Radio Address May 11, 2002 Draft #9

Good morning.

Next week the United States House of Representatives is scheduled to debate a welfare reform plan that will touch the lives of millions of Americans.

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The last time Congress reformed welfare, in 1996, it put millions of Americans on the path to better lives. Because of work requirements and time-limited benefits, welfare caseloads have dropped by more than half. Today 5.4 million fewer people live in poverty, including 2.8 million fewer children, than in 1996.

Yet the real success of welfare reform is not found in the number of caseloads that have been cut, but in the number of lives changed. I have traveled all across the Nation and have met people whose lives have been improved because of welfare reform. And I have heard inspiring stories of hope and dignity, hard work and personal achievement.

Yet there are still millions of Americans trapped in dependence, without jobs and the dignity they bring. And now Congress must take the next, necessary steps in welfare reform.

Compassionate welfare reform should encourage strong families. Strong marriages and stable families are good for children – so stable families should be a central aim of welfare policy. Under my plan up to 300 million dollars per year will be available to states to support good private or public programs that counsel willing couples on building a healthy, respectful marriage.

Compassionate welfare reform must allow states greater flexibility in spending welfare money. Today confusing and conflicting regulations are keeping people from getting help. My proposal would give states the freedom to redesign how federal programs operate in their states. This will allow states to be more innovative in providing better job training, housing and nutrition programs, and better child care services to low-income families.

Most important of all, compassionate welfare reform must encourage more and more Americans to find the independence of a job. Today states, on average, must require work of only five percent of adults getting welfare. I am proposing that every state be required, within five years, to have seventy percent of welfare recipients working, or being trained to work, at least 40 hours a week.

These work requirements must be applied carefully, and compassionately. Because many on welfare need new skills, my plan allows states to combine work with up to two days each week of education and job training. Our proposal allows for three months in full-time drug rehabilitation or job training. And adolescent mothers can meet their work requirements by attending high school.

A work requirement is not a penalty – it is the pathway to independence and self-respect. For former welfare recipients, this path has led to a new and better life. When I was in North Carolina earlier this year I met Ella Currence – a mother of four who was on welfare for seven years. She knew change would be difficult – but she also knew change was best. Ella began participating in the state's Work First program. She has been working for the last five years – and she has put her life in order. Ella says, "You can do anything you want to do if you put your mind to it." This is the spirit and confidence encouraged by work.

Everyone in America benefits from compassionate welfare reform. Former welfare recipients gain new hope – and know the independence and dignity of a honest day's work. As our recovery continues, businesses will need more motivated and trained workers. Good welfare reform laws can break dependency <u>and</u> help the American economy.

My Administration has worked closely with Congress in writing the new welfare legislation. It is an excellent bill that will provide hope and promise, dignity and opportunity, to millions of Americans. I urge the House to pass it and the Senate to then act on it.

TRIBUTE TO MILTON FRIEDMAN

PURPOSE

I.

To congratulate Milton Friedman on his upcoming 90th birthday and honor his achievements.

II. BACKGROUND

Milton Friedman, recipient of the 1976 Nobel Prize for economic science, has been a senior research fellow at the Hoover Institution since 1977. He is also the Paul Snowden Russell Distinguished Service Professor Emeritus of Economics at the University of Chicago, where he taught from 1946 to 1976; and he was a member of the research staff of the National Bureau of Economic Research from 1937 to 1981.

Dr. Friedman is widely regarded as the leader of the "Chicago School" of monetary economics, which stresses the importance of the quantity of money as an instrument of government policy and as a determinant of business cycles and inflation. He has published many books and articles on economics, most notably <u>A Theory of the Consumption</u> <u>Function, The Optimum Quantity of Money and Other Essays</u>, and (with A. J. Schwartz) <u>A Monetary History of the United States, Monetary Statistics of the United States, and Monetary Trends in the United States and the United Kingdom.</u>

In addition to his economics work, Friedman has also written extensively on public policy, always with the primary emphasis on the preservation and extension of individual freedom. His most important books in this field are (with Dr. Rose D. Friedman) *Capitalism and Freedom* (University of Chicago Press, 1962); *Bright Promises, Dismal Performance* (Thomas Horton and Daughters, 1983), which consists mostly of reprints of columns he wrote for *Newsweek* from 1966 to 1983; (with Dr. Rose D. Friedman) *Free to Choose* (Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, 1980), which complements a ten-part television series of the same name that was shown over the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) network in early 1980; and (with Dr. Rose D. Friedman) *Tyranny of the Status Quo* (Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, 1984), which complements a three-part television series of the same name that was shown over PBS in early 1984.

He was a member of the President's Commission on an All-Volunteer Armed Force, the President's Commission on White House Fellows, and President Ronald Reagan's Economic Policy Advisory Board (a group of experts from outside the government named in 1981 by President Reagan).

Dr. Friedman has long been active in Republican political activity, serving as an informal economic adviser to Senator Barry Goldwater in his unsuccessful campaign for the presidency in 1964, to Richard Nixon in his successful 1968 campaign, to President Nixon subsequently, and to Ronald Reagan in his 1980 campaign.

He is a past president of the American Economic Association, the Western Economic Association, and the Mont Pelerin Society, and is a member of the American Philosophical Society and the National Academy of Sciences.

Friedman was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1988 and received the National Medal of Science the same year.

He also has been awarded honorary degrees by universities in the United States, Japan, Israel, and Guatemala, as well as the Grand Cordon of the First Class Order of the Sacred Treasure by the Japanese Government in 1986.

Dr. Friedman received his B.A. in 1932 from Rutgers University, his M.A. in 1933 from the University of Chicago, and his Ph.D. in 1946 from Columbia University. *Two Lucky People*, a memoir by Dr. Friedman and his wife, was published in 1998 by the University of Chicago Press.

The CATO Institute is honoring Dr. Friedman during its 25th anniversary celebration by presenting an award in his name at a dinner on Thursday, May 9. The award will be presented posthumously to Lord Peter Bauer of the London School of Economics, who passed away on Thursday, May 2, 2002.

That vision has changed America, and it is changing the world. All of us owe a tremendous debt to this man's towering intellect and devotion to liberty.

Milton has shown us that when government attempts to substitute its own judgments for the judgments of free people, the results are usually disastrous. In contrast to the free market's "invisible hand," which improves the lives of people, the government's "invisible foot" tramples on people's hopes and destroys their dreams. He has never claimed that free markets are perfect. Yet he has demonstrated that even an imperfect market produces better results than arrogant experts and grasping bureaucrats.

But Milton does not object to government controls solely because they are ineffective. His deeper objections flow from a moral framework. He has taught us that a free market system's main justification is its moral strength. Human freedom serves the cause of human dignity. Freedom rewards creativity and work. And you cannot reduce freedom in our economy without reducing freedom in our lives.

As Milton has written, "I know of no ... society that has been marked by a large measure of political freedom, and that has not also used something comparable to a free market to organize the bulk of economic activity."

This viewpoint was once controversial – as was Milton himself. When he began his work, the conventional wisdom held that capitalism's days were numbered. Free market systems were thought to be unsuited to modern problems.

Today we recognize that free markets are the great engines of economic development. They are the source of wealth, and the hope of a world weary of poverty and oppression.

We have seen Milton's ideas at work in Chile, where a group of economists called the "Chicago Boys" brought inflation under control and laid the groundwork for economic success. We have seen them at work in Russia, where the government recently adopted a thirteen percent flat-rate income tax – with impressive results. We have seen them at work in Sweden, which has adopted personal retirement accounts. We have even seen them at work in China, where the government conceded long ago that Marxism was "no longer suited" to China's problems.

These are extraordinary developments. They demonstrate that the rest of the world is finally catching up with Milton Friedman.

Yet Milton Friedman has done more than defend freedom as an abstract ideal. He has creatively applied the power of freedom to the problems of our country. And in the process, he has become an influential social reformer.

Milton has shown us how freedom can enhance our national security. He is the intellectual godfather of our all-volunteer Army. Milton argued that America could rely on the dedication of soldiers who serve in the armed forces of their own free will – and Milton was right. We have recently seen the quality, and idealism, and skill of a volunteer military. Those who serve our country by choice are serving it with honor.



Milton Friedman has also shown us how freedom can foster educational reform. For many years he has been a tireless advocate of school choice as a way of empowering parents and improving the performance of our schools. Educational reform advances when parents have the information and authority to push for reform. And there is no greater authority than a good alternative. Poor children in America need better options when their problems are ignored.

In all of these issues and debates, Milton Friedman has argued with consistency, and courage, and a trademark bluntness. His ideas have influence around the world. And by his strength of conviction, he has served his country. In 1976 he received the Nobel Prize for Economics, and in 1988 he was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

In 1938, Milton Friedman married Rose Director, an outstanding economist in her own right...and the only person known to have won an argument with Milton. Half-a-century later, Milton and Rose Friedman published a joint-memoir called *Two Lucky People*. There is no doubt that Milton and Rose Friedman have been lucky, but I think the rest of us have been even luckier.

We are lucky that their parents chose to immigrate to America from Europe, and gave them the love and encouragement they needed to succeed.

And we are lucky that Milton Friedman flunked some of his qualifying exams to become an actuary – and became an economist, instead.

We are thankful for those tough exams and we are thankful for Rose and Milton Friedman.

To discuss the judicial vacancy crisis with Republican Members of the Senate Judiciary Committee and to highlight the need for confirmation of the Circuit Court nominees that you nominated on May 9, 2001.

BACKGROUND

One year ago today, you submitted the first eleven nominations for the Federal courts of appeals. Eight of the eleven nominees have yet to have a hearing before the Judiciary Committee. Since taking office, you have nominated a total of 30 Circuit Court nominees, 21 of whom have yet to receive a judiciary committee hearing and thus remain unconfirmed. The Republican Members of the Judiciary Committee are pivotal in helping move the judicial confirmation process forward.

The Circuit Courts are struggling to keep up with the caseload, while remain nearly 20 percent of judicial positions remain vacant. Last year, the caseload in the Circuit Courts reached its highest level ever. The Senate must do much more to ensure that our Circuit Courts have the judges they need to dispense justice fairly and effectively.

TALKING POINTS

- One year ago today, I submitted my first eleven nominations to the federal courts of appeals. Yet eight of the eleven have not even received hearings. That is wrong.
- These eight nominees deserve hearings. They are well known for their qualifications, character, and experience. They have bipartisan support in their home states, and they share my philosophy that judges should follow the law, and not make the law.
- Each has been rated "qualified" or "well-qualified" by the American Bar Association, which Democrats have called the gold standard.
- The Senate's delay on these and many other nominees is hurting the American justice system. There is a vacancy crisis in America that was called "alarming" by the Chief Justice. Chairman Leahy has begun to act upon nominees to the district courts, and I appreciate that, but there is much more to be done at the circuit court level.
- Nearly 20 percent of the circuit court judgeships are currently vacant. These are the courts of last resort in most federal cases. I have nominated 30 individuals to serve on the circuit courts, but the Senate has not acted on more than two-thirds of them, including the eight nominees remaining from May 9 of last year. Justice delayed is justice denied for the American people.
- It's time to restore dignity and fairness to the judicial confirmation process. Nominees should receive a prompt hearing and vote by the full Senate no matter who lives in the White House and which party controls the Senate.
- The Democrat leadership in the Senate has not done enough to restore dignity to the process or address the vacancy crisis. They should begin by holding hearings and votes on the eight nominees who as of today have waited a full year for a hearing.
