This morning, the United States of America carried out the severest sentence for the gravest of crimes. The victims of the Oklahoma City bombing have been given, not vengeance, but justice. And one young man met the fate he chose for himself six years ago.

For the survivors of the crime, and for the families of the dead, the pain goes on. Final punishment of the guilty cannot alone bring peace to the innocent. It cannot recover the loss, or balance the scales. And it is not meant to do so. But tonight, every living person who was hurt by the evil done in Oklahoma City can rest in the knowledge that there has been a reckoning.

At every point – from the morning of April 19, 1995 to this very hour – we have seen the good that overcomes evil. We saw it in the rescuers, who saved and suffered with the victims. We have seen it in a community that has grieved, and held close the memory of the lost. We have seen it in the work of detectives, marshals, and police. And we have seen it in the courts. Due process ruled. The case was proved. The verdict was calmly reached. And the rights of the accused were protected and observed – to the full, and to the end.

Under the laws of our country, the matter is concluded. There are some things about it that we will never understand. Life and history bring tragedies, and often they cannot be explained. But they can be redeemed. They are redeemed by dispensing justice, though eternal justice is not ours to deliver ... by remembering those who grieve, including now the young man's mother, father, and sisters ... and by trusting in purposes greater than our own. May God in His mercy grant peace to all – to the lives that were taken six years ago, to the lives that go on, and to the life that ended today.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FOR EUROPEAN ROUNDTABLE INTERVIEW

OVERALL What are your goals from this trip?

- Reaffirmation of partnership with Europe with common goal: spreading security, democracy, and prosperity to the entire continent and reaching beyond to address serious global concerns, such as the Middle East and Africa.
- At NATO, will address key issues: NATO enlargement, European Security and Defense Policy (the relationship between NATO and Europe's planned rapid reaction force), the new strategic framework/missile defense, and the Balkans/Southeast Europe.
- At EU Summit: Hope to reaffirm our Transatlantic partnership; point towards a less contentious manner to resolve issues on which we disagree; and look outward to common global agenda, including expanded trade, struggle against infectious diseases, and cooperation to resolve or ease regional conflicts.
- With Spain, Poland: Want to affirm strong alliance with two emerging and important European powers and strong American Allies. Spain is a model of democratic, free market transformation; partner in Latin America. Look forward to celebrating Poland's achievements since 1989; talking about cooperation to spread Poland's success; charting course ahead.



• With Putin, will discuss vision of the overall relationship; and look forward to hearing Putin's. Hope Putin will understand that the United States seeks positive, constructive relationship with Russia: one in which we will be clear and forthright about differences. We'll discuss how to make this relationship work -- through contacts on strategic issues, economic and energy issues, and regional issues.

How would you characterize U.S.-European relations on the eve of your trip?

- Ours is a deep, strong relationship based on common values, shared history, and common goals.
- Overall, relations are excellent, but we have to be careful not to take each other for granted.
- Sometimes disputes in certain specific areas, such as trade, divert our focus from broader objectives.
- Want to make sure the United States and Europe keep focused on what's most important, namely working together to continue expanding democracy and prosperity in Europe and throughout the world.



There is a widely reported perception that the United States has become increasingly isolated internationally on a wide range of issues: on climate change, the CTBT, missile defense, and the death penalty. Is the United States deliberately adopting a unilateralist posture toward the international community?

- In globalized world, "unilateralism" makes as little sense as "isolationism." We need our Allies and friends, and to listen closely to what our friends tell us.
- We and Europe have occasional differences. That is only natural given breadth of ties. But that which unites Europe and America far, far outweighs our differences.
- As I made very clear during campaign, I will not hesitate to take positions in support of American principles and American interests.
- Sometimes taking a position that is not yet universally accepted is called leadership.

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

The EU member states have abolished the death penalty, as have many other countries around the world. The United States is one of the last developed countries using it. And you as Governor of Texas ordered the execution of many people. Isn't it time to abandon capital punishment?

• The United States is an open and transparent society functioning under the rule of law. Capital punishment is the freely and democratically arrived at choice of the federal government and a majority of our states. The vigorous public



debate in this country on capital punishment is testament to this fact.

 Some people in U.S. oppose capital punishment and many people in Europe favor capital punishment. You have arrived at your decision regarding capital punishment in a democratic way, and Americans have arrived at theirs, also in a democratic way.

 The United States limits capital punishment to the most serious crimes and we fully respect the requirements of due process.
 With those important safeguards, we fully comply with our obligations under international law.

MIDDLE EAST

Will the U.S. discuss working together in the Middle East?

- We appreciate Europe's efforts in support of Middle East peace. In the last week since the horrible bombing in Tel Aviv, we have been in constant contact with the EU and others to coordinate our efforts to keep the cease-fire going there.
- To name one historical example, Spain hosted the 1991 Madrid Conference that launched the simultaneous bilateral and multilateral tracks of the Middle East peace process. In 1995, during its EU Presidency, Spain started the "Barcelona Process," which resembles our U.S.-North Africa Economic Partnership.
- So the EU as a whole and individual countries have contributed a great deal to efforts to achieve peace in the Middle East.



NATO ENLARGEMENT

What is your position on NATO enlargement?

 Further steps on enlargement will be reviewed at NATO's Prague Summit in 2002.

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- The United States strongly supports the NATO enlargement process, that includes all European democracies able and willing to meet the obligations of membership.
- No country excluded from consideration because of history or geography. No veto by third country.
- But NATO membership is not an entitlement. Aspiring members must demonstrate they are ready to meet the obligations of membership. Each aspirant will be assessed based on its own performance-based record, including with respect to NATO's Membership Action Plan.

MISSILE DEFENSE

What is the latest development, and how have the consultations around the globe shaped U.S. thinking?

- We are in the middle of a process of consultations. We have discussed our ongoing strategic review and current thinking on a new concept of deterrence and a new framework for strategic security, which includes missile defenses.
- We are pleased with the consultations we have had and regard these consultations as an important part of our commitment to work closely with our allies and friends.



- There is a growing recognition of the threat posed by the spread of the technology for weapons of mass destruction and ballistic missiles, as reflected in language of last NATO communiqué adopted in Budapest.
- NATO Communiqué, which we liked, explicitly recognized the increased threat facing allies from WMD and missiles which it said was "...a matter of serious concern for the Alliance as it poses risks to international and regional security and can pose a direct military threat to Allies..." It also called for NATO to adapt its defense posture to counter this threat, including working jointly on theater missile defense.

TRADE DISPUTES

The United States seems to have an increasing number of trade disputes with the EU. What can be done about preventing such impasses over trade issues?

- The U.S.-EU economic relationship is the largest in the world, with trade and investment flows of \$1.4 trillion a year. This is a period of remarkable economic integration: mega-mergers across the Atlantic are common. Disputes represent a tiny fraction of those flows.
- Our recent agreement on the WTO banana dispute demonstrates our ability to resolve thorny problems and we hope to build on this success to tackle other difficult issues.
- We are also working with the EU directly to improve our ability to identify those issues that have the potential of creating bilateral disputes.



NEW WTO ROUND

Does the United States support a new WTO Round and how will you persuade others to go along?

- The United States supports further multilateral trade liberalization through both regional agreements and the launch of a new WTO Round. A new Round will be an engine for growth and bring benefits to all trading countries on every continent.
- Each of us has a "wish list" for an ideal negotiation, but we need to look for areas of compromise internationally in order to forge a consensus.
- There's no question we have to find ways to increase the poorest countries' stake in, and benefits from, the trading system. Capacity building and programs to ensure effective implementation are reasonable issues.

STEEL

The United States is considering special protections for its steel industry. How can you defend such action in view of the objectives of the WTO, which the United States claims to endorse? Have you consulted with the EU about the effects on EU steel exports?

- U.S. imports of steel products were at near-record levels in 2000, creating hardship for steel producers and workers.
- My Administration is considering a number of options for addressing this issue in accordance with WTO rules.



• We want to work with the EU and other trading partners to address the persistent global overcapacity in this industry and to correct for decades of subsidization.

CUBA/HELMS-BURTON/SOL MELIA

What is the status of the Helms-Burton sanctions against Sol Melia? The European Union has threatened retaliation should the U.S. implement this law against the Spanish hotel chain.

- I can't comment on the specifics of this case because it is under legal review.
- But I can say we have a number of reviews underway under Helms-Burton Title IV and some companies have been notified of these reviews. The notification allows these companies to present any countervailing information they may have in the case. Obviously, we do not release information on companies where we are continuing to review the facts.
- While we may sometimes disagree on tactics, the U.S. and Europe and all democratic governments, I think, share the same goal of promoting a transition to a democratic government in Cuba. We are developing an international consensus on the need to promote democracy and human rights in Cuba and the importance of respecting property rights on a worldwide basis.



CLIMATE CHANGE

What will you say to the European allies about climate change? Will you have something to deliver?

• [Will need up to date answer on June 8.]

EU ENLARGEMENT What concerns do you have about EU enlargement?

- The United States favors European Union membership for the candidate countries. EU enlargement will promote stability, prosperity, and democracy throughout Europe.
- The United States enjoys excellent economic and political ties to both member and non-member European states. A choice for EU accession is not a choice away from the United States. All EU members are friends or allies of the United States.
- As the enlargement process moves forward, it is our expectation that it will be done in an open and transparent manner that benefits our mutual economic relationship.
- As enlargement proceeds, we will continue to work closely with both the EU and the candidates.

ESDP

Are you satisfied with the EU's progress in addressing U.S. concerns regarding the EU's European Security and Defense Policy (ESDP), including the development of NATO-EU links? Are capabilities going to be developed that enhance rather than detract from NATO's abilities?

- United States welcomes a capable European force, properly integrated with NATO, that provides new options for handling crises when NATO chooses not to lead.
- Such a force will require EU members to provide the resources necessary to create real capabilities, without waste or duplication.
- Such a force must be inclusive, so that all allies who wish to contribute are as fully involved as possible.
- Our security is indivisible. So must be our cooperation in this effort. We must work together, and I welcome the prospect of a strong NATO-EU partnership.

LEVEL OF U.S.-EU COOPERATION IN SOUTHEAST EUROPE You mentioned U.S.-EU cooperation in Southeast Europe. Are you really pleased with the level of cooperation to date? What are you actually doing together to support positive change in the region?

- The United States and the EU have coordinated closely and effectively in support of the Macedonian government. We strongly support Mr. Solana's leadership in facilitating a political solution to the volatile situation there.
- Last year U.S.-EU cooperation in the region helped the people of Serbia oust Slobodan Milosevic and begin the democratic transition currently under way in Yugoslavia.



- The Stability Pact is an important component of our cooperation with the European Union to promote peace and stability in Southeast Europe and to further integrate the region into European and trans-Atlantic institutions. It is an important vehicle for fostering regional cooperation and as a mechanism for coordinating assistance. We look forward to working with the EU to make this mechanism more effective and focused.
- Current priorities for the Stability Pact are the promotion of free trade and investment, combating corruption and organized crime, fostering interethnic dialogue and cross-border cooperation, and increased cooperation between countries of the region and NATO.

PUTIN

Will you get President Putin's understanding on Missile Defense?

- First let me say, we will discuss much more than missile defense. Russia is a great nation and we can have a very important relationship. But won't be same Cold War relationship. I want to look Putin in the eye and say you are not my enemy.
- I expect missile defense discussion to be candid and constructive. I want to review the WMD and missile threat, and responses to that threat, including nonproliferation and counterproliferation measures, as well as the need for a new concept of deterrence that includes missile defenses.
- We have been clear with Russia: our interest in cooperation is serious. It is in our mutual interest to counter these new threats. We want to get beyond reliving the past and move

together to a new future, but we are committed to moving forward without Russia if necessary. Given the threats of today, it is imperative that we defend our forces and our territory against missile attacks.

Will you offer Putin economic aid?

- Russia doesn't need aid. Russia needs increased trade and investment. President Putin has indicated this himself on numerous occasions.
- We are prepared to engage actively with the Russians on measures that can be taken to improve the investment climate, that will bring significant economic benefit to the Russian people.

Any reaction to repeated reports of Russian atrocities in Chechnya?

- These reports are disturbing. They underscore the necessity of Russian authorities ensuring that their forces respect human rights and are held accountable for violations.
- The Russian Government cannot separate its actions in Chechnya from its expressed desires for full integration into the community of democratic nations.

Could you give us some examples of where we are cooperating with Russia?

- Russia has been helpful in the Middle East, and in the Balkans.
- We are cooperating quite well in the area of terrorism. U.S. and Russian officials have held several rounds of bilateral consultations regarding Afghanistan.

- The United States and Russia agree that the situation in Afghanistan, especially the Taliban leadership's support for terrorism, continues to threaten the interests of both countries as well as regional and international stability.
- We, and our two co-chairs in the Minsk group, Russia and France, continue to work with the Governments of Armenia and Azerbaijan to advance peace in Nagorno-Karabakh.

What will you say about press freedoms in Russia?

- Independent media are essential to democracy. We will urge the Russian Government to respect the gains which Russian independent media have made over the past decade.
- The Russian Government cannot separate its actions against the independent media from its expressed desires for full integration into the community of democratic nations.

• To complement Plan Colombia there has been growing emphasis on a regional strategy involving all the

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countries in the area. In Quebec City I pledged \$882 million for this effort.

Don't you think that opening the markets and permitting North American tourism would open the mentalities and the end of excuses in Cuba?

- Our Cuba policy, including the embargo, is based on a bipartisan consensus that spans more then four decades.

There is much more that unites us than divides us.

It seems like various parties are calling for a resolute U.S. initiative to ease the crisis in the Middle East. Does the Bush White House keep too low a profile? Does it show a lack of responsibility in these difficult times?



The United States is deeply engaged in efforts to end the violence and help the parties resume a process of negotiations. Working closely with our friends in Europe and elsewhere, we think our profile is just about right at the moment, but we are prepared to engage in any way that will be effective.

Sweden during the 70's and the Vietnam War era was considered very left wing by Washington and relations weren't very good. What do you know about Sweden, how do you view Sweden today, is there room for improvement in U.S.-Swedish relations?

• A lot has changed since the Cold War, and I am glad to say that U.S. relations with Sweden today are excellent. We cooperate closely on important issues in European security from the Balkans to the Baltics, and also on issues such as North Korea, which your Prime Minister just visited.

Sweden's influential international role has been reaffirmed through its very successful Presidency of the European Union. And you'll see plenty of Volvos on our streets. Millions of Americans trace their ancestry to Sweden, and I am proud to be the first American President to visit Sweden while in office.

Annika Ostberg is one unsettled question between our countries: this is the case of a Swedish woman who has served about 20 years in jail in California after being convicted of murder. Swedish authorities have claimed humanitarian grounds for her transfer to Sweden, and have referred to the agreement between Sweden and the United States on transfer of prisoners. When can she be transferred to Sweden so she can serve out the remainder of her terms in the land of her birth?

• Prisoner transfers between Sweden and the United States are governed by the Council of Europe Convention on the Transfer of Sentenced Persons.



The United States has the right to withhold consent pursuant to a formal 1997 Reservation and Declaration submitted by the United States to the Convention.

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• The United States has not consented to her transfer because the State of California has not consented. California will not consent to prisoner transfers unless the receiving country provides assurances that the prisoner would serve the same length of sentence as he or she would in California.

- US committed to NATO operations in Balkans. Not draw down our forces precipitously or unilaterally.
- Ultimate objective to bring whole region into European mainstream; European countries assume increased share of leadership, responsibility

Other issues: Missile Defense; ESDP; US-Russian cooperation.



• QUESTIONS SUBMITTED BY SLOVENIAN TV

What is the message in choosing Slovenia as a site of your first meeting with Russian President Putin?

- I am grateful for Slovenia's willingness to host my first meeting with Russia's President. And I also look forward to meeting Slovenia's leaders.
- My message is that Slovenia should be very proud of its record of political and economic accomplishments over a very short time. Don't stop now; keep reforming!

Slovenia anticipates American support in its efforts to become a member of NATO. When do you think NATO expansion could happen and which countries might be included in this?

- I will be discussing NATO expansion with Allies in Brussels this week. Next steps on enlargement will be reviewed at NATO's Prague Summit in 2002.
- I strongly support the NATO enlargement process. The door must remain open to all European democracies able and willing to meet the obligations of membership. Each aspirant will be assessed based on its own performance in meeting the criteria for membership.

Europe is skeptical about plans to build a missile defense. Russia sees this as a threat. What is your answer to those who are reluctant about this American strategic plan?

- My answer is that responsible leaders have an obligation to deal with threats as they evolve, and we do face new threats from the spread of technology for weapons of mass destruction and ballistic missiles.
- The Cold War, with its threat of mutual assured destruction, is over. I am determined to work with allies and friends to develop a new comprehensive

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strategic framework that includes not just missile defense but also stronger proliferation controls and reductions in offensive weapons.

 Our ongoing consultations on missile defense are an important part of our commitment to work closely with our allies and friends on these matters.

How do you see future cooperation between the U.S. and Russia?

- The Cold War is over and Russia stopped being our enemy years ago. I am glad to have the opportunity to discuss with President Putin my vision for security in the 21st century and to tell him in person of my interest in building a positive, constructive relationship with Russia.
- We know there will be areas of cooperation and also areas where we have serious difference. I hope we can discuss both in an open and frank manner. I look forward to getting this important dialogue underway.

Washington has sent mixed signals about the U.S. military presence in the Balkans. How long and in what size will American troops be willing to stay in the Balkans?

- We remain committed to NATO operations in Bosnia and Kosovo and will not draw down our forces precipitously or unilaterally. As Secretary Powell has said, we and our allies went in together and will come out together.
- My Administration's ultimate objective is to bring the whole region into the European mainstream with European countries and institutions assuming an increasing share of the leadership and responsibility.

Radio Address by the President and the First Lady June 16, 2001 (Father's Day) Draft #6

The First Lady speaks first, followed by the President:

Thank you, Laura. Many Americans believe that their father is the finest man they have ever known. That is certainly true in my case. My dad provided me with life's greatest gift: unconditional love. And he still makes sure all his children know how much he loves us.

Fathers are so important in the lives of children. They provide love and encouragement. They are the object of a young child's admiration. And they provide their sons and daughters with an example of what it means to be a good man.



When fathers are absent, children are often lost to a world of hopelessness and hardship. Our laws should promote responsible fatherhood – and so our Administration strongly supports community-based fatherhood programs. We are taking steps to make adoption more affordable. And for innocent children who are born into fractured families, we provide support for mentoring programs.

Ultimately fatherhood is a deeply personal calling. Our own children are given to our care, and they depend on our love. Every parent knows that raising children is not easy. But it is among the most hopeful and affirming experiences a human being will ever know. So many of my generation had the same experience: When we held our children for the first time, we found ourselves. We found a world of duty and love that changed our lives. And since that day, "Dad" has been the most important title I have ever held, or will ever hold. Laura and I wish all of the fathers listening a happy Father's Day. So many of you provide to your children daily care and guidance, nurture and protection, discipline and love – and it is making a world of difference.
