel patients
- * Perform support and management activities (e.g., inventory and distribution of pharmaceuticals, supplies, and food, and facilitating patient transfers)
 - * Administer and distribute medication

In non-emergency situations, local agencies could request volunteers to assist them in performing their routine duties. Volunteers could:

- * Distribute educational materials about the need for immunizations
 - **★** Give immunizations

Appendix C Opportunities for Citizen Corps Volunteers

- * Assist with health education
- * Provide additional support for community screening efforts (e.g., breast cancer, hypertension, diabetes, etc.)

FIRE DEPARTMENT

- * Become a volunteer firefighter or emergency medical services technician
- * Offer to help the fire department in its fundraising efforts. Help with bingo or bake sales or other department fundraising programs
- * Help the department with its financial matters if you have a business background or special skills in this area
- * Help with correspondence, public outreach, and records management
- * Assist the fire department and fire prevention experts with fire prevention education in your neighborhood, place of business, schools, and community organizations
- * Assist the department with its canteen service so they will have water and food for major fires

What is Citizen Corps?

President Bush's new Citizen Corps initiative offers the means for citizens to help make our communities safer, stronger, and better prepared from the threats of terrorism, crime, and disasters of all kinds.

Citizen Corps brings together leaders from law enforcement, fire, emergency medical and other emergency management, volunteer organizations, local elected officials, and the private sector to form Citizen Corps Councils. These Councils provide local oversight for engaging citizens in homeland security and for promoting community and family safety in three principle ways: through public education and outreach, through training opportunities, and through volunteer programs that draw on special skills and interests.

Citizen Corps is composed of existing and new federally sponsored programs and other activities that share the common goal of helping communities prevent, prepare for and respond to crime, disasters, pressing public health needs and emergencies of all kinds. It encourages all Americans to take an active role in building safer, stronger, and better-prepared communities one neighborhood at a time!

Community Emergency Response Team

Community Emergency Response Team training is a Federal Emergency Management Agency program that educates citizens about the hazards they face in their community and trains them in lifesaving skills. If needed following a disaster, these citizen-responders use their training as part of a neighborhood or workplace team to help others when professional responders are overwhelmed or not immediately available. CERT members provide immediate assistance to victims in their area, organize spontaneous volunteers who have not had the training, and collect disaster intelligence that will assist professional responders with prioritization and allocation of resources when they arrive.

PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM

CERT promotes a partnering between emergency management and response agencies and the people in the community that they serve. The goal is to train members of neighborhoods and workplaces in basic response skills. Then CERT teams are formed and maintained as part of the emergency response capability for their area.

If there is a natural or man-made event that overwhelms or delays the community's professional responders, CERT members can assist others by applying the basic response and organizational skills that they learned during their CERT training. These skills can help save and sustain lives until help arrives. CERT members also can volunteer for special projects that improve a community's preparedness.

HOW IT WORKS

The basic CERT training program is a 20-hour course, typically delivered one evening per week over a 7-week period. Training sessions cover disaster preparedness, fire suppression, basic disaster medical operations, light search and rescue, disaster psychology, team organization, and a new module on terrorism to educate CERT members about BNICE agents: Biological, Nuclear, Incendiary, Chemical, and Explosive. This module will help CERT members identify situations where these agents may have been used and protective actions that they should take.

The training concludes with a disaster simulation in which participants practice skills that they learned throughout the course.

Neighborhood Watch Program CITIZEN COMPS

What is Citizen Corps?

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Citizen Corps brings together leaders from law enforcement, fire, emergency medical and other emergency management, volunteer organizations, local elected officials, and the private sector to form Citizen Corps Councils. These Councils provide local oversight for engaging citizens in homeland security and for promoting community and family safety in three principle ways: through public education and outreach, through training opportunities, and through volunteer programs that draw on special skills and interests.

Citizen Corps is composed of existing and new federally sponsored programs and other activities that share the common goal of helping communities prevent, prepare for and respond to crime, disasters, pressing public health needs and emergencies of all kinds. It encourages all Americans to take an active role in building safer, stronger, and better-prepared communities one neighborhood at a time!

Neighborhood Watch Program

The Neighborhood Watch Program is already a strong force in community protection in America's neighborhoods. President Bush and Attorney General Ashcroft have announced that the National Sheriffs' Association will expand the Neighborhood Watch Program so that it serves more community groups, and offers community members new information about how to recognize and report signs of potential terrorist activity in their neighborhoods. These residents are critical in the detection, prevention, and disruption of terrorism. Many neighborhoods already have Neighborhood Watch programs. For those that do not, this new initiative may provide the incentive for them to start one as part of Citizen Corps.

Over the next 2 years, the National Sheriffs' Association will help to double the number of Neighborhood Watch Programs operating throughout the country from approximately 7,500 to more than 15,000. Neighborhood Watch materials and training will also be revised to teach individuals how they can assist in the war against terrorism by incorporating preparedness in their daily lives. Neighborhood Watch will continue to work to reduce crime in neighborhoods nationwide by encouraging businesses, the faith community, schools, and citizens to cooperate and assist local law enforcement by reporting suspicious activity.

RESOURCES AVAILABLE

The National Crime Prevention Council, in partnership with the U.S. Department of Justice, has developed a Citizen Preparedness Guide for use in this and other Citizen Corps programs. The guide provides specific actions that citizens can take in their communities to reduce crime. The guide outlines five specific themes: protecting one's self and family; protecting and comforting children; knowing and caring for neighbors; reporting crimes and suspicious activity; and emergency preparedness. Terrorism Information and Prevention System (Operation TIPS) 200 C0105

What is Citizen Corps?

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Operation TIPS

Operation TIPS, administered by the U.S. Department of Justice and developed in partnership with several other federal agencies, is one of the five component programs of the Citizen Corps.

PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM

Operation TIPS will be a national system for reporting suspicious, and potentially terrorist-related activity. The program will involve the American workers who, in the daily course of their work, are in a unique position to see unusual or suspicious activity in public places.

The Department of Justice is discussing participation with members of the trucking, shipping, maritime, railway, and port industries whose workers are ideally suited to help in the anti-terrorism effort because their routines allow them to recognize unusual events.

This program offers a way for these workers to report what they see in public areas and along transportation routes. Information can be reported on the toll-free hotline or online. Information received will be referred electronically to points of contact in each state as appropriate. This is not a national 911 center, and callers are expected to dial 911 for emergency local response.

HOW IT WILL WORK

Industries that are interested in participating in this program will be given printed guidance material (e.g., flyers and brochures) about the program and how to contact the Operation TIPS reporting center. Industries will determine how this information will be disseminated to workers.

The information provided to the volunteers will include: how to access the hotline; warnings that the hotline is intended only for reporting suspicious activities, not individuals whose appearance or dress is of concern to the caller; a reminder that, in case of a true emergency, the caller should use the 911 system; and prohibitions against invasion of privacy, conducting investigations, or performing any law enforcement function.

Operation TIPS will be phased in across the country to allow each state to determine which law enforcement agencies should receive the information that the call center disseminates. As states identify their point(s) of contact, which can be a single point or multiple points of contact, they will be added to the system and start receiving referrals.

Medical Reserve Corps CITIZEN COMPS

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Medical Reserve Corps

The Medical Reserve Corps will provide local communities with volunteer health professionals who can assist health professionals during a large-scale local emergency (e.g., pandemic influenza or a hazardous materials spill). Practicing and retired health care professionals will be on a medical reserve list, ready to be called up to duty in the event of an emergency. In addition to playing an important role during a large-scale local emergency, Medical Reserve Corps volunteers would also be active in promoting public health in their communities throughout the year.

PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM

Medical Reserve Corps will usually be affiliated with a local Citizen Corps Council. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) will support coordination and training for volunteer health professionals so that they are ready to assist their community in the event of a local emergency. Medical Reserve Corps volunteers can assist with emergency response teams, provide care to victims with non-serious injuries, and provide additional manpower/staffing to increase the effectiveness of physicians, nurses and other health professionals in a major crisis.

Medical Reserve Corps seeks to:

- Draw Americans into volunteer service;
- Create a framework to match volunteers' skills with their communities' needs;
- ◆ Train a cadre of health professionals to respond better to the needs of their communities; enhancing their skills and teaching them their roles in support of local emergency response efforts; and
- Provide reserve capacity at the community level to respond to health needs for emergencies and/or for locally identified public health needs and priorities.

HOW IT WILL WORK

Local leaders will develop their own reserve of medical professionals based on their community's needs. Once established, local leaders will decide if and when to activate their Medical Reserve Corps during an emergency.

Medical reserve volunteers will receive assignments based on their skills and qualifications. After each local community develops its own Medical Reserve Corps unit, these volunteers will be able to respond to local emergencies within a few hours of being called into action.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services is the lead federal agency for the Medical Reserve Corps. HHS has worked with health professions' organizations, non-professional organizations, and local and state agencies to develop the program guidelines and a resource manual, and to provide technical assistance to local communities who choose to develop their own Medical Reserve Corps.

Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) CITIZEN COMPS

What is Citizen Corps?

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Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS)

The Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) program is being developed by the U.S. Department of Justice in partnership with the International Association of Chiefs of Police. VIPS is one of three Citizen Corps programs administered by the Department of Justice.

OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAM

The VIPS program is designed to address the increasing demands on state and local law enforcement agencies. In the aftermath of the terrorist attacks of September 11, already limited law enforcement resources are being stretched further at a time when this country needs every available officer out on the beat. Some police departments are turning to civilian volunteers to enable police officers to be on the front lines, working to make communities safer. These volunteer outreach efforts will receive new support through VIPS.

Examples of volunteer support activities include:

- Assisting with traffic control;
- Impounding and storing marked abandoned vehicles;
- Searching for missing persons;
- Booking property;
- Transporting department vehicles;
- Enforcing handicapped parking; and
- Processing paperwork.

RESOURCES & CURRENT PRACTICES

The VIPS program was launched in May 2002. The program will provide resources to assist local law enforcement in incorporating community volunteers into the activities of law enforcement agencies.

A tool kit for state and local law enforcement agencies will outline a series of promising practices to help them design strategies to recruit, train, and deploy citizen volunteers in their departments.

There are already many police departments across the country utilizing the talents and commitment of volunteers in their communities to support the work of their officers. Examples of some of these programs are available on the Citizens Corps website.

Attached are articles regarding Fidel Castro's most recent threat to shut the U.S. Interests Section in Havana, and the Congressional delegation that arrived in Cuba the same day the State Department protested Castro's remarks.

Members of the delegation have publicly criticized the United States' Cuba policy, and are expected to submit legislation to ease restrictions on travel and trade with Cuba. While in Cuba, the group met with Cuban government officials and sought permission from Castro for a 25-member Congressional delegation to conduct a live town hall meeting with the Cuban people later this year. The delegation of eight included four Republicans – Jo Ann Emerson (MO-08), Jeff Flake (AZ-06), Butch Otter (ID-01), and Dennis Rehberg (MT-AL). The Congressional delegation was the largest to ever visit Cuba.

A brief timeline follows:

- March 6, 2003: Fidel Castro personally insulted James Cason, America's top diplomat in Havana, for meeting with Cuban dissidents. Castro also threatened to shut down the U.S. Interests Section in Cuba.
- March 7, 2003: The State Department protested Castro's remarks.
- March 7, 2003: Congressional delegation arrived in Havana for five-day trip.

Castro threatens to shut U.S. interests office; Assembly picks Cuban President for another term

President Fidel **Castro** threatened Thursday to close the U.S. diplomatic mission in Havana, saying it was a breeding ground for his opponents.

The U.S. government said it considered Castro's remarks to be "very unfortunate."

Castro attacked U.S. **diplomats** for actively backing Cuba's small but growing dissident movement in a speech to the National Assembly after the rubber-stamp parliament re-elected him for another five years as head of state.

The renewal of the ruling Council of State left the one-party communist state's hierarchy intact, though Economy Minister Jose Luis Rodriguez was dropped from the 31-member council, pointing to his possible replacement.

"In the face of political **threats** and aggression from abroad, our determination to defend our homeland and socialism will never be weakened in the slightest," said **Castro**, 76.

His brother and designated successor, Defense Minister Raul Castro, 71, was also re-elected as first vice president.

Castro, the world's longest-serving leader with 44 years in power, accused the Bush administration of trying to undermine his one-party communist state with stepped-up support for the dissidents.

Cuba and the United States have not had normal diplomatic relations for four decades and the mission operates as the U.S. Interests Section of the Swiss Embassy in Havana.

"Cuba can easily do without this office, an incubator for counterrevolutionaries and a command post for the most offensive subversive actions against our country," he said.

Castro's threat to close the mission was prompted by a visit the top U.S. **diplomat** in Havana, James Cason, made on Feb. 24 to the home of a leading dissident, Martha Beatriz Roque. Cason accused Cuba of suppressing human rights and freedom of expression.

U.S. sources said that **Castro's** remarks did not constitute a serious **threat** to close the Havana office, but rather were part of the Cuban leader's habitual rhetoric.

U.S. Protests Castro's Criticism of Diplomat

The United States on Friday protested derogatory remarks by Cuban President Fidel **Castro** about the presence of a U.S. **diplomat** at a recent meeting of dissidents in Havana.

"Anyone can see that this is a shameless and defiant provocation," **Castro** said Thursday during a speech following his election by Cuba's parliament to a sixth term as head of state.

On Feb. 24, James Cason, who heads the U.S. diplomatic mission in Cuba, showed up at the meeting of dissidents and spoke to a group of international reporters.

Castro seemed to take special exception to Cason's declaration that "the Cuban government is afraid, afraid of freedom of conscience, afraid of freedom of expression, afraid of human rights."

In rebuttal, **Castro** said Thursday, "Actually, Cuba is so afraid that it will calmly take all the time needed to decide on its course of action regarding this bizarre official."

State Department spokesman Philip Reeker replied that **Castro's** "defamatory language and criticism of Mr. Cason's comments in support of democracy and freedom underscore yet again that **Castro** abhors freedom of expression and fears any measure of support for human rights in Cuba."

Reeker said the United States supports Cason's work in Havana and reaffirmed U.S. support for a peaceful transition to democracy in Cuba.

The word "protest" appears in Reeker's statement, but a U.S. official said it was not clear whether a protest note will be delivered to Cuban authorities.

In his remarks Thursday, **Castro** hinted - as he has several times before - that he may shut down the U.S. office in Cuba, formally known as the U.S. Interests Section.

"Perhaps the numerous U.S. intelligence agents working at the Interests Section could explain to him (Cason) that Cuba can easily do without this office - a breeding ground for counterrevolutionaries and a command post for the most offensive subversive actions against our country," **Castro** said.

The comments recalled the circumstances 42 years ago when **Castro** said the U.S. Embassy in Havana was filled with spies and demanded that the embassy staff be reduced from 87 to 11. President Dwight Eisenhower broke diplomatic relations the next day.

Diplomatic relations have never been restored, but each country opened an interests section in each other's capital in 1977. These offices have a lower diplomatic standing than embassies.

On Wednesday, the United States protested a Cuban decision not to allow the Interests Section to import literature and text books from the United States for distribution to Cuban citizens.

The State Department had tried to ship 5,101 books late last month, but they were confiscated on arrival by the Cuban government. The shipment included works by Martin Luther King Jr., John Steinbeck and Groucho Marx.

State Department spokesman Richard Boucher called the decision unfortunate and noted that Cuban representatives in the United States distribute books and other published materials regularly to U.S. citizens.

The United States had hoped to distribute 25,000 books this year in Cuba, mostly for use by children. One goal was to encourage respect for the opinions of others.

HAVANA - U.S.-Cuba relations, mostly bad over the last 44 years, have hit a nasty low.

Cuban President Fidel Castro says America's top diplomat in Havana is a bully and provocateur who must be swilling alcohol at meetings with dissidents, because otherwise his behavior wouldn't be so strange.

The United States, for its part, says Cuban agents harass its officials based in Havana, leaving urine and feces in their homes, slashing their tires and trying to lure married officials into affairs.

It's not a battle fought with soldiers, tanks and laser-guided missiles but an old-fashioned Cold War struggle that some say is replete with covert action, dirty tricks, psychological warfare and melodramatic speeches.

In his latest such speech, Mr. Castro, following his pro-forma election Thursday to a sixth presidential term, immediately blasted James Cason, chief of the U.S. mission in Havana, for meeting with dissidents Feb. 24 - a day marking the beginning of Cuba's last war of independence in 1895.

It was "a shameless and defiant provocation by this bully with diplomatic immunity this bizarre official," Mr. Castro said. "His behavior was so odd that anyone could rightly be wondering how much alcohol was served at that patriotic event."

Mr. Cason had no immediate comment, but State Department spokesman Philip Reeker said in a statement that "Castro's defamatory language and his criticism of Mr. Cason's comments in support of democracy and freedom underscore yet again that Castro abhors freedom of expression and fears any measure of support for human rights in Cuba."

Helping dissidents

Mr. Cason, a career diplomat, began as mission chief about six months ago and has since traveled more than 6,200 miles all over Cuba, getting to know the island and visiting the homes of 40 to 50 members of the political opposition. At the February meeting with dissidents, Mr. Cason told reporters he was there as a guest.

"We as a country always support democracy and people who fight for a better life," he said in English. Then he added in fluent Spanish, "Sadly, the Cuban government is afraid - afraid of freedom of expression."

Mr. Castro scoffed at that Thursday, but issued a veiled threat to close the American mission, known as the U.S. Interests Section. The Cuban president said American "spies" working at the

Interests Section ought to explain to Mr. Cason "that Cuba can easily do without this office - a breeding ground for counterrevolutionaries and a command post for the most offensive subversive actions."

Mr. Reeker responded that, despite Mr. Castro's threats to close the Interests Section, the United States would "continue to reach out to Cubans to assure them that they are not alone as they work toward a free, democratic and prosperous future."

Castro loyalists contend that dissidents have no support in Cuba and are financed by the U.S. government. Mr. Cason denies giving any cash to the opposition. But U.S. and Cuban officials agree that the Interests Section has expanded its programs to help the political opposition over the past year. And some American officials say that has prompted Cuban agents to become more aggressive.

Alleged actions taken against U.S. officials in Havana are detailed in a three-page declassified cable that was leaked to The Miami Herald and The Washington Times. The document said that Cuban agents harass American officials, sneaking into their homes and "leaving not-so-subtle messages including unwelcome calling cards like urine and feces."

Diplomats "are denied rest or relaxation by house alarms triggered in the middle of the night phones that ring at all hours, and by cellphones that ring every half hour for no apparent reason," the document said. Cuban agents also allegedly plant bugs, tap into diplomats' home computers and break into their cars, leaving the radios tuned to pro-Castro stations, the cable said.

A high-level Cuban official called the report a pack of lies.

What's clear is that the U.S.-Cuba grudge match that began after Mr. Castro took power in 1959 is still in full swing.

Both claiming the lead

American hard-line policies are starting to pay off, one senior U.S. official said. The island's socialist government is "sinking," he said on condition of anonymity. "We're certainly not going to throw them a lifeline."

Cuban officials deny that and say their American foes are showing signs of desperation.

"They feel cornered, defeated," said Ricardo Alarcn, president of Cuba's National Assembly.

The Cold War battle over Cuba has been overshadowed by the prospect of war in Iraq. But for Mr. Castro's enemies and supporters, it remains at the forefront.

President Bush "has set the course on Cuba and is not likely to change it without good reason," said Steve Johnson, a Latin American analyst at the Heritage Foundation, a conservative research organization in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Bush recognizes that "an overnight remake of the Cuban state is not very likely," Mr. Johnson said. So his strategy, outlined in May, gives Cuba incentives in exchange for modest democratic reforms.

Cubans say the American approach is not quite so forgiving.

That was underscored recently, they say, when U.S. officials expelled four Cuban diplomats from New York and Washington, D.C., and again accused the island nation of developing biological weapons.

"They're trying to fabricate an incident to counter the growing opposition to the U.S. embargo," said Mr. Alaren, one of Cuba's highest-ranking officials.

Mr. Castro vowed not to give up the fight, telling supporters: "I promise that I will be with you, if you so wish, for as long as I can be useful. Now I understand that it was not my destiny to rest at the end of my life."

American lawmakers propose a town hall meeting with U.S. Congress members in Cuba

Eight American lawmakers working to change U.S. policies toward Cuba said Monday they will ask the communist government to let as many as 25 U.S. Congress members hold a town hall meeting with the Cuban people later this year.

"It would be a demonstration of American democracy," said U.S. Rep. William Delahunt, a Democrat from Massachusetts.

Ideally, Delahunt said, the town hall meeting would be broadcast live on Cuban television and radio across the island - just as former U.S. President Jimmy Carter's speech to the Cuban people was aired live last year.

"It is time to forget the rancor, the bitterness of the past," Delahunt told a news conference. He said it was time to "have a civil and respectful discourse" between the two nations.

There was no immediate indication from Cuban authorities whether they would support the proposal.

During his visit to Cuba last May, Carter spoke to the Cuban people in a live, uncensored broadcast, revealing to them the existence of a grass roots campaign to guarantees civil liberties on the Caribbean island.

While calling on America to drop its embargo, Carter also called on Cuba to join the democracies of the Western Hemisphere.

Members of the congressional delegation said they would formally submit their proposal to Fidel Castro's government before returning to the United States on Tuesday.

U.S. Rep. Jeff Flake, a Republican from Arizona, said the delegation next week would submit new legislation calling for an end to restrictions that effectively bar most Americans from visiting Cuba. The bill is co-sponsored by 50 lawmakers, half of them Democrats and half of them Republics, he said.

"We believe that the embargo, and the travel ban in particular, is a sanction not on Cuba, but on Americans," said Flake.

The group arrived here Friday for a five-day trip aimed at better understanding the island's politics and economy.

All eight lawmakers belong to the Cuba Working Group, which is pushing for an end to travel

restrictions for U.S. citizens and an easing of four decades of trade sanctions.

Both organizers and Cuban officials described the group as the largest single delegation of American lawmakers to ever visit communist Cuba.

In addition to Delahunt and Flake, the lawmakers include Democratic U.S. Reps. John Tanner, of Tennessee; Nita Lowey, of New York; and Dennis Moore, of Kansas; Also in the delegation are Republican U.S. Reps. Jo Ann Emerson, of Missouri; Dennis Rehberg, of Montana; and C.L. "Butch" Otter, of Idaho.

The group was organized by the Lexington Institute, an Arlington, Virginia, policy group.

During their time here, the lawmakers have met with numerous Cuban officials, including the foreign minister, the trade minister, the head of the government's food-import company and the speaker of the parliament.

They also have met with a number of dissidents, talked with people in the street, toured a farmer's market and visited a primary school.

Town Hall Meeting Sought in Havana

Dear Speaker Hastert and Democratic Leader Pelosi:

The undersigned organizations write to express our concern and strong opposition to the fiscal year 2004 budget resolution adopted by the House Budget Committee.

As you are aware, farmers and ranchers did not participate in the economic growth and prosperity that characterized much of the last decade for many Americans. In addition, as a result of poor commodity prices, reduced market competition and opportunity, and natural disasters, agricultural producers continue to be caught in an economic crisis. In response, Congress committed to address the long and continued economic hardship in rural America through the 2001 budget act and the farm bill enacted less than one year ago.

We believe the severe reductions in agricultural spending required by the House Budget Committee's proposal clearly suggest that some in Congress are willing to renege on that long-term commitment to agriculture.

In an attempt to achieve a balanced budget in the future while accommodating the majority of the President's new tax cut and economic growth initiative, the Committee resolution requires substantial reductions in both mandatory and discretionary spending that supports a wide range of federal agriculture programs.

The Budget Committee approach would require \$19.17 billion in mandatory and discretionary program cuts. This represents in excess of a 25 percent reduction in the additional resources Congress provided to enhance the economic safety net, nutrition programs, resource conservation and rural development. Compliance with the reconciliation instructions would require the House Agriculture Committee to reduce authorized farm bill spending by approximately 10 percent over the next ten years.

We believe it is disingenuous to suggest that a balanced budget coupled with substantial tax reductions achieved at the expense of farmers, ranchers, and their communities represent our national priorities for economic growth.

We urge you to reject the Committee's fiscal year 2004 federal budget proposal and support fulfilling the commitments made by Congress to our nation's farmers and ranchers. Thank for your consideration of these issues.

NATIONAL FRAMEWORK FOR DETERMINING IMPAIRMENT FOR SWITCHING

- The FCC must perform the granular, market-by-market analysis required by the D.C. Circuit.
- The FCC may not delegate its authority to perform this analysis to state public utility commissions.
- The impairment analysis would evaluate:
 - Have competitive local exchange carriers deployed fewer than three circuit switches in a serving wire center?
 - Can an incumbent local exchange carrier perform "hot cuts" on a scalable basis in a reasonable amount of time?
 - Has an incumbent local exchange carrier modified its operator support system (OSS) in a manner that permits a competitive local exchange carrier to serve customers using its own switch and an incumbent local exchange carrier's loop?

Financial Times White House rebuked over aid delivery

WASHINGTON - Senior members of Congress attacked the Bush administration yesterday for excessive bureaucracy and insufficient follow-through in its proposals for spending billions of dollars to fight Aids and poverty in developing countries.

The criticism came as Colin Powell, U\$ secretary of state, testified before the powerful foreign appropriations subcommittee of the House of Representatives, which authorises spending for foreign aid.

Jim Kolbe, the Arizona Republican who chairs the subcommittee, told Mr Powell the White House had failed to pursue its year-old plans for a Millennium Challenge Account (MCA), which would deliver an extra Dollars 5bn in aid to poor countries.

"Let me be clear: I support this initiative," Mr Kolbe said. "Unfortunately, the president's enthusiasm was not followed up with an implementation and marketing strategy by his administration."

Mr Kolbe said he was worried that the White House, together with domestic agencies such as the US Department of Health and Human Services, was usurping the role of the US Agency for International Development and the State Department in running foreign aid.

Nita Lowey, the subcommittee's senior Democrat, echoed Mr Kolbe's criticisms, saying the plans revealed "a high degree of dysfunction and dislocation within the administration's overall foreign aid strategy".

Mr Powell rejected the criticisms, insisting the administration was "trying to... find new and innovative ways to deliver services" and pledging that he, as secretary of state, would be answerable to Congress for the administration's foreign aid programmes.

Congressional critics and some development experts fear that the White House, which has increasingly taken command of the US's growing development aid programme, lacks the knowledge and organisation to deliver it effectively. Congressional officials have complained that the plans for the MCA were repeatedly delayed because of inertia and bureaucratic clashes within the administration.

Even the March 2002 announcement of the programme was mishandled when the White House confused a one-off Dollars 5bn package with a permanent Dollars 5bn-a- year increase.





Byron Johnson at the University of Pennsylvania met with our Board on Friday. The Texas report is finished. I told you that the recidivism rate would be under 15%; it is actually 8% (which compares to 20% in a control group of similar inmates not part of our prison, a two-thirds reduction in recidivism - and it compares amazingly with the national statistic of 67% recidivism).

The University of Pennsylvania report will be published in an academic journal (necessary for validation and peer review) and ready for release April 1. We are presently shooting for a

This is a tremendous trophy for the President. Bill Ratliff was elected the 41st Lieutenant Governor of Texas by his colleagues in the Texas Senate on December 28, 2000 when Rick Perry became governor after the election of President George W. Bush.

Governor Ratliff's election marked the first time in Texas history that state lawmakers exercised their constitutional duty to choose a fellow senator to serve as the next Lieutenant Governor and President of the Senate.

In addition to assuming the duties of Lieutenant Governor, Governor Ratliff continued to represent Senate District 1 in northeast Texas where he was first elected in 1988.

Texas Monthly magazine has named Governor Ratliff one of the state's ten best legislators many times. At the close of the 77th Regular Session he presided over last year, it praised him again-calling him "an unwavering North Star in a political universe in serious need of guidance."

Throughout his career, Governor Ratliff has built a solid reputation of tackling the toughest issues facing Texas, from public education to the state budget.

In his first year as a senator, he passed a bill to allow local communities in Texas to use part of their sales tax revenue to encourage economic development. Governor Ratliff also focused on highly-controversial workers' compensation reform in his first session and attended negotiations between the Senate and the House.

He designed new higher education funding formulas, met the growing need for state services and kept the budget balanced for four years-all without the need for a tax increase.

Governor Ratliff often credits the analytical skills he perfected in a 35-year career as a consulting engineer for his success in guiding public policy. He has served as president of the American Consulting Engineers Council and testified before Congress on the nation's infrastructure. He has won state and national professional awards and served as an adjunct engineering professor.

SUGGESTED REMARKS TO THE BIENNIAL NATIONAL CONVETION of the UNION OF ORTHODOX JEWISH CONGREGATIONS OF AMERICA December 26-29 - Rye, New York

Thank you Harvey Blitz for the kind introduction. I am honored to join, even by video, in the Biennial National Convention of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America. I want to thank you, Rabbi Weinreb and Nathan Diament for your visits to the White House since the earliest days of my administration. I appreciate you friendship and support.

As you gather this week in New York, one hundred and four years after the Orthodox Union was founded by a group of visionary community leaders, you will rededicate yourselves ancient principles that are relevant to the most modern of times. And I am grateful for the opportunity to address you tonight.

Judaism has had an extraordinary influence on the history and institutions of the United States. At the dawn of this nation's life, John Adams wrote

"that the Hebrews have done more to civilize men than any other nation. If I were an atheist" Adams wrote, "I should still believe that fate had ordained the Jews to be the most essential instrument for civilizing the nations....I should believe that chance had ordained the Jews to preserve and propagate to all mankind the doctrine of a supreme, intelligent, wise, almighty sovereign of the universe, which I believe to be the great essential principle of all morality."

John Adams, George Washington and many other founders of our nation recognized that Americans owed their liberty to the Divine Creator, and that this nation's society and institutions would be strongest when they rested upon this foundation. They also recognized that the United States must be a place where people of all faiths are not only tolerated, but welcomed and allowed to flourish.

I am proud of the fact that over the course of world history, Jews and their institutions have flourished in the United States to an extent unrivaled anywhere else, except perhaps the modern State of Israel. Today, in this country, there are more day schools in session, Jewish books in publication, and synagogues at prayer than at any time in any one country since the days of the Second Temple. And I am certain that this is in large measure due to the fact that your faith and its values were part of the foundation upon which this nation was built.

The Orthodox Jewish community continues to play this role in American society today. You are committed to applying ancient truths to modern society. While you believe in a basic separation of religion and state, you do not believe in banishing faith's teachings from our public discourse.

True faith is never isolated from the rest of life. The Talmud teaches that "the learning is not the main goal, rather the deeds." Our nation's government is one means by which we can do good deeds and why the Orthodox Union has been a powerful voice for some of the great issues of our time.

You and I share common commitments.

We believe in protecting and promoting democracy and her allies throughout the world – including the Middle East, and, therefore, guaranteeing a strong and secure State of Israel. Since her rebirth in 1948, modern Israel has known no greater friend than the United States and I intend to make sure that remains the case.

We believe that there is no rationale-that can justify resorting to the tactics of terrorism and that we must battle the scourge of global terrorism around the world and here at home.

We believe that people of faith should be guaranteed the ability to earn a livelihood without being pressured in the workplace to compromise their religious observance.

We believe that marriage and family are sacred institutions that must not only be preserved, but promoted and strengthened by our government and our culture.

We believe that all children deserve an excellent education and that parents should decide how and where their children should be educated – whether in a public or parochial school – and that the government should support that decision with appropriate resources.

We believe that our government should view the good people who work at faith-based charities as partners, not rivals, and that the days of discriminating against religious charities in government grant-making must end.

These beliefs, and many others, bind together millions of individual Americans of different faiths, different ethnicities and different abilities into a society of great common purpose. And although, as your convention program recognizes, we stand at the threshold of an "uncertain century," I am certain that our common beliefs and our common purpose will find favor in the eyes of the Creator and ensure that the cause of justice and goodness is triumphant in the century ahead.

I know that each Sabbath in your synagogues you recite a prayer for the welfare of this government and that you ask God to bless its officials. We have felt sustained by your prayers and we are grateful to you for those prayers; they are a precious gift.

I want to thank each of you for your good works and the good works of the Orthodox Union. The United States is a better place because of everything you do.

May God bless you all, and may God continue to bless the United States of America.

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
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
Swim Lessons—Right This Way!

1,230 summer campers enjoyed an improved pool at Camp John Marc because of the kindness and generosity of the donors listed below. The improvements turned out so well, the campers nicknamed the Swimming Center "The Resort."

Swimming activities are valuable for any child who lives in Texas. However, for our campers this age-old activity takes on a whole new mean-



ing. For some, it means having the confidence to take off their shirts without worrying about the large scars that cover their bodies.




them. Specially trained camp instructors devote an hour each day to helping campers learn the basics of swimming by following a program created by the Camp John Marc staff.

During "project time" (a daily

skilled-based activity period), we had an average of 15 campers learning to swim each week. The program is fairly intense and

each camper has his or her own instructor. It is awesome to see these non-swimmers become comfortable with the water, then each day add to their skill bank, until on the last day of the week the vast majority have mastered learning an independent stroke. It is a powerful moment to see children who were resistant to enter-





Others who must use wheelchairs due to their diagnosis, find our "zero entry" beach accessible and

user friendly. For others, cancer may have taken an arm or a leg, but they can swim at Camp with confidence and safety. And those with sickle cell anemia may swim for the first time because their parents were reluctant to let them swim previously for fear

they may have a pain crisis. In these cases and more, children

at Camp have the opportunity to experience what many of us take for granted: the therapeutic benefit and wonderful buoyancy that aquatic activity provides.

However, at Camp John Marc we offer much more than just recreational swimming. We also offer lessons for our campers who may be entering the water for the first time or who need specialized instruction to make a particular swim stroke work specifically for



ing the water at the first of the week, take off and swim the




length of the pool by the end of the week. Many swim using modified strokes due to their diagnosis, but all glide through the water independently.

Children spend a special week with us who have been discouraged from swimming in other situa-

tions because of a fear for their safety or the desire to not be compared to able-bodied children. At Camp they enjoy what other kids have enjoyed for many years: floating on their backs,



This past year, we were able to locate a wheelchair accessible horse buggy. The buggy is the brainchild of Jerry Grander from Indiana. The campers stay in their wheelchairs and ride up on a lift on the back of the buggy and then roll into the driver's spot to "take the reins." Through the generosity of the Morning Star Family Foundation, Camp John Marc was able to purchase one of these buggies. With great confidence, we knew we would find the right horse to pull the buggy.

Camp John Marc Board Member David Bell took on the task of finding the right animal to do the job of pulling the buggy. After being assured by a horse trader that he had the perfect horse for the job, David anticipated smooth sailing. However, David soon learned this horse would not even tolerate being hooked onto the buggy.

appreciated donors, 1,230 children experienced the "time of their lives" this summer.

About an equal number will enjoy Camp John Marc in the "off-season" through family camps, young adult/teen programs and getaway weekends. The programs deal with a wide range of challenges, including sensory issues, bereavement, transplants, upper limb differences, PKU, and cancers. An innovative family camp was started a couple of years ago by Tom and Joanne Hurtekant to help Hispanic families with the diagnosis of Spina Bifida. The education and communication of the families with their medical teams has been significantly enhanced by their efforts. A new family program for this year is a Texas Scottish Rite program for families with a child with Tuberous Sclerosis.

In total there are 24 weekend camps, 14 of which are family camps. There will be over 350 volunteers involved in our mission—Wow! It renews your faith in humanity to witness all of these special people who are our "ambassadors" to the kids. So, once again, thanks to our summer and off-season staff, counselors, volunteers, donors and the kids for being who you are! The reality of Camp John Marc depends on you.

Next, came a pair of mules that David was told could pull anything. Though they could tolerate being hooked up to the buggy, both animals quickly proved why mules have a reputation for being stubborn. Neither mule would pull the buggy.

Time was running out before the buggy would desperately be needed for some of our muscular dystrophy campers. On a whim, David decided to try one of his daughter Jordan's ponies to pull the buggy.

Thus PatchE the pony became our unusual summer hero. PatchE pulled the buggy with ease and gave several campers the joy of "riding" that they would not have had otherwise.

We also learned the value of an old saying!

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

Each summer Camp John Marc hires 24 college-age students to be our core staff. This group organizes all daily activities and evening programs, and various they times serve as cabin counselors. They always strive to put the camper

first, helping insure that the camper's experience is a meaningful and positive one.

Katie Nelson came to Camp John Marc after her sophomore year at the University of Missouri where she was pursuing a degree in English and Chemistry. The idea of attending medical school in her future was a possibility, but not necessarily a strong one.

That first summer Katie worked at Camp,

she brought to us a positive energy and tremendous skills in working with children. Katie came back to Camp after her junior year and again spent three months reaching out to our campers in a positive and caring way. She again interacted with many fine doctors, nurses, and therapists. We noticed she seemed to be watching these folks a little more closely than the summer before. By the end of the summer she decided to take the Medical College Admission Test exam the following spring.

Katie was back with us for her third summer this year. We all rejoiced with her as she received word that she scored extremely well on the Medical College Admission Test. Katie is now busy visiting medical schools across the country, preparing to make her selection. At the same time she is completing her undergraduate degree at the University of Missouri.

Katie has not only achieved strong academic performance (Phi Beta Kappa, Theodore Hesburg Senior Award), she has established a pattern of living her life in a manner that serves others. Katie's stated the following on her medical school application: "The air

was unusually cool for July in Texas, as I grabbed my journal and hiked into the woods to spend my half-hour break. I was working at a camp for children with chronic illnesses, and we had just finished a difficult staff meeting. The camp director had told us that one of our campers, a lanky 14year-old named Lisa, had died the night before. Picturing her cropped, curly hair and blue nail polish, I recalled how she shrieked in pain when I touched her back to help her climb off the bus. I pushed my way through the scrub trees, found a stump to sit on, and tried to process the news. After crying briefly, I wrote, 'What kind of a place is this that means so much to kids that they hold on to life until they can come back?' Although I did not realize it then, this brief respite in the woods was critical in my decision to become a physician."

Camp John Marc is so pleased to have been a part of Katie Nelson's life journey and to have helped her recognize that medicine will provide her the synthesis of service, creativity and personal interaction she is seeking.



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
