## SIGNING OF H.R. 1088, THE INVESTOR AND CAPITAL MARKETS FEE RELIEF ACT

#### I. PURPOSE

You will sign H.R. 1088, the "Investor and Capital Markets Fee Relief Act."

#### II. BACKGROUND

H.R. 1088 amends the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 to reduce the rates of tax-like fees required by Federal law to be collected by the Securities and Exchange Commission on certain securities transactions.

The bill passed the House on June 14, 2001, by a vote of 404 - 22 and passed the Senate on December 20, 2001, by Unanimous Consent. It was presented to you on January 4, 2002; your last day for action is January 16, 2002.

Congressman Vito Fossella (R-NY) sponsored the bill and requested that you do a small bill signing ceremony, as did House Financial Services Chairman Mike Oxley (R-OH). Enactment of this legislation is consistent with your efforts to invigorate free markets and reduce costs imposed on those markets by the Government, while not impairing enforcement standards or provisions.



### SIGNING OF H.R. 1088, THE INVESTOR AND CAPITAL MARKETS FEE RELIEF ACT

#### TALKING POINTS

- Today I will sign into law H.R. 1088, the Investor and Capital Markets Fee Relief Act. This legislation reduces the fees which Federal law requires the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) to collect from investors.
- I would like to thank House Financial Services Committee Chairman Mike Oxley (R,OH) and the sponsor of the bill, Representative Vito Fossella (R-NY), for all their hard work, I would also like to thank the other Members of Congress and distinguished guests here who have worked so hard to make today's bill signing a reality.
- I am particularly pleased that this Act will provide fee relief to the growing number of Americans who have turned to our capital markets to save and invest for their retirements, their children's education, and other needs.
- Enactment of this legislation is also consistent with my Administration's efforts to invigorate free markets and reduce costs imposed on those markets by the Government.
- The original purpose of the fees was to provide the SEC with sufficient funding to carry out its regulatory mission to protect investors and promote capital formation. The fees were not intended to fund other Federal agencies and programs.
- Beginning in 1983, however, fee revenue started to exceed the budget of the SEC. In recent years the fees collected have exceeded the budget of the SEC by a significant margin. In fact, in fiscal year 2000, fee collections were more than six times the amount appropriated to fund the SEC's annual budget.
- These fees are a significant cost borne by America's investors either individually or through public pension funds or other investment vehicles. Indeed, nearly fifty percent of all American households now own stock, either directly or indirectly, and are thus subject to these fees.
- In short, these excessive fees which investors and market participants pay are unjustified and represent a significant aggregate tax that burdens retirement savings and impedes capital formation.

#### I. PURPOSE

To reaffirm your commitment to promoting prosperity and democracy in the Western Hemisphere.

#### II. BACKGROUND

Your speech will open the World Affairs Council of America's (WACA) annual national conference, entitled "The Future of the Americas." The World Affairs Council is the largest non-profit group devoted to international affairs in the United States. This annual conference attracts leaders from government, the private sector, and academia.

Your speech will highlight three main themes, reflecting the commitments made at the April 2001 Summit of the Americas in Quebec City: (1) preserving political freedom and democracy; (2) strengthening security against terrorism and crime; and (3) advancing economic development and prosperity through deepening economic reform and free trade. It will also express support for financial assistance to Argentina based on Argentine commitment to a sound and sustainable economic plan.

A new item you will announce in the speech is your intent to include incremental increases in your next three budget requests for World Bank programs that assist the poorest countries (\$50 million, in FY03; prepared to consider \$100 million in each of FY04, FY05). You will also announce that you intend to explore an FTA with Central

American nations. This request is a "down payment" on your proposal to shift World Bank assistance resources for the poorest from loans to grants.

Thank you for the warm welcome. It's a pleasure to be part of this gathering. I thank the World Affairs Council for promoting citizen interest in global issues – especially an interest in our own hemisphere and its importance to our country.

In September of last year, I welcomed my friend the president of Mexico to the White House. Standing together on the South Lawn, President Fox and I spoke of building a hemisphere of freedom, prosperity, and progress. That was five days before terrorists attacked the peace and security of the world – murdering thousands of citizens from over 80 nations, including almost every nation in this hemisphere.

Since the attacks, the United States has received the sympathy and support of our neighbors and friends. I've been in close contact with democratic leaders such as Prime Minister Chretien, President Fox, President Cardoso, President Lagos, and President Toledo. And democratic leaders throughout the Americas have offered help, wisdom, friendship, and even peacekeepers, and I am deeply grateful.

The nations of the Western Hemisphere are resolved: We refuse to live in fear, so we will fight terror wherever it is found. And we are committed to building a prosperous, free, and democratic hemisphere. Nothing will distract us, and nothing will deter us, in completing this great work.

We meet, however, at a time when some are questioning the path to prosperity. Some wonder whether free market reforms are too painful to continue. Some question the fairness of free and open trade, holding out the false comfort of protectionism. And there is an even greater danger – that some may come to doubt democracy itself.

Our answer to these questions and doubts must be clear and consistent: The hopes of all our peoples – from the slum dweller in Rio or Caracas ... to the migrant worker in California ... to the pensioner in Buenos Aires – lie in greater freedom. Free markets and open trade are the best weapons against poverty, disease, and tyranny. And democracy is the non-negotiable demand of human dignity.

The future of this hemisphere depends on the strength of three commitments – democracy, security, and market-based development. These commitments are inseparable, and none will be achieved by half-measures. This road is not always easy, but it is the only road to stability and prosperity for all the people of this hemisphere.

Our first commitment is to democracy and political freedom. This is affirmed in the Democratic Charter of the Americas, which holds that only democracies can be part of our inter-American system. And these governments cannot be democratic in name only. Citizens and businesses must know that the town hall – the *alcaldia* [ahl-cahl-DEE-ah] – is free from bribery, cronyism, and all forms of corruption. These old attitudes and habits are a form of theft – stealing from people their money, and trust, and hopes for a better life. For freedom and prosperity to come, corruption must go.

Our second commitment is to security: Security against acts of terror. Security against the lawless violence of drug cartels and their accomplices. Our citizens must know that they can exercise their freedoms in safety and peace.

That is why, for example, the United States, Canada, and Mexico are cooperating in unprecedented ways to build "smart borders" for the 21<sup>st</sup> century that ensures safety for ordinary people and trade, but filters out terror and drugs.

That is also why the United States remains committed to helping Colombia defend its democracy.

Colombia and the Andean nations are strengthening law enforcement, reducing illegal crops, and expanding legitimate business opportunities as alternatives to drug farming and trafficking. The United States Congress recently approved 625 million dollars to support these efforts. America will help all nations in the region in cutting off the supply of drugs, even as we fight the demand for drugs in our country.

Our third commitment is to market-based economic development, with its benefits widely shared. Sustained development depends on sound monetary and fiscal policies, and freer trade among our nations. Recent events in Argentina do nothing to change this reality.

America is deeply concerned about the difficulties facing our ally and friend Argentina, and its great people. We share ties of commerce, culture, and family. And America is confident that Argentina will get through these troubles. It was an encouraging sign that President Duhalde [doo-AHL-day], on taking office, expressed a desire to pursue a Free Trade Area of the Americas.

Argentina – and nations throughout our hemisphere – need to strengthen our commitment to market-based reform, not weaken it. Shortcuts to reform only lead to more trouble. Half-measures will not halve the pain, only prolong it.

The United States is prepared to help Argentina weather this storm. Once Argentina has committed to a sound and sustainable economic plan, we will strongly support assistance for Argentina through international financial institutions. This assistance can soften the impact of the crisis on the lives of the Argentine people, by speeding the return of growth and prosperity.

Success in the global economy comes to countries that maintain fiscal discipline ... open their borders to trade ... privatize inefficient state enterprises ... deregulate their domestic markets ... and invest in the health and education of their people. This is true in Santiago and in Seoul; in Warsaw and in Washington. Those who promise painless protectionism or security through statism, assure a bleak and stagnant future.

Countries that stay on the hard road of reform are rewarded. Chile has cut its poverty rate in half over the last decade, and it has cut its child mortality rate by almost two-thirds since 1980. Mexico withstood the setbacks of the mid-1990s, and its economy has grown by more than four percent annually since 1996. Costa Rica's emphasis on education and attracting foreign investment has transformed its economy over the past decade. Costa Rica's exports of computer products are now almost four times greater in value than its banana exports and nearly eight times greater than its coffee exports.

My Nation is no stranger to the difficulties of reform and restructuring. A generation ago, our government made a mistaken and failed experiment with wage and price controls. During the 1970s and 1980s millions of our workers were displaced as our industries adapted to the demands of a new global economy. Great discipline was required to get our fiscal house in order. Yet each of these lessons and challenges made us stronger and more prosperous. With all its tests and difficulties, a faith in freedom is never finally disappointed.

This belief in markets is justified within borders, and beyond them. Open trade and investment bring healthy, growing economies, and can serve the cause of democratic reform. From the success of NAFTA, we know these are facts, not theories.

Acting on these facts, America, as we showed in Doha [DOE-hah], strongly supports new global trade negotiations.

In this region, we are acting on a number of fronts. We are working to build a Free Trade Area of the Americas, and we are determined to complete those negotiations by January of 2005. We plan to complete a free trade agreement with Chile early this year. I urge Congress to take it up quickly once we do. And I ask the Senate to schedule a vote, as soon as it returns, on renewing and expanding the Andean Trade Preference Act.

Today I announce that the United States will explore a free trade agreement with the countries of Central America. My Administration will work closely with Congress towards this goal. Our purpose is to strengthen the economic ties we already have with these nations ... to reinforce their

progress toward economic, political, and social reform ... and to take another step toward completing the Free Trade Area of the Americas.

All of these efforts depend on one thing: Congress must pass Trade Promotion Authority. The House of Representatives has acted. In the Senate, the Finance Committee has given its strong bipartisan approval. Now it is time for the full Senate to approve Trade Promotion Authority, so I can put it to work for the good of America – and all the Americas.

Markets and trade, development and democracy, rely on healthy, educated populations. Therefore, we are also working to bring better health care and greater literacy to the nations of our hemisphere. The United States' funding for international basic education assistance programs this year will be over 45 percent higher than last year. And this spring, the first of our regional teacher training centers will open in Jamaica. Additional centers will be operating in South and Central America by year's end.

I have called upon the World Bank and other development banks to increase the share of their funding devoted to education. The Inter-American Development Bank, for example, has significantly increased this share over the past year. All the development banks should keep moving in this direction.

I also have urged the World Bank to provide up to 50 percent of its assistance to the world's poorest nations in the form of grants rather than loans – grants for education, health, nutrition, water supplies, and sanitation.

To this end, my next budget will include a nearly 50 million dollar increase in aid to World Bank programs that assist the poorest countries. If the Bank demonstrates it can use the funds to achieve measurable results and moves forward on the reforms I have proposed, I am prepared to consider requesting increases of over 100 million dollars in each of my subsequent two budgets. This would mean that the annual U.S. contribution to these World Bank programs would be over 30 percent higher three years from now.


This hemisphere is on a path of reform, and our nations travel it together. We have a vision – a partnership of strong, equal, and prosperous countries, living and trading in freedom. Together, we will

defend that vision against lawlessness and violence. We will assert it against statism and protectionism. Especially in times of adversity, we will maintain our vision, because it unleashes the possibilities of every society and recognizes the dignity of every person. Together, we will build and defend this hemisphere of liberty.


