PURPOSE

To sign H.R. 3210, the Terrorism Risk Protection Act, into law during a ceremony that will highlight the importance of the legislation.

BACKGROUND

On November 14, 2002 the House of Representatives passed by voice vote H.R. 3210, the Terrorism Risk Protection Act conference report. The Senate passed the conference report on November 19, 2002, by a vote of 86-11.

The bill ensures the continued financial capacity of insurers to provide coverage for risks from terrorism. It will limit immediate market disruptions, encourage economic stabilization, and facilitate the transition to a viable private market for terrorism insurance. It does so by establishing the "Terrorism Insured Loss Shared Compensation Program" within the Department of Treasury, and by requiring the insurance industry to provide affordable property and casualty insurance coverage for terrorism risk. Also, it authorizes appropriations and establishes a Federal cause of action for property damage, personal injury, or death arising out of or resulting from an act of terrorism.

The attacks of September 11, 2001, devastated lives, leveled buildings – and seriously disrupted our economy. Businesses suffered. The stock market halted trading for several days. And many insurance companies stopped covering builders and real estate owners against the risk of attack. Premiums skyrocketed, and protections were diminished. Across America, hospitals, office buildings, malls, museums, construction jobs, and many transportation companies have all had difficultly finding terrorism insurance.

More than 15 billion dollars in real estate transactions have been canceled or put on hold because owners and investors could not obtain the insurance protection they need. Commercial construction is at a six-year low, and thousands of hard-hat workers have been kept off the job. Commercial Mortgage Backed Securities have seen their bond ratings lowered – hurting many Americans invested in the bond market, including teachers, police officers, and firefighters who have lost money in their pension funds.

By helping to ensure that terrorism insurance is affordable and available, the Terrorism Risk Insurance Act will permit many construction projects to move forward, and help our economy grow. Billions of dollars in investments will be more secure. The Nation will have more good, hard-hat jobs. And workers, investors, and markets will have greater confidence that our economy is strong enough to withstand a future attack.

This new law will also help the economy and the legal system by discouraging abusive lawsuits. Civil cases resulting from a terrorist attack will be combined in a single federal court. Lawyers will be prevented from shopping for courts with a reputation for outrageous awards. Judgments and rulings will be more consistent. And under this law, taxpayer dollars will not be used to pay punitive damages.

I am grateful to the Members of Congress who put the interests of workers and taxpayers ahead of the interests of trial lawyers. I look forward to working with the new Congress on even stronger measures to prevent abusive lawsuits. And today, I am taking steps to ensure that no taxpayer dollars will be spent on legal settlements without approval by the Secretary of the Treasury. The Secretary will work to ensure that settlements are fair to victims, and not a windfall for lawyers.

The act of Congress I sign today will encourage greater competition in the insurance market and add strength to our economy – but there is more to do. I will work with Democrats and Republicans in the next Congress to pass a growth and jobs package early next year. My Administration is determined to make America safer, and to make our economy stronger – and we are making progress on both these priorities.

America has entered a new kind of war, requiring aggressive action abroad – and active defense at home. Yesterday, I signed into law the new Department of Homeland Security, to organize our government for the long-term challenge of protecting America. Today, with terrorism insurance, we are defending America by making our economy more secure. Both these achievements show the unity of our Nation in a time of testing – and our resolve to lead America to a better day.

I am now pleased to sign the Terrorism Risk Insurance Act of 2002.

Other Provisions of H.R. 3210

Other Terrorism Insurance Program Provisions

Determination of Occurrence of an Act of Terrorism. The enrolled bill would define an "act of terrorism" as any act that is certified by the Secretary of the Treasury, in concurrence with the Secretary of State and the Attorney General, to be a violent act or an act dangerous to human life, property, or infrastructure committed by an individual or individuals acting on behalf of any foreign person or foreign interest, as part of an effort to coerce the civilian population of the United States or to influence the policy or affect the conduct of the U.S. Government by coercion. The Secretary would be prohibited from certifying any act as an act of terrorism if: (1) the act is committed as part of the course of a war declared by the Congress (except with respect to coverage for workers' compensation); or (2) property and casualty insurance losses resulting from the act, in the aggregate, do not exceed \$5 million. The Secretary would be prohibited from delegating the authority to determine whether an act of terrorism has occurred. Any certification of, or determination not to certify, an act as an act of terrorism would be final and not subject to judicial review.

Insurers and Insurance Types Covered. The enrolled bill would define an "insurer" generally as any entity, including any affiliate, that receives direct earned premiums for any type of commercial property and casualty insurance coverage and is: (1) licensed to provide insurance in any State; (2) a foreign company listed by the NAIC on the Quarterly Listing of Alien Insurers; (3) approved for the purpose of offering property and casualty insurance by a Federal agency in connection with maritime, energy, or aviation activities; or (4) a State residual market insurance entity or State workers' compensation fund. In addition, an insurer would have to meet any other criteria that the Secretary "may reasonably prescribe."

The Secretary would be authorized to apply the bill's Terrorism Insurance Program provisions to other classes of captive insurers (i.e., insurance companies that are owned and controlled by the entities they insure) and other self-insurance arrangements by municipalities and other entities (such as workers' compensation self-insurance programs and State workers' compensation reinsurance pools). This authority would apply only if: (1) it is exercised before the occurrence of an act of terrorism in which such an entity incurs an insured loss; and (2) all of the provisions of the enrolled bill are applied comparably to such entities.

For purposes of the enrolled bill, "property and casualty insurance" would not include: (1) Federal crop insurance or any privately issued crop or livestock insurance; (2) private mortgage or title insurance; (3) financial guaranty insurance issued by monoline financial guaranty insurance corporations; (4) medical malpractice insurance; (5) health or life insurance; (6) Federal flood insurance; or (7) reinsurance. <u>Application to Group Life Insurance</u>. The enrolled bill would require the Secretary to conduct an "expedited" study on whether adequate and affordable catastrophe reinsurance for acts of terrorism is available to U.S. life insurers, and the extent to which the threat of terrorism is reducing the availability of group life insurance coverage for U.S. consumers. To the extent that the Secretary determines that such coverage is not or will not be reasonably available to insurers and consumers, he or she would be required to apply the Terrorism Insurance Program to providers of group life insurance, with conditions that the Secretary deems appropriate.

<u>Conditions for Federal Payments</u>. The Secretary could not make a Federal payment unless: (1) the entity that suffers the insured loss, or an entity acting on its behalf, files a claim with the insurer; (2) the insurer processes the claim for the insured loss in accordance with appropriate business practices; and (3) the insurer provides clear and conspicuous disclosure to the policyholder of the premium costs it charged for insured losses covered by the Program and the Federal share of compensation for insured losses under the Program. The insurer would have to submit to the Secretary: (1) a claim for payment of the Federal share of compensation for insured losses under the Program; (2) written certification of the underlying claim and of all payments made for insured losses; and (3) certification of its compliance with the provisions of the enrolled bill.

<u>Reinsurance to Cover Exposure</u>. The enrolled bill states that it is not to be construed to prevent insurers from obtaining reinsurance coverage for insurer deductibles or insured losses retained by insurers. Obtaining this type of coverage would not affect the calculation of the deductibles. Furthermore, the amount of Federal financial assistance provided would not be reduced by reinsurance paid or payable to an insurer from other sources, except that recoveries from such other sources, taken together with financial assistance, would not be allowed to exceed the aggregate amount of the insurer's insured losses for any program year. If these recoveries and financial assistance exceed the aggregate amount of losses for any of these periods, and there is no agreement between the insurer and any reinsurer to the contrary, any amount in excess of the aggregate would have to be returned to the Secretary.

<u>Program Administration</u>. The Secretary would have the authority to: (1) investigate and audit all claims under the Program; and (2) prescribe regulations and procedures to effectively administer and implement the Program and ensure that all insurers and self-insured entities that participate in the Program are treated comparably under the Program. The Secretary would have to consult with NAIC, as he or she determines appropriate. The Secretary would be authorized to employ persons or contract for services as may be necessary to implement the Program.

<u>Civil Penalties</u>. The Secretary would be authorized to assess a civil monetary penalty against any insurer that the Secretary determines, on the record after opportunity for a hearing: (1) has failed to charge, collect, or remit terrorism loss risk-spreading premiums in accordance with requirements and regulations; (2) has intentionally provided to the Secretary erroneous information regarding premium or loss amounts; (3) submits to the Secretary fraudulent claims under the Program for insured losses; (4) has failed to provide required disclosures; or (5) has otherwise failed to comply with the provisions of, or the regulations issued under, the enrolled bill related to the Terrorism Insurance Program.

The amount of the civil monetary penalty could be no more than \$1 million or, in the case of any failure to pay, charge, collect, or remit amounts in accordance with requirements, the amount in dispute. A penalty for any failure to pay, charge, collect, or remit amounts in accordance with requirements would be in addition to any such amounts recovered by the Secretary.

Preservation Provisions. The enrolled bill would not affect the jurisdiction or regulatory authority of any State insurance commissioner over any insurer except as specifically provided in the bill, with some exceptions. For example, the bill's definition of the term "act of terrorism" would be the exclusive definition of that term for purposes of compensation for insured losses under the enrolled bill and would preempt any provision of State law inconsistent with that definition. During the period beginning on the date of enactment of this Act and ending on December 31, 2003, rates and forms for terrorism risk insurance covered by the enrolled bill and filed with any State would not be subject to prior approval or a waiting period under any State law that would otherwise be applicable. Nothing in the enrolled bill would affect the ability of any State to invalidate a rate as excessive, inadequate, or unfairly discriminatory, and, with respect to forms, where a State has prior approval authority, it would apply to allow subsequent review of such forms. During the period beginning on the date of enactment and for so long as the Program is in effect, books and records of any insurer that are relevant to the Program would have to be provided to the Secretary upon request, notwithstanding any provision of State law prohibiting or limiting such access. The enrolled bill also states that it is not to be construed to alter, amend, or expand the terms of coverage under any reinsurance agreement in effect on the date of enactment.

<u>Study and Report on Insurance Coverage</u>. The enrolled bill would require the Secretary, after consultation with the NAIC and representatives of the insurance industry, to conduct a study of the potential effects of acts of terrorism on the availability of life insurance and other lines of insurance coverage. Within nine months of enactment, the Secretary would have to submit a report to the Congress on the results of the study.

<u>Submission of Premium Information</u>. The enrolled bill would require the Secretary to annually compile information on the terrorism risk insurance premium rates of insurers for the preceding year. To the extent that such information is not otherwise available, the Secretary would be authorized to require each insurer to submit to NAIC terrorism risk insurance premium rates, and NAIC would have to make this information available to the Secretary. The Secretary would be required to make this information available to the Congress, upon request.

Federal Reserve Board Provisions

Current law provides that the seven-member Federal Reserve Board may take certain actions only upon the affirmative vote of five Board members. H.R. 3210 would allow these actions to be taken upon the unanimous vote of all members in office at the time of the action if there are fewer than five members in office.

H.R. 3210 would also amend the circumstances under which the Board can authorize a Federal Reserve Bank to provide emergency credit to individuals, partnerships, and corporations that are not depository institutions. Currently, the Board may do so by an affirmative vote of at least five Board members in unusual and exigent circumstances when the entity is unable to secure credit from another source. The enrolled bill would allow the Board to authorize emergency credit upon the unanimous vote of all "available" members in office if at least two members are available and all available members participate in the action. The available members would have to unanimously determine that: (1) unusual and exigent circumstances exist and the borrower is unable to secure adequate credit accommodations from other sources; (2) action on the matter is necessary to prevent, correct, or mitigate serious harm to the economy or the stability of the financial system of the United States; and (3) despite the use of all means available (including telephone, telegraph, and other electronic means), the other members of the Board have not been able to be contacted on the matter. The available members would further have to determine that action on the matter is required before the number of Board members otherwise required to vote on the matter can be contacted. Any credit extended by a Federal Reserve Bank pursuant to such action would be payable upon demand of the Board.

The available members of the Board would be required to document the determinations in writing. These written findings would have to be included in the record of the action and in the official minutes of the Board. Copies of the record would have to be provided as soon as practicable to the members of the Board who were not available to participate in the action and to the Chairmen of the Senate Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs Committee and the House Financial Services Committee.

PURPOSE

I.

To pardon the National Thanksgiving turkey.

II. BACKGROUND

This year marks the 55th consecutive annual pardoning of the National Thanksgiving Turkey. This practice actually began during the Civil War, but it was dropped until President Harry Truman started the practice again in 1947.

Every year, the National Turkey Federation (NTF) raises two turkeys to participate in the ceremony at the White House. This year's event will be a departure from past presentations because for the first time, a female turkey will be pardoned. Her name is "Katie," and the alternate male turkey is "Zack."

They are both breeder turkeys from a farm in Clinton, North Carolina. They were raised under the supervision of Ron Prestage[PRESS-tidge], Chairman of the National Turkey Federation and President of Prestage Farms' South Carolina operations. "Katie" and "Zack" are from a flock of turkeys that were hatched on April 3, 2002 and were hand selected from six finalists earlier this month.

Special care and attention have been given to Katie and Zack since birth. The two turkeys have had increased personal interaction to help acclimate the birds to large crowds. After the ceremony, the turkeys will live out their remaining years at the Frying Pan Park's Kidwell Farm, a petting farm for children in Herndon, Virginia. Pardoned turkeys have been sent there for the past 11 years and have an average life expectancy of two years.
